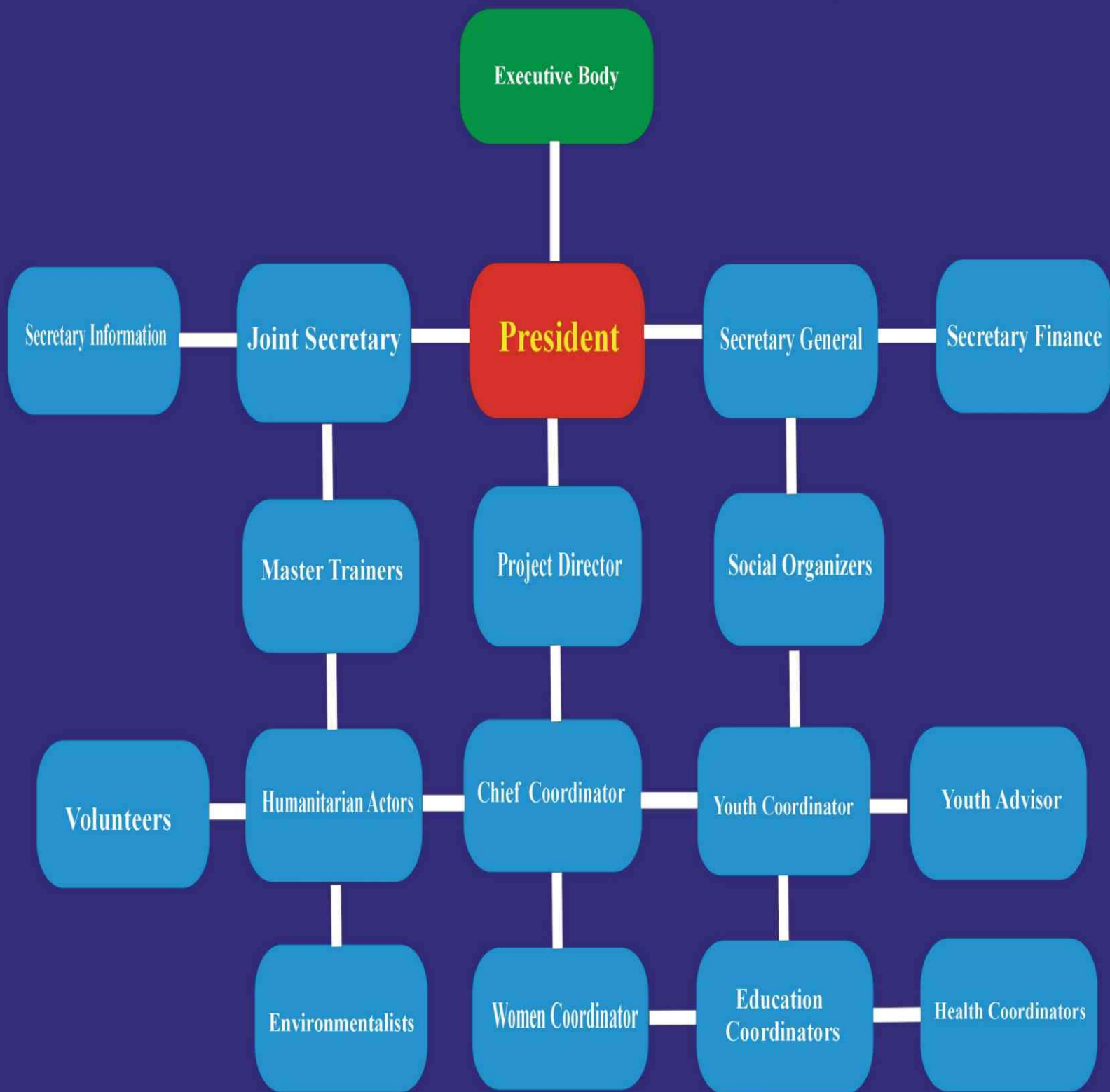

Batool Welfare Trust® has also constituted **Environmental Clubs (ECs)** in the selected schools, where there **Tree Plantation** Project was executed. Ten Students and two teachers were being taken from each school to run the affairs of environmental clubs, while maximum membership will be made in the **ECs**. In the all **ECs** different environment related activities i.e. debate competitions, poster competitions, painting exhibitions, utilization of solid wastes in production activities etc will be ensured with specific intervals of the time.

