FXB India Suraksha (FXBIS) is a not for profit organisation, focused to provide developmental assistance to marginalized children, families and communities in rural and urban India. FXBIS works to reduce vulnerabilities in context with poverty, health, education, and security.

With the vision to see an India in which children and communities lead self-reliant and empowered lives FXBIS aims to ensure that every child achieves her/ his potential in a healthy, poverty free and protective environment.

Today FXBIS works in different pockets across 15 Indian states and Union Territories and reaches out to over 2,00,000 people through its community based multi-sectoral programmes and interventions.

To ensure that every child achieves her/his potential in a healthy, poverty free and protective environment and with this goal, FXBIS works in four programme domains:



### Poverty and Livelihood-

## Review of the year

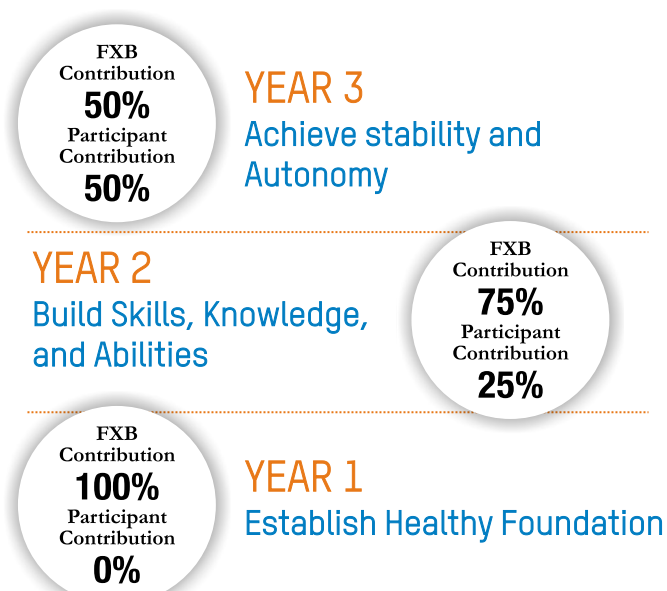


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## A solution to eradicate extreme poverty - The FXBVillage model

To address poverty and help gain economic self sustainability, FXB India Suraksha focuses on empowering families from the most disadvantaged and vulnerable communities and social groups. The pioneering FXBVillage model, conceived by FXB International, has lifted more than 12,000 families out of poverty through 162 FXBVillage programmes and currently operates 30 FXBVillages with 2 in Burundi, 4 in China, 2 in Colombia, 2 in India, 18 in Rwanda, and 2 in Uganda. The FXBVillage programme is a holistic, integrated solution which delivers investment in the long-term wellbeing of families and communities.

The FXBVillage model is a sustainable and community-based solution that aims to deliver long-term improvements and give economic opportunity to children and families in need. In India, FXBVillage brings improvements in healthcare, education, and economic opportunity. The aim is to reduce vulnerability by equipping individuals with training and resources, so that they can achieve lasting self-sufficiency and stability. FXBVillage successfully completed its three years in Uppada village of Andhra Pradesh. It touched lives of 455 people in 102 families by enabling them towards leading healthy and productive lives by improving their health, education



and economic opportunities. A total of 580 direct & indirect beneficiaries are benefitted through FXBVillage in East Imphal of Manipur. The second FXBVillage III in East Imphal has entered the second year and extended the care and supports to another 50 core beneficiaries. In Tamil Nadu a total of 2,665 beneficiaries (direct & indirect) are benefitted through FXBVillage in Villupuram district of Tamil Nadu. **We helped over 4,000 people rose above the poverty line and are self-sufficient today.**

**U**pasana (name changed) and her family were identified by FXB India Suraksha to be enrolled as one of the core participating beneficiary of FXBVillage III in Imphal East. She is a widow and is living with HIV. She runs a small tea stall adjacent to her house to feed herself and her two sons. The younger son is 13 years old and studies in VIII standard. Her husband died in 2008 due to AIDS. Soon after, she was also found to be infected by HIV. Whatever she earns from her tea stall was not enough to run her family. "FXBVillage programme is the life saver for me and my children" says Upasana. Through the integrated FXBVillage programme, the family is provided with regular nutrition diet, partial school fee support and health care for the upliftment of their lives.

