Recently, Reem volunteered to update our electronic newsletter. Speaking as a close friend and a brother, this is a proud moment. But, I believe that you will be equally excited from your perspective as a member or volunteer, as you learn of Reem's experience as former CEO with World Links of the World Bank and her other activities. FIRST KADUNA STATE MEDICAL MISSION

Our first mission this year took place in Kaduna, Dr Quartemont led the team. PROFOH collaborated with our long standing partner Medical mission International on this mission. We are glad to inform you that the mission was successful as over 200 patients benefited from the intervention. The mission was in collaboration with a faith-based group called Mercy Orphanage Clinic, Rev. Tunde Bolanta the general overseer of Restoration Ministry and host of the team was handy daily to see to the smooth running of the facility. A beneficiary of the surgical out reach, Mrs Ese Amakiri who had a case of fibroid expressed her gratitude to the both organizations and Dr. Quartemont." I was earlier diagnosed with fibroid but due to the high cost of medical health care in Nigeria we just couldn't afford the cost of a surgery, to see a group of highly trained professionals come here and carry out this same operation for free is beyond words. my prayer is for God to keep strengthening the group. Another beneficiary ,Mrs Mercy Ayodele who had suffered from fibroid and ovarian cyst expressed her joy after her successful surgery "I have never seen such grace and professionalism from doctors like this before, the love they radiates while working on you is more than a million bucks and to know these are done for free is unbelievable. The doctors congratulated me after the surgery and said I should expect the best. I thank PROFOH for giving me hope at this point in my life when I had lost it. May God continue to replenish their efforts." For almost two week the mission lasted before the team moved to Port Harcourt ,location was New Mile I Hospital were about 50 patients were seen clinically and several surgeries performed.

SECOND KADUNA MEDICAL MISSION

Kaduna North clinical medical mission took place on the 29 Feb, sponsored by Senator Suleiman Othman Hunkuyi, the Senator representing Kaduna North Senatorial District of Kaduna State. The Senatorial Zone comprises of eight (8) Local Government Areas namely; Lere, Kubau, Ikara, Makarfi, Kudan, Sabon Gari, Zaria and Soba.. The mission was led by Dr. Marcie Russell, she expressed gratitude to the Senator, our Chief Host, the Executive Governor of Kaduna State Malam Nasir Ahmed El-Rufai and all the wonderful people for their support. They made this particular mission one of PROFOH best in recent years. The mission was conducted at State Government owned health facilities in the eight LGAs of the senatorial zone which lasted for three weeks. At the end of the exercise 10, 987 patients benefited. Similarly 3,019 patients with optical challenges shall be issued with glasses freely. Thousands of patients with complex surgical cases were penciled down for surgical operation schedule for June/July next year. The surgical mission will be carried out by several partners from the Netherlands, Egypt and the United States, the focus shall be in surgery, currently the Kaduna Government is renovating some of the hospitals to be used for the mission .It is also important and gratifying to know that the Ahmadu Bello University Teaching Hospital has officially approved of request of collaboration for the project. The University is the largest in Northern part of Nigeria as it covers about 19 states of Nigeria's 36 states. Our organization had a training session for students in the Kaduna School of Nursing.

THIRD KADUNA MEDICAL MISSION

Dr. Quartemont led a team of Six for 2-weeks joint mission trip in Kaduna- Nigeria with 3 medical students from Atlanta and 1 from Bryan, TX. First time in Nigeria, Africa for that matter, they saw a different Nigeria –very different from the stereotypes by the international media. "Their eyes were opened," with many new sights & experiences in this amazing country. The team initially arrived in the capital city of Abuja. We were unable to do any medical outreaches in Abuja as planned, but made a good contact for future outreaches. We then travelled to Kaduna by road in a minivan with 16 pieces of luggage (primarily consisting of medical supplies), that we had strapped to the roof, maxing out the vans weight capacity. We literally prayed our way on this 2-1/2 hour journey, and God was with the team as they arrived without incident. We were welcomed to Kaduna by Pastors Tunde and Tina Bolanta. The mission was designed for the Kaduna North District of Senator Hunkiyi but fails to commence. Consequent upon our arrival the next day we commenced surgery at Mercy Angels Hospital and Mercy Home Orphanage, where we addressed many pre-surgery issues before the surgical cases were dealt with. By and large 28 surgeries were performed with the assistance of 3 other Nigerian doctors. However, hundreds of patients benefited from clinical consultations and treatments.

