Part II. Description of Actions

Actions we have taken include;

- As a member of the UN Global Compact Local Network in Nigeria, we have provided input in the activities and consultations of the local network.
- We encouraged and advocated for greater participation by other non-members of the UN Global compact to register and join the network.
- Support the UN Global compact on Migration through the consultation process.
- To further expand our scope and build accountability, we have registered with the EU Transparency Register. We also be been accepted in the Thomas Reuters Trust Law and Namati, to support the provision of human rights and legal services to people from poor, underserved, and marginalized groups.
- We also have been granted the UN ECOSOC special consultative status in 2018.
- We are active in the policy formulations and consultations with GNDR West Africa.
- Ohaha Family Foundation has been active from MDGs to SDGs, advocating for localization and domestication from words to action.
- Humanitarian response program in Nigeria, Terror in the North East, Farmer/herders conflict in the North central and North West, and responding to natural disasters. Providing essential medicine, healthcare, food and nutrition, protection and NFIs to the affected population.

Part III. Measurement of Outcomes

Measurement of outcomes include:

- I (one) NGO from Ghana registered as an active participants on the UN Global Compact.
- Granted the UN ECOSOC special consultative status in 2018
- Adoption of the UN Global Compact on migration in Morocco, December 2018
- Expanded our program from 4 states to 8 states in Nigeria with human rights, protection, essential medicine, healthcare and NFIs reaching an estimated 7,000 people directly reaching around 15,000 people indirectly people cut-out, marginalized and isolated due to conflicts and disasters, poor infrastructure, lack of access to essential services and social justice.