## Poverty & Livelihood

**F**XBIS works on socio-economically empowering families and especially women from the most disadvantaged and vulnerable communities and social groups. The Poverty and Livelihood Strategy aims to establish skill-based employment opportunities for women and build up individual and community-based capacities to run and grow the business in the long run. FXBIS' envisioned impact of its livelihood programmes is the overall improvement of living standards and the emergence of economically self-reliant families where women play an active and coequal role.

Through awareness generation campaigns FXBIS aims to sensitize communities to letting women join the economically active part of society and allowing them to be financially independent. To enable families to reach sustainable socio-economic autonomy which ensures the well-being of the families and especially the children individual or group-based, Income Generation Activities (IGA) are initiated within the communities. To establish and strengthen suitable community-owned institutions capable of running enterprises in the long term, livelihood skill enhancement programmes focused on developing local capacities and entrepreneurial abilities through vocational training programs are initiated.

In Vishakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh, there are 90 HIV AIDS infected/affected women in cooperative, showing increased and active participation as entrepreneurs is commendable. They have been provided with revolving funds and loans through the cooperative. With the support from Cairn India, FXB India Suraksha is working towards promoting sustainable livelihoods in seven habitations in S. Yanam village in East Godavari district of Andhra Pradesh. 13 self help groups with 150 women were formed and trained in incense sticks making, mushroom cultivation, broom making, & chalk piece making. Seven clusters of brooms sticks suppliers are formed from within the community, which nurtures about 80 poor households as raw material suppliers of the broom units and benefiting them financially.

From the north eastern part of India in East Imphal in Manipur, two self help groups with 31 HIV AIDS (infected/affected) members have now entered the successful production and real income generation phase as the products from the loom weaving and kauna (water reed crafts) have been linked to larger markets.

In Villupuram, Tamil Nadu, around 40 women entrepreneurs are involved in nine different



enterprises (coir rope making, sanitary napkin making & poultry farming, mini-eateries, retail shops, phenol making etc.) through three groups and have become economically independent. The sanitary napkin making unit is running successfully with bulk orders from the local dealers, is motivating for the entrepreneurs.

As part of life skill development programme in Noida, Uttar Pradesh, more than 10 adolescent girls from the slum have started going to the vocational training centre with many more expected to join them.

In four villages in Bilaspur, Chhattisgarh, FXBIS implemented an integrated development project with support from Lafarge, and by forming and strengthening nine self help groups for women. The 150 group members were trained and engaged in incense sticks making, spices packaging, mushroom cultivation & tailoring.

We helped over 500 women turn entrepreneurs by equipping them with livelihood skills which helped them become self-reliant. With the target of overall improvement of living standards and the emergence of economically self-reliant families, FXBIS marches ahead to create a sustainable environment for the community.



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Anbu lives in Mathur periyar colony of Tamil Nadu. Her husband was an assistant to Village Administration Officer (VAO). Unfortunately he met with an accident and is now surviving severe neurologic problems. As a result he lost his job and the family started to face financial crisis. "FXBIS helped me in joining the three member group to run an eatery with a sitting space for the customers in the IGA campus. We are able to earn about Rs.600-700/- every day as a group and three of us shares the profit while the seed capital money is rotated. I am now able to support my family financially. My sincere thanks to FXBIS for their kind help" says Anbu.

## Child Rights and Protection

An integral part of all FXBIS programmes is to prevent and reduce all forms of violence and insecurity within its intervention geography. The ultimate objective is to create a safe, secure and protective environment for children. The FXBIS Child Rights and Protection Strategy aims to prevent violence through awareness campaigns and stakeholder sensitization, response to cases of violence through rapid intervention, and promote rehabilitation through proper referral and after care. FXBIS holds the vast experience in implementing interventions at grass roots on preventing gender based violence and human trafficking.

More than 500 children in distress were rescued and provided support through 24X7 child helpline number 1098. India's first 24 hours service for children, initiated by CHILDLINE and supported by the Ministry of Women and Child Development. FXBIS is the collaborative partner in Gautam Budh Nagar district of Uttar Pradesh.