FOURTH MEDICAL MISSION-HONDURAS

Professionals For Humanity (PROFOH) is proud to part of the group that conducted a clinical and social mission in Honduras in Central America and was even prouder that our very own Board member, Dr. Conrado Ordonez, was a leading member of the team. Dr. Conrado is a dedicated family medicine practitioner. The mission covered a one-week period. It involved minor surgeries, out-patient consultations and treatments including some low level training of local health workers. There was also other aspect of education and distribution of several gifts items to the community where several local experts also assisted the team. Over 100 persons were direct beneficiaries. Plans are in advanced stage for the next medical mission in Honduras for next year. The Chair and the entire Board express their profound gratitude to Dr. Conrado for flying the flag of PROFOH in South America; he is also working on plans for the next mission in Ghana. Dr. Conrado has also represented PROFOH at the World Bank/IMF meetings in Washington, DC in addition to conducting several medical missions in Africa

BRIAN CAMAZINE MEDICAL MISSION TRIPS TO NIGERIA

Dr Brian Camazine, President ESF and Board member PROFOH, made several mission trips to NCH Nigeria. During the year, 5 eventful trips, dozens of Nigerian upper level healthcare workers participated, and they acquired valuable experience and exposure to handle complex surgical cases. Nigeria Christian Hospital, Aba South –East of Nigeria has been a medical Mecca for doctors, nurses, healthcare workers and medical students, including senior consultants from government-owned medical facilities. This aspect of the trip is quite unique and Dr. Camazine is very proud to get such a strong local participation. The mandate of ESF is also provide education and manpower development. Over 5000 patients were treated and more than 550 difficult surgeries performed. The next medical mission from him is schedule to take place in January next year, He has graciously agreed to repeat history with our organization -joint medical mission between PROFOH and ESF ,exactly what we did in Ogoniland in 2013 where we broke our records, by performing 25 bold surgeries in one single day.. The Chair and the entire Board express their profound gratitude to Dr. Camazine for his amazing dedication and call on members of PROFOH to support and donate to ESF as both organizations are strategic partners; Please find the list of his trips to NCH during the year.

MISSION TRIPS

1. **On 1/2/16,** Dr. Camazine returned to the Nigerian Christian Hospital for a mission trip. During this 4 week trip, 10 Nigerian upper level healthcare workers participated including Drs. Jombo, Acho, Enyinnah, Akunekwe, Akpanudo, Madu, Nkeonye, Ifeanyi, Oje and Nurse Anesthetists, Wilson, Uruakpa and Oje. Many nursing, medical and nurse anesthetist students were also present. Over 750 patients were treated and 150 operations performed. All members of the team

were Nigerians except Dr. Camazine. This aspect of the trip is quite unique and we were very proud to get such a strong local participation.

- 2. **On 3/23/16,** Dr. Camazine returned to the Nigerian Christian Hospital for a mission trip. During this 4 week trip, 11 Nigerian upper level healthcare workers participated including Drs. Jombo, Acho, Enyinnah, Akunekwe, Akpanudo, Madu, Nottidge, Oje and Nurse Anesthetists, Wilson, Uruakpa and Oje. Many nursing, medical and nurse anesthetist students were also present. Over 700 patients were treated and 147 operations performed. All members of the team were Nigerians except Dr. Camazine.
- 3. **On 5/29/16,** Dr. Camazine returned to the Nigerian Christian Hospital for a mission trip. During this 4 week trip, 13 Nigerian upper level healthcare workers participated including Drs. Jombo, Dabs, Acho, Enyinnah, Akunekwe, Akpanudo, Madu, Unaka, Chidi, Nottidge, Oje and Nurse Anesthetists, Wilson, Uruakpa and Oje. General surgery residents from Federal Medical Center, Uhmaiha (Drs. Okpokiri, Chukwu, Nnana) started official 3 month rotations at the Nigerian Christian Hospital in order to get exposure to complex cases. Many nursing, medical and nurse anesthetist students were also present. Over 700 patients were treated and 121 operations performed.
- 4. **On 8/10/16,** Dr. Camazine returned to the Nigerian Christian Hospital for a mission trip. During this 5 week trip, 13 Nigerian upper level healthcare workers participated including Drs. Jombo, Dabs, Acho, Akunekwe, Akpanudo, Madu, Nottidge, Oje and Nurse Anesthetists, Wilson, Uruakpa and Oje. General surgery residents from Federal Medical Center, Uhmaiha (Drs. Imahigbe, Udemezue and Orgi) came to get exposure to complex cases. Many nursing and medical students were also present. Over 700 patients were treated and 138 operations performed.
- 5. **On 11/1/16,** Dr. Camazine returned to the Nigerian Christian Hospital for 4 weeks. During this 4 week trip, 13 Nigerian upper level healthcare workers participated including Drs. Jombo, Dabs, Acho, Akunekwe, Akpanudo, Madu, Nottidge, Oje and Nurse Anesthetists, Wilson, Uruakpa and Oje. General surgery residents from Federal Medical Center, Uhmaiha (Drs. Imahigbe, Udemezue and Orgi) came to get exposure to complex cases. Many nursing and medical students were also present. Over 700 patients were treated and 138 operations performed. This trip all the pathology was performed locally by Chidi Onwuka. MD, at Surepath Pathology Consultants.