Development of Sense of Ownership:

BWT® has also developed sense of ownership among the students, teachers, and other stakeholders, during the execution of the project. The ownership of every tree went to those students, and teachers etc, who practically planted the tree and its ownership went to its real anme symbolically. The main idea is to develop the keen interest of tree plantation among the students/teachers and other stakeholders.

Outcomes:

- Informed students, teachers, general public and other community about environmental conservation.

Anti-Drugs Day 26 June 2009

An anti-drug awareness walk was organised here on **Friday 26 June 2009** in which hundreds of students from different schools of the twin cities of Rawalpindi and Islamabad participated enthusiastically. The event was organised by **Batool Welfare Trust**. The students were holding placards and banners inscribed with anti-drug slogans to make the general public aware of the hazardous effects of drugs. Addressing the gathering on the occasion **Batool Welfare Trust** President Nazia Batool said that thousands of people were suffering because of use of drugs in Pakistan. "Especially the younger generation is suffering most from their use, which is a dangerous trend that needs to be reversed," she said.

She said the cases of drug trafficking were rampant in twin cities. "Unemployment, impoverishment and the general socio-economic malaise have been identified, as the causes of the illicit trade," she said. She said that the launch of anti-drug campaign by **Batool Welfare Trust** marked a new development in the war against drug trafficking for its focus on public awareness, mass education, grassroots advocacy and value re-orientation fresh from the ailing option of arrest and prosecution. The trust has been carrying out an awareness campaign for the past three years among passengers travelling on long-distance trains on the menace of drugs" she said while adding that the trust personnel have been taking part in the campaign, as part of the 'anti-drugging' drive.

Batool Welfare Trust Finance Secretary Muhammad Kabir said that they had given their team the task of spreading awareness among people not to accept anything from others, especially strangers.

He said that it was appreciable decision of government to increase the taxes on all tobacco products in recent budget.

"Government also approved the constitution to not smoking in the public places, but unfortunately the implementation on this law were not made appropriately, and government should take this issue seriously," he maintained.

Batool Welfare Trust has also initiated a program to provide treatment and rehabilitation to drugs users. In this regard **BWT** has established a Drug Treatment Unit here in Rawalpindi to provide treatment to the drugs Users. **BWT** has also mobilized a great score of volunteers to address the issues of Drugs Abuse across the country.

Batool Welfare Trust has treated more than 50 drug users, who were drugs addicted, while now they have quitted the drugs use, and enjoying their happy life with their families. **BWT** is also committed to prevent drugs use from Pakistan and across the Globe. In this regard **BWT** is also facing several challenges in Pakistan, particularly the financial constraints, which create some hurdles for **Batool Welfare Trust**.



Women Health:

BWT organized seminars in different areas to promote basic health awareness among women. In Islamabad a seminar was held by **BWT** in which doctors, lady health workers and health professionals were invited to share their expertise and give awareness to families and women participants at the seminar.

The seminar was focused to educate parents, mothers and families how to better educate and bring up their children in a safe and healthy environment, since a healthy child of today can be a better youth of tomorrow to form a sound society.

Focused Areas:

BWT is planning to reach those areas where poverty and illiteracy are at its peak and basic faculties are not available so that those people get relief from their miseries and take benefit from **BWT** poverty alleviation programs. The selection of such areas are completed and we have conducted a field survey of those areas where **BWT** wishes to start its campaigns. The selected areas include Chakwal, Shakrial, Chakri Road, Tarnol, and Multan Karachi, rural and downtrodden areas of Lahore and different areas in slum dwellings.