As Suraksha Programme on preventing trafficking at source in Jharkhand (supported by UN Women) completed a year, a village head, from Hurua village of Jharkhand in Ranchi helped nab a trafficker named Pinto, as he was trying to take a few adolescent girls out

### A dream fulfilled

Payal is a bright girl who loved going to school. She is inquisitive, outspoken & participated in all school activities. However her parents were finding it difficult to pay for her education. Working as a rickshaw puller, her father knew education was important, but there were also other necessary expenses to take care of a growing family.

Payal was on the verge of quitting her studies when FXBIS met her and got her admitted in the 'Suraksha Education Center' for deprived children running in Noida in Uttar Pradesh thus allowing her to continue her studies.

Today the twelve year old is doing very well in studies and wants to become a doctor.



of the city illegally. This is an exemplary example of the impact of the Suraksha Programme.

In Jaipur in Rajasthan, the Day Care Centre continues to provide a safe space for around 30 railway platform children during the day, drawing them away from the hazards of the platform. Regular counseling sessions, recreational activities are held as most of them are facing stress due to the insecure environment on the platform. FXBIS has been running the child assistance booth at Jaipur Railway Station which provides guidance and counseling to the children, to prevent and protect them from drug abuse, sexual and physical harassment, HIV/AIDS, and indulge in anti-social or criminal activities and referring children to government run or recognized institutions for care and support. In the last year, nine children have availed the facility of the Child Assistance Booth. FXBIS along with Anti Human Trafficking Unit, Jaipur, rescued 41 children between 8 - 17 years who were working as child labourer. We helped create a protective space for over 500 children & adolescents directly by reducing all forms of violence and insecurity.







## Improved Health Status

**F**XBIS is dedicated to address health vulnerabilities within its intervention geographies. The target is to significantly decrease communicable and vector borne diseases as well as infant, maternal and child mortality rates. To do so, through its intensive Behavioural Change Communication (BCC) campaigns, FXBIS aims to enlighten children, families and communities about issues concerning health and hygiene and facilitate access to quality health services, clean water and sanitation facilities. By arranging regular health camps & facilitating access to improved water and sanitation facilities FXBIS aims to promote health seeking behaviour within the marginalized communities. Providing care and support for people living with HIV/AIDS (PLHA) is an integral part of the FXBIS Health Strategy.

In East & West Imphal of Manipur, comprehensive medical care and support to more than 350 people were provided, which included core beneficiaries and other non core family members.

100% of households, reported to have access to health care facilities, with 734 individuals attended health or hygiene training sessions on a regular basis. Nutritional support was also given to all the 33 core participating families with 184 individuals participating in nutrition/diet training sessions regularly. Understanding the need to build strong

linkages between communities and the official government health system, FXBIS in Manipur has built up linkages and effective referral partnerships with government run facilities.

In Visakhapatnam, Andhra Pradesh, FXBIS is running community based comprehensive health care clinic for 101 HIV affected families with 302 PLHAs showing remarkable improvement in their health status. FXBIS provided dry nutrition kits as supplementary nutrition support for 83 PLHIV families and comprehensive nutrition support to eight households where the aged grandparents are taking care of PLHIV children.

As part of the BCC campaigns, 469 people were sensitized about the issues of safe drinking water and toilet usage through awareness generation camps in Jaisalmer, Rajasthan. 75 health camps were organised which benefitted more than 4,000 people especially women and children and nutritional support to more than 4,500 children from the marginalized communities were provided in the form of fruits & diet biscuits.

As a result of the awareness generation camps targeted to the school children of the FXBIS intervention community, in Tamil Nadu children have started practicing personal hygiene. Apart from that, more than 100 people were sensitized towards





health related issues through awareness generation camps. New 30 community kitchen gardens were built, providing green leafy vegetables to the families & women are happy about providing nutritious leafy vegetables to their families daily. In Mathur Periya colony of Villupuram district, household toilets have been constructed and mobilized households to use the toilets willingly. Through group & individual counseling sessions, around 80 participants were provided with psychological support.

FXBIS organized Health Camps in its programme communities in Noida Slum, Uttar Pradesh, which provided medical assistance to over 200 people. As

**P**avani, a class 8th student at FXB India Suraksha (FXBIS) 'Suraksha Education Center' is the only daughter of Narasamma and Pydiraju from a Dalits colony in Uppada village of Visakhapatnam district of Andhra Pradesh. During one of the home visits when FXBIS was implementing intensive program to promote construction of toilets in the village Pavani shared, "Every household needs a toilet. We have to go very far, out into the open, to defecate". "But we don't have money to construct one", added Pydiraju, pavani's mother.

