Part III. Measurement of Outcomes

- *Implement the UN Global Compact's Ten Principles through our strategy and operations:* Child Legacy's mission defends the rights of populations most often overlooked by society by working in rural, hard-to-reach areas that are densely populated. In the two year reporting period, Child Legacy provided *free* access to clean water to over 1.8 million rural Malawians, provided free, high-quality healthcare to over 120,000 rural people in Malawi and Zimbabwe, provided free, organic, meals with high nutrition content to over 5,000 people, employed over 200 rural women and men in the fields of healthcare, administration, well repairs, vocational training and sustainable agriculture. Child Legacy's Malawi campus continues to be a model of Sustainability through its use of 100% renewable energy, reuse of natural waste for composting in our 400-acre gardens and local staple crops, and site-wide recycling of all eligible materials
- *Conduct applied research and thought leadership to advance best practices:* Due to our efforts in applied research and thought leadership, the government of Malawi, through its Ministry of Health and Medical Council, certified Child Legacy Hospital as a national training center for Continuous Professional Development (CPD). This will enable our healthcare team and visiting partners to train the next generations of healthcare workers, administrators, and policy-makers in the best practices that can be implemented locally, nationally, and regionally throughout Sub-Saharan Africa.
- *Promote the UN Global Compact Ten Principles and educate a variety of audiences about sustainability:* (a) Created 12-week internships in Environmental Sustainability and Rural Community Outreach for Health Services for local university students at Child Legacy's Malawi campus — 24 students enrolled in 2017-2018 (b) Child Legacy's Malawi campus hosted delegations from the Malawian government, local and international NGO's, and international embassies (ambassadors from U.S., Germany, etc) to promote Sustainability and consult on how others in the region of Sub-Saharan Africa can replicate the campus' successful sustainability
- *Engage with Global Compact Local Networks:* CEO and Director of Programs registered for 2018 Symposium, with sponsorship imminent.