EDUCATION

Our organization is a member of several international groups promoting and advancing quality education globally, including International Network for Education in Emergencies, which has inspired our education interventions during our medical missions, in the past, we have offered several scholarships and provided writing desks to public school in Nigeria. In February, we conducted two medical mission in Kaduna concurrently, one was more surgical while the other was clinical, the second mission was designed to accommodate teaching and training for young nurses at the Kaduna School of Nursing and midwives the state government expressed gratitude to our team for the excellent intervention and requested we come back next year for another round of training .Additionally, we have the **Girl Child Education Project** currently going in some high schools in two selected states –Delta and Ogun, subject to funding we shall expand the program to five educational disadvantaged states ,this program support only female students who are very smart academically but are in danger of dropping due to(Poverty) financial burden. PROFOH Nepal is still running our rebuilding educational opportunities for kids heavily impacted by the earthquake. These ongoing emergency education programs include the award scholarship to several kids -Mandira Rimal. from Dhading district, Nepal was among the first beneficiaries- According to PROFOH's Country Director ,more and more people are signing up to be members of the organization, she sincerely appeal to the Board to support PROFOH Nepal.

WATER

PROFOH MARKED WORLD WATER DAY

PROFOH is a member of the United Nations Water Mandate headquartered in Sweden thus have participated in several online activities of the agency. Water Mandate is working round the clock to ensure effective Water governance and global access to millions of people-its ironic that water covers over 70% of earth surface, yet nearly a billion people do not have access to this most important liquid to human. According to the United Nations over 700 million people around the world do not have access. In spite of remarkable progress of access to improved drinking water since 1990s, significant disparities persist, 90 per cent live in rural areas, and are being left behind in their countries progress. For children, lack of access to safe water can be tragic. On average, nearly 1,000 of them die every day from diarrhoeal diseases linked to unsafe drinking water, poor sanitation, or poor hygiene. For women and girls, collecting water cuts into time they can spend caring for families and studying. In insecure areas, it also puts them at risk of violence, rape and attack. UNICEF estimates that in Africa alone, people spend 40 billion hours every year just walking to collect water. Building on a successful roll-out last year, UNICEF and partners are again this year engaging the public in a social media campaign to help raise awareness. Our organization issued a Press Statement to mark the day.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR

PROFOH MARKED WORLD TB DAY WITH HIGH LEVEL ADVOCACY CAMPAIGN

PROFOH is a leading member of WHO STOP TB Partnership. TB is a disease of poverty, it spreads like wildfire through places where nutrition is poor, living conditions are overcrowded, and treatment doesn't exist—infecting and killing millions of people in the poor nations where we work. Last year we promised to do better, with all sense of modesty, we did much better in terms of turn out and participants. Drug —resistant TB has been a major concern to our organization. With other stakeholders, ministry of health, private sector and groups. We had a huge walk over 3000 activists, government ministry, banks .telecommunication firms ,etc to raise awareness in Port Harcourt, Rivers State Nigeria , where PROFOH also Chair the TB network of the State with over 30 different organizations as members. We're aiming at helping many more patients with tuberculosis get access to TB drugs. To mark the day, PROFOH also issued a press statement. Special thanks to Mrs. Gift Akoma of DOLF, PROFOH partner organization and Mr. Muzan Messiah, our coordinator for South-South of Nigeria and Chair TB network for the superb work he did in putting the all —important event together.