But later as a result of various communication programs and incentives offered for children to adopt safe WATSAN and hygiene behaviours, Pavani was the first child to respond to this campaign and took the responsibility to bring the change in the society she lives in. She decided to start the revolution from her home, and left no stone unturned to initiate the construction of toilet by her parents. She used all the methods, starting from the health benefits of preventing open defecation to demand of toilet for privacy and linked with how much they care for her. Initially her parents did not listen to her and she went on a day fast. As a result, Pavani's parents came forward and with all the support from FXBIS and a loan from the Self Help Group, they have a toilet in her home now.

part of its slum intervention programme in Noida, FXBIS reached out to over 4000 households by facilitating access to improved water and sanitation facilities.

As part of the medical & nutritional support to the 'Railway platform Children' in Jaipur, Rajasthan, FXBIS provided medical assistance to children in distress along with establishing linkages with local hotels providing regular meals for more than 20 marginalized children coming to the center.

Around 135 children in the FXBIS Day Care Centre in Mizoram are being provided with nutritional support. The Short Stay Center in Mizoram provided counseling and health care services to over 50 PLHAs from rural areas. In Mizoram, FXBIS has been implementing MSM (men who have sex with men) Target Intervention project since 2008. To promote safe sex, condoms were distributed to 5490 beneficiaries and 31 attended regular medical check-up and 22 availed the counseling services.

In the Vihaan Programme, FXB India Suraksha works in six north eastern states namely; Assam, Tripura, Mizoram, Arunachal, Sikkim and Meghalaya and has reached out to more than 4000 PLHIVs. With the key objective to improve the survival and quality of life of people living with HIV/AIDS by scaling up Care, Support & Treatment Services for the community the programme aims to establish and run 350 Care & Support Centres (CSCs) in 31 States as part of the national effort to improve treatment outcomes and meet the needs of the PLHIV - including high-risk groups, woman and children over a period of three years. The program intends to increase treatment adherence, improve quality of life for PLHIV, and mitigate the impact of the epidemic in India. **FXBIS has address health vulnerabilities of over 17,000 people directly & indirectly and facilitated access to quality health services, clean water and sanitation facilities.**

## Access to quality education

A key focus of all FXBIS programmes is to ensure access to primary and secondary level education for every child within its intervention geography. The FXBIS Education Strategy aims to raise awareness about the importance of education and enhance access to and the quality of education. FXBIS' envisioned impact are well educated, confident, productive and socially responsible children and youth.

Through its awareness and mobilization campaigns FXBIS generates recognition for the necessity and importance of education within the community in general and among parents in particular. FXBIS supports the most vulnerable and marginalized families within its intervention geography by linking them with relevant government education schemes, and the families affected by HIV AIDS, are benefitted by 'Suraksha Scholarship Programme'. FXBIS runs several Suraksha Education Centres at different locations across India which provides supplementary support to children through non-formal education and tuition classes. FXBIS Computer Literacy Centres equip children and youth with access to and knowledge about modern technology. Through 'Women Adult Literacy Classes' FXBIS aims to empower women and increase their self-esteem and knowledge base. Non-formal

education programmes, such as 'Life Skill Workshops' and vocational training courses expand the skill sets of adolescents and women allowing them to be well-equipped, self-confident and productive members of their communities.

The Suraksha Education Centre running in Kodeli village of Paderu has benefitted 30 children from poor tribal families. A village library was established to promote reading habit among the local youth.

In the participating communities in Villupuram in Tamil Nadu, FXBIS efforts led to almost 100% school attendance, followed by good results in primary & high schools and no school dropout. More than 50 children are benefitted through school supplies and the Suraksha Education Center. The performance of the students has improved and 15 children from village are computer literates now.

In order to address the issues of school dropouts and to create educational interest among children, three Suraksha Education Centers are running in Dhursar, Rayad & Lawan in Jaisalmer, Rajasthan has





Two exposure trips as part of the non formal education programs were organized in the view of improvement of mental and physical health of the children in Kongpal & Ahallup of east Imphal in Manipur. Over 70 children who attends the 'Suraksha Education Center' participated in the trips lead by volunteers, care givers and FXBIS team members. Prakriti, one of the participants says, "These exposure visits are not helping us come close to the nature but also gives a strong feeling of togetherness amongst the infected and affected".