Batool Welfare Trust has also initiated several projects of reproductive health, maternal health, child health, Nutrition, Tele-medicines and free medical camps for the destitute and downtrodden population of the country.

Batool Welfare Trust has also worked a lot on the awareness and advocacy of basic women health, including curative measures for the pregnant women. **BWT** has also initiated a comprehensive plan to provide free medical guidelines to ensure the health care of pregnant women and newborn child. **BWT** has also aware the rural women community how to protect themselves from malnutrition and how to care their newborn babies from the diseases.

Batool Welfare Trust has also educate and aware the women how to reduce complexities of pregnancy issues. **BWT** is working on breast cancer, breastfeeding, cervix and ovarian.

Batool Welfare Trust has also trained more than 500 lady health workers, midwives, and other health volunteers to combat the women health related issues.

Batool Welfare Trust has chalked out long term planning to produce a dedicated, skilled, competent and skilled midwives to reduce maternal death rate across the country, while mass education programmes have also been stated for girl child to reduce and overcome the health related issues of girl child.

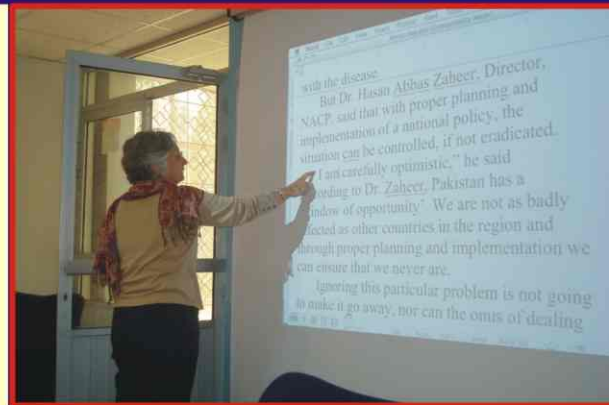

Batool Welfare Trust along with an Alliance of NGOs celebrating The **Breastfeeding** Week title National Alliance for Promotion of **Breastfeeding**, which was held here in Islamabad Hotel on July, 15, 2010. The event was jointly organized by National Alliance of NGO and UNICEF Islamabad. In this event all the Alliance NGOs have participated warmly and worked hard to promote and ensure breast feedings. In Pakistani perspective the infant mortality rate is 74/1000 live births indicating that around 400,000 babies are likely to die during their first year of life. According to estimates 11 percent deaths take place due to diarrhea and Acute Respiratory Infections. However, 22 percent of all neonatal deaths could be prevented if breast feeding (BF) is initiated within one hour by all mothers. However, due to ignorance among general population and unethical marketing practices by the corporate sector, the percentage of breast feeding is very low in Pakistan. This will also help in achieving Millennium Development Goals 1 and 4. The Goal 1 calls for eradicating extreme poverty and hunger. **Breastfeeding** significantly contributes to low cost, high quality food and sustainable food security for a baby. Goal 4 calls for reducing child mortality. By reducing diarrhea and Acute Respiratory Infections, **Breastfeeding** can readily reduce child mortality by about 13% and improved complementary feeding would reduce child mortality by about 6%. In addition, about 50-60% of Under-Five mortality is caused by malnutrition due to inadequate complementary foods and feeding following on poor BF practices and also to low birth weight. **Breastfeeding** Week is celebrated every year with great enthusiasm, and assurances are made to strictly monitor and implement the relevant laws on promotion and protection of **breastfeeding**.

Therefor, **Batool Welfare Trust** has also celebrated Global **Breastfeeding Week(GBWk)2010** under the supervision of **UNICEF** and **The Network for Consumer Protection**. **BWT** is also committed to promote the BF to aware the mothers to give basic rights to their children.