PROFOH CONGRATULATES A NIGERIAN SURGEON FOR MIRACLE SURGERY

A Nigerian surgeon Dr. Oluyinka Olutoye and his partner Dr. Darrell Cass of the Texas Children's Hospital, carried out the operation on 23-week —old foetus in the United States. The baby Lynlee Hope, who suffered from a tumor known as Sacrococcygeal Teratoma was removed from her mother's womb, operated on and returned to the womb. The baby got healed and continues to grow until she was finally delivered at the 36 weeks. The Doctor explained that the tumor is trying to grow by sucking blood from the baby, yet the baby is also trying to grow too, so it becomes a competition inside the womb. And in some instances, the tumor wins and the heart just cannot keep up and the heart goes into failure resulting to death. In this case, with a large tumor stealing the blood supply, the fetus was becoming more ill each day, doctors explained to the expectant mother, something has to be done because at 23 weeks the tumor was shutting her heart down and causing her to go into cardiac failure, so it was a choice of allowing the tumor to take over her body or giving her a chance at life. It was not an easy decision for us; we wanted to give her life. She was 23 weeks and 5 days pregnant, when the team of Dr Olutoye and Cass performed the emergency fetal surgery, by this time, the tumor was nearly larger than the fetus. They operated for five hours. Most of the was spent opening the uterus, which was described by the doctor as a big muscle line with membranes, we do not want the

mom's health to be jeopardized, they work carefully ,making the incision and sewing it up in order . He credits the heart specialist, a key member of the team for giving the right medication and transfusing the right amount of fluid, allowing the surgeons to continue their work. When they finished their operation, the surgeons place Lynlee back inside the womb and sewed her mother's uterus. It's a kind of a miracle you're able to open the uterus like that and seal it all back and the whole thing works. Boemer Mother was on bed rest for the reminder of her pregnancy for another 12 weeks to nearly 36 weeks-full term-When Lynlee Hope was born for the second time via C-section on June 6, She weighed 5 pounds and 5 ounces.

PROFOH INCORPORATED IN IRELAND

The Board of Directors expressed their profound gratitude to the Irish Country Director Mr. Olayinka Ajiboye and his team in Dublin. Our organization was certified on Wednesday 16th March 2016 by the registrar of companies in Dublin. The PROFOH headquarters is in capital Dublin. Ajiboye has worked tirelessly since 2014 on the incorporation in that great country. We wish to gently remind all directors and members, particularly those in United States, where the giving is more established, to intensify fund raising efforts to support our new chapter. As part efforts to hit the ground running PROFOH Ireland has indicated interest in the Partnerships for Global Health Africa Grants Programme (AGP) project that supports the training of health workers in lowand middle-income countries. The project is funded by Johnson and Johnson, the AGP engages partnerships between organization in the UK and Ireland, and their counterparts in Africa. The long-term aims of the AGP are to save and improve the lives of women and children, prevent disease in vulnerable populations and strengthen the healthcare workforce in Africa. The AGP will support projects that mobilise UK and Irish health workers to develop the capacity of health workers in Africa through skills transfer, training, mentoring and other collaborative work. The funding will support projects designed to improve the standards of clinical training (at all education levels), the technical skills of staff, or the efficiency and capacity within healthcare systems. PROFOH SIGNED SEVERAL MOUS

As a member of several international bodies including the United Nations Global Compact one of our objectives is to seek viable partnerships and collaborations, I am glad to report that 2016 was not record breaking year for us, but record smashing for our organization, we signed four MOUs and three others groups are in various level of discussions, The MOUs include the private/corporate and development sector.

The group shall be creating a data base of health care professionals, operate within PROFOH's guidelines and rule of engagements to solicit, screen and schedule such professionals. In addition to creating the above-mentioned data base, Jan's Haven shall source and submit to our organization, potential opportunities for missions within the Caribbean. This Medical Mission will be coordinated with our organization as a part of PROFOH's ongoing global humanitarian outreach. PROFOH – shall set up missions and extent relationships with Universities and Hospitals to Jan's Haven in order to infuse educational development and job placement for the qualified participants. The Foundation will design initiatives and events to collectively fundraise to support PROFOH approved projects in the Caribbean. Our joint efforts will also increase the visibility of PROFOH in areas that will improve PROFOH's international fundraising efforts.

The Third MOU was with **Inner Mongolia Kangjia Tech Company Limited** with its headquarters in Hohhot near Beijing China. The company produced high quality medical instruments, apparatus, public health equipments, etc, with very impressive profile as it has exported products and services to the US, Japan the EU and several African countries. The purpose of our partnership was to provide PROFOH with financial and material support to enable it render its humanitarian services in line with the Firm Corporate Social Responsibility policy, our organization shall introduce the company brand to our partners ministries of health in the countries where we operates.
