Five Points Youth Foundation, Inc. adapts the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) Integrated Whole Community Model locally and nationally for community resiliency, as well as the United Nations Global Compact Local Networks internationally in support of Caring for Climate, Business 4 Peace and other U.N. Initiatives 2015-2020 via Global Partnerships for Development using collaborative arts and technology to address the Post-2015 Sustainable Development Agenda and Decade of Sustainable Energy for All (SE4All) throughout the Diaspora and the Earth, in compliance with the African Union Convention on Preventing and Combating Corruption as to African Union 6th Region and Agenda 2063, with full recognition and respect for the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, Internally Displaced Persons, Refugees, the “homeless” women and children of the world.

Beginning January 1, 2015, via Global Partnerships for Development (MDG #8) protocols, Five Points Youth Foundation began aggressive research, analysis and distribution of information and contents to attract and mobilize an international audience and potential stakeholder pool to recognize and support the Post-2015 Sustainable Development Agenda.

Implementation Methodologies

For the first time ever, all members of the United Nations have launched a worldwide campaign that leaves no one behind. But NONE of the goals can be achieved without Peace on Earth.

Five Points Youth Foundation advocates “regenerative” solutions: processes that restore, renew or revitalize their own sources of energy and materials, creating sustainable systems that integrate the needs of society with the integrity of nature. Whereas the highest aim of sustainable development is to satisfy fundamental human needs today without compromising the possibility of future generations to satisfy theirs, the end-goal of regenerative design is to redevelop systems with absolute effectiveness, that allows for the co-evolution of the human species along with other thriving species.

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Adhering to the theme of Regenerative Economic Theory we are driving our projects and capital campaign through Zero based budgeting (identification of a task or tasks and then funding resources to complete the task independent of current resourcing) within our own network, rather than source and spend thousands of dollars on “anonymous” and “uncertain” crowdsourcing campaigns.

We are committed to making mission investments to further our philanthropic goals. They include any type of investment that is intended and designed to generate both a measurable social or environmental benefit and a financial return

We are assembling a multi-lingual international advisory board for the Five Points Youth Foundation ngo campaign to support local global networks via the United Nations Global Compact to build community resiliency worldwide 2015-2030, beginning with the September 21, 2015 (International Day of Peace) through the end of the United Nations Millennium Development Goals (December 31) 2015.

Arrangement for Capacity-building and Technology Transfer

We will promote the development and use of information and communications technology infrastructure, as well as capacity-building, particularly in least developed countries, landlocked developing countries and small island developing States, including rapid universal and affordable access to the Internet. We will promote access to technology and science for women, youth and children. We will further facilitate accessible technology for persons with disabilities.

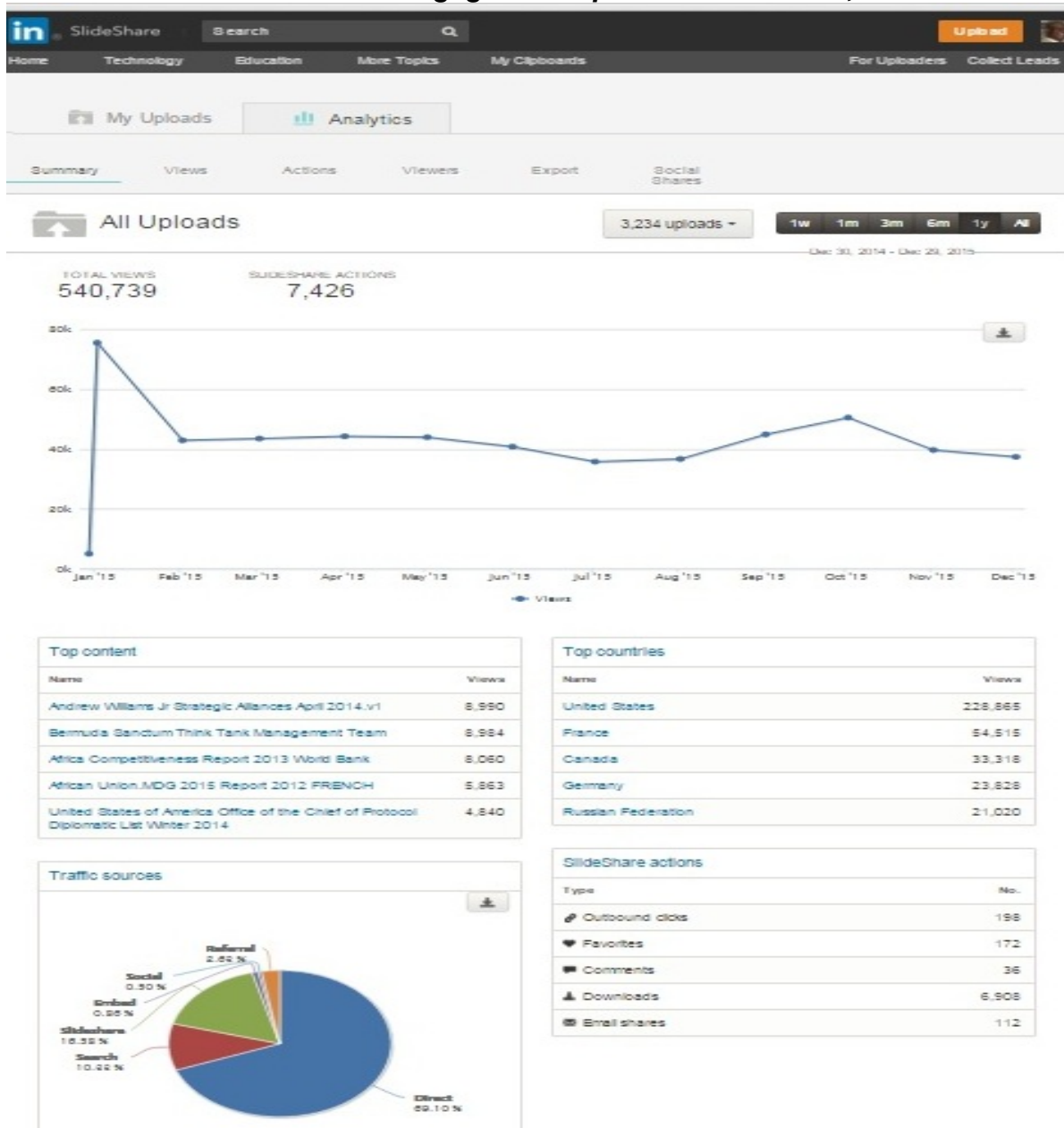