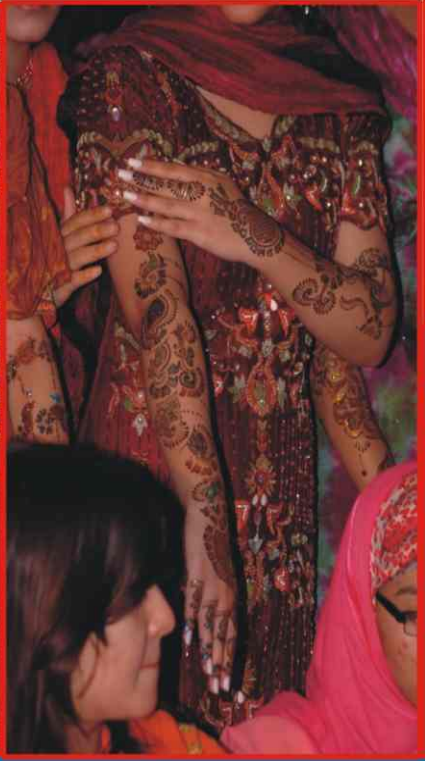

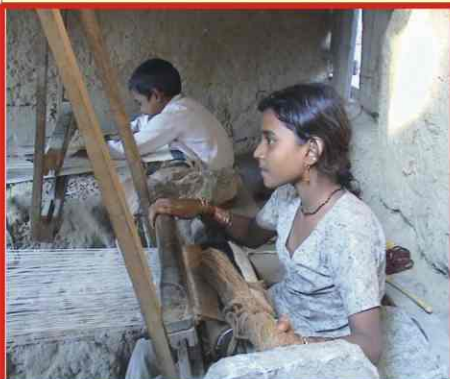

Comparing the ILO standards, Ms Nazia Batool stressed that under the Constitution of Pakistan, **Labour** is regarded as a 'concurrent subject', which means that it is the responsibility of both the Federal and Provincial Governments. She further added that however, for the sake of uniformity, laws are enacted by the Federal Government, stipulating that Provincial Governments may make rules and regulations of their own according to the conditions prevailing in or for the specific requirements of the Provinces.

She strongly pointed out that The Constitution of Pakistan contains a range of provisions with regards to labour rights found in Part II: Fundamental Rights and Principles of Policy, which are yet to be implemented or even being promoted by the government and private sectors.

The participants of the seminar focused on some key points of the Constitution for the protection of **Labour Rights**, which are as below;

He said that **Department of Literacy** will continue its support to **Batool Welfare Trust®** for the promotion of education among the deprived community of the country.

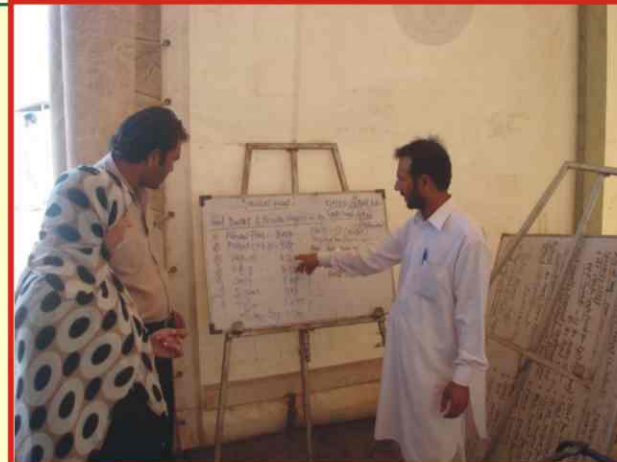


Major issues facing the IDPs in the Jalojai Camp District Nowshera KPK.

A competent team of **Batool Welfare Trust®** has visited the Jalojai Camp for observing the major issues and crisis facing by the **Internally Displaced Persons (IDPs)** there in **Jalojai Camp** Nowshera District, Khyber Paktoon Khawa.

The following issues are prevailing in the **Jalojai IDPs Camp**, particularly facing by Women IDPs.

