## Implementing the ten principles into strategies and operations

The Pick n Pay Group remains committed to upholding the highest standards of ethics, transparency and good governance, while pursuing sustainable and profitable growth. Our Board takes overall responsibility for the performance of the Group.

The Board is supported by the audit and risk, corporate finance, corporate governance, nominations, remuneration and social and ethics committees to carry out its oversight role of ensuring that the activities of the Group are managed in a manner that is consistent with the values of the Group.

The Social and Ethics Committee oversees the monitoring, assessment and measurement of the Group's activities in relation to ethics and code of conduct compliance; environmental, social and governance (ESG) issues (including human rights, corruption, employment equity and transformation); and social and economic development. The committee relies on management for the implementation of strategies and initiatives. (For more information, please refer to our Sustainable Living Report pg 17).

Our process of identifying and reviewing our material sustainability issues involves an internal risk management process and considers the interests and concerns of our stakeholders. We see our sustainable living strategy as inextricably linked to our business strategy, shaping our thinking and actions in two broad areas:

- Ensuring that we become a more resilient business in the face of increasing environmental and
  related pressures both in the short term (e.g. fuel and electricity price increases) and in the
  longer term (e.g. food and water security linked to climate change).
- Seeking to add more value to society by helping our customers, suppliers and other stakeholders meet sustainability challenges and opportunities.