With a belief that such initiatives are vital and instrumental in reducing the degree of stigma and discrimination, FXBIS envisioned impact are well educated, confident, productive and socially responsible children and youth.

benefitted more than 200 children. These children are also benefitted through educational materials like books, notebooks, pen pencils, school bag, uniforms, etc. It has been observed that centres at reachable distance with friendly teaching have not only increased the educational interest among children but also among family members and community. In addition, around 50 children were mainstreamed to school. A computer training center running in Lawan village of Jaisalmer, has benefitted 80 children and youths. For the awareness generation about the social issues and community mobilization, youth groups and adolescent groups were formed in the villages.

In Jaipur, Rajasthan, 22 children living at the railway station got admission in school. In Noida, Uttar Pradesh, slum 45 non-school going children were admitted in the schools, with 15 of them being supported by providing school uniform.

In East & West Imphal, Manipur, Suraksha Education centers provided support classes to around 200 children. FXBIS managed to mainstream 4 children into school and provided educational support in form of school fees, uniforms and study materials to 95 children. FXBIS helped provide access to quality education to over 700 children.

## Events & Campaigns

**F**XBIS aim to reach out to the vulnerable and marginalised. With the help and support of the community, FXBIS is able to plan long-term, sustainable interventions to save lives by reaching out to the masses. Through the events & campaigns alone, FXBIS has reached out to around 4,000 people:

- **ChildInMe** - A campaign kick-started to raise voices for securing Child Rights. With the launch of the initiative - #ChildInMe : Speak up for Child rights, on Children's Day, FXBIS believes that with increased awareness and support, together we can help restore lost the childhood of many innocent lives.
- **World AIDS Orphans Day** was observed in different parts of the country - To draw attention and advocate on behalf of millions of children orphaned by AIDS, President and Founder of FXB (François-Xavier Bagnoud) Countess Albina du Boisrouvray, initiated the campaign in 2002. Around 500 children participated.
- **IN FXB India Suraksha**, we believe 'Every day is Children's day' - Around 1,500 children from various pockets of country celebrated their day with fun and frolic as they engaged in varied activities on Children's Day.





- A district consultation on child marriage was organized on National Girl Child Day - To mark the National Girl Child Day which is celebrated every year on 24th of January as a national observance day for the girl child, FXB India Suraksha and Independent Thought conducted the consultation to address the issue of the prevalent practice of child marriage.
- 'Give Her Wings, and She Will Fly': FXB India Suraksha celebrated the power of women on International Women's Day. With around 1,000 women & children FXBIS hosted a series of events under the theme 'Make it Happen'.
- Global Handwashing Day, committed towards spreading awareness around the importance of hand hygiene amongst children, FXB India Suraksha, celebrated by engaging with children in different pockets of India and teaching them simple steps of hand washing and the need to do so. Around 300 children from FXBIS education centers across different pockets in India participated in the campaign and helped spread awareness on the importance of 'Clean Hands - Clean India'.

If you spot any child labour near you, get in contact with the child, and then call 1098 — the Childline. It is India's first 24-hour free emergency phone service for children in need of assistance. This is a central government programme working under Integrated Child Protection Scheme.

**INDIA/GREATER NOIDA:** The Gautam Buddha Nagar administration has failed to dispose of as many as 80 cases of child labour in the district over the past year. 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### 8-yr-old 'abducted', kept as domestic help for 5yrs

An eight-year-old boy was rescued by the Noida police on Sunday from a flat in 20 where he had been forced to work as a domestic help for five years.

It was also found that the couple, who had been keeping him in their home, had the boy on a road in 2009 and kept him captive ever since.

FXB India Suraksha, an NGO that works to end violence against children, was tipped off about the child's circumstance after being tipped off that the boy, Shiva, a real child of the couple — identified as Narutani and his wife — with whom he lived in Nithari village.

"Locals confirmed Shiva was brought by Narutani five years back when he four lost near Nithari crossroads in a school uniform," NGO programme manager Satish Prakash said.

The NGO informed the police and a joint raid was conducted to rescue the boy who showed signs of physical abuse. "The child has some minor bruises on his body," he said.