1. Lack of health facilities is one of the major issues for the women **IDPs** in the **Jalojai Camp**. There is no facility of reproductive health in the camp. Pregnant women are facing severe challenges during the delivery cases. These women often victims of un-trained midwives.
2. Lack of wash rooms and Latrines (Toilets) facilities caused several diseases for these **IDPs** community.
3. Scarcity of fuel, particularly kerosene oil for Stoves also major problems for the population.
4. Lack of drinking water hard hit the population there in the camp. Approximately 25,000 families are dwelling in the **Jalojai Camp**, but less facilities of drinking water badly affect these population.
5. There is no proper lighting system inside the camp, but only street lights are available in the camp. People demanding proper lighting system inside the camp.
6. Uninterrupted electricity supply is dire need of the hour, due to poor system of electric supply, people adversely suffering form hot weather, while no electric fans were available inside the camp.
7. Hygiene and wash facilities are very less, particularly, less curative measures in dental caused several stomach and abdomen diseases for **IDPs** community.
8. No recreational activities are available for the children, and other population.
9. Psycho-social issues are also the major threat for the women and other IDPs.
10. Due to dust, respiratory diseases are broke out in the camp; there is facility of showering on the dusty areas of the camp, due to scarcity of water.
11. Food supply is remarkably done, but the food items must be revised, because Dall Channa is given continuously, it should be changed with any other item.
12. Veil (Parda) is one of the big problems for the communication gap for the serving Mobilizers.
13. Fewer facilities of Wash and hygiene caused epidemics diseases for the population, while less awareness also the barrier for population.

She added more that ministry of health is committed to facilitate the **Health Care Provider**, NGOs, Civil Society, and other stakeholders to work jointly to reduce the phenomenon. Masooma Butt gender Specialist **WHO** Pakistan has conducted the workshop introduction and objectives. She added more that such activities could enable us to combat the gender base violence from the society. Dr, Rakhshinda Perveen a researcher and author has given a comprehensive presentation on **Rapid Assessment on health Sector & Response to Gender based Violence**. She highlighted the key findings, analysis and recommendations of the rapid Assessment on health Sector Capacity & Response to **Gender Base Violence**.

Dr, Rakhshinda has presented the Executive Summary of the Workshop and emphasized that Global studies convincingly documented that **Gender Base Violence (GBV)** is very common, but most health care providers fail to diagnose and register GBV, not only due to socio-cultural and traditional barriers, lack of time and resources awareness and knowledge. She said that the fear of violence at the household and at community level, and stigma from the society further reduces many victims, willingness to use health services. She said more that the health sector can minimize the prevalence and impact on **GBV** through improved primary preventions, promote community awareness and prevent **GBV**.

A comprehensive presentation was delivered during the Greenroom side event on "Environmental Conservation". In which Environmental Problems in LDCs "

A solution oriented approach" was highlighted during the presentation by M.Kabir Secretary General **Batool Welfare Trust**. Kabir also emphasized that Environmental Problems in LDCs and developing countries can not be tackled alone, there are a multiplicity of factors causing them. He said that pro-activity than handling the existing environmental issues from the Globe.

He said during the presentation that urbanization and related environmental issues are the mega threat to the environmental conservation across the Globe. Poor municipality mechanism, lack of awareness, low income, lack of funding are the main causes of environmental hazards in the LDCs and Developing Countries in the World.



Kabir said that industrial and vehicular pollution is one of the major cause of environmental issues, rapidly increasing of vehicles, lack of awareness in industrial sector, energy crisis, low profitability, less implementation of environmental protection tools also create environmental pollution.

He also highlighted that deforestation rate in the World is also growing rapidly, due to urban development, fuel consumptions, lack of reforestation, lack of urban planning, uncontrolled expansion are also increased the environmental issues across the World.

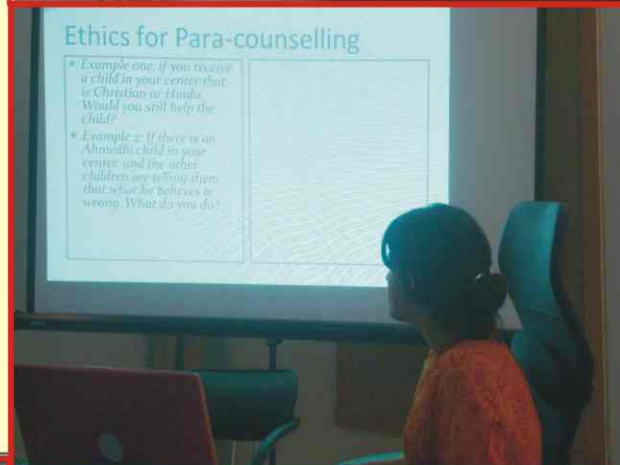

Batool Welfare Trust has conducted several surveys and researched on the CSA and CSEC in different localities of Pakistan to highlight the negative effects of it. Sexual violence against children is recognized internationally as the most severe violation of their human rights and the worst form of child abuse and exploitation of children rights through sexual exploitation particularly in Pakistan.

Batool Welfare Trust has provided psychological, spiritual, emotional and psycho-social development and rehabilitation of more than 50 sexual victims in Rawalpindi Districts. BWT has also provide legal assistance and monetary assistance to the sexual abuse victims to fight for their rights. It is also noted **by Batool Welfare Trust** after conducting surveys that Sexual violence against children is a national problem and in recent years it has been observed that child sexual abuse is rapidly growing concern in the rural and urban areas of Pakistan.

Researchers of **Batool Welfare Trust** has also pointed out several factors involved in the Child Sexual Abuse (CSA) and Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children (CSEC), including child prostitution due to poverty, sexual abuse by family members, neighbours and other related members. Child sex tourism and child trafficking for sexual purpose is also one of the major factor of CSA and CSEC in Pakistan. On the other hand **BWT** has also initiative Anti-Sexual Child Abuse for slum dwelling areas of Pakistan after identifying that Child Sexual Abuse is a common practice in the slum dwelling areas of Pakistan.

On the other hand **Batool Welfare Trust** has also noted that Child Sexual Abuse is also one of the major factors of spreading of **HIV/AIDS** in the society in this regard BWT has constituted a Task Force to prevent the Child Abuse and combat **HIV/AIDS** from the society.

Gender-based violence is a long standing, complex, global problem. It requires attention and effort from a wide range of actors. In populations affected by armed conflict, GBV is one among many protection concerns for the community and the organizations assisting the community.

The purpose of this training and planning workshop is to build the capacity of an interagency, multisectoral team to prevent and respond to gender-based violence. The workshop builds individual knowledge, understanding, and skills while building a sense of teamwork and collaboration.

TOT also described the relationship between issues of gender and power, and gender-based violence; and defined gender-based violence. Identified types of GBV occurring in the setting, causes and perpetuating factors. Described the recommended standards for interagency, multisectoral prevention and response to GBV.

Identified strengths, gaps, and needs in the setting for prevention and response to GBV. By the end of the workshop, participants have Develop a plan for the next steps to build prevention and response to GBV for follow-up and continuing action after the TOT Training of UN Women.

The workshop is designed to help participants learn about a few of the most relevant resource materials that they should have and use. Workshop manual has been given to the each participant so that each participant has their own copy (ordering information is listed in the Additional Resources section of the training manual).

A variety of training methods have been used in each of the modules.

Methods included small group work, individual work, games, exercises, lecture, and large group discussions. Trainers have cared to avoid lengthy lecture or large group discussions, always remembering that individual participants learn through different methods.

The training module provided information to lay the foundation for the entire training program. Step by step, each session built participants' understanding of the key concepts and principles behind "gender-based violence" and "violence against women."

At the end of the Training of Trainers (TOT) UN Women has awarded certificates of appreciation and participation to all participants of NGOs, Civil Society, UN entities and other stakeholders.
