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# STATEMENT OF CONTINUED SUPPORT BY THE CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

## **WE SUPPORT: THE UNITED NATIONS GLOBAL COMPACT TEN PRINCIPLES**

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To our Stakeholders:

I am pleased to confirm that LiveWell Initiative LWI reaffirms its support of the Ten Principles of the United Nations Global Compact in the areas of Human Rights, Labour, Environment and Anti-Corruption.

It is the policy of the organisation that there should be no discrimination in considering applications for employment including those from the female gender and disabled persons. All employees are given equal opportunities for self-development. As at 2<sup>nd</sup> November, 2017, one (1) disabled (visually impaired) person was in the employment of the organization. In the area of environment, the organization has collaborated with Corona School Gbagada and engaged in Tree Planting. In its pursuit of the SDGs 1,3,4,5,6, and 17 the organization has collaborated with government, private sector, educational institutions, developmental partners and communities. LWI won recognition by the Economist Intelligence Unit this year (SDG1, 3) , see

We spoke at the Harvard University Boston's African Global Conference 2017 - Healthcare Faculty in March 2017 (SDG17). In April 2017 we launched the Women in Hepatitis Africa WIHA, giving a strong voice to the Women of Africa (SDG6) in the elimination of viral hepatitis by 2030

This has earned the organisation awards at the national and international levels, and a 'worthy mention' on the floor of the UN Global Summit, New York (June 22 -23, 2016).

Over the past year we have trained, at our own cost, over 500 African Women as HEPATITIS CHAMPIONS. We are reaching out and giving a voice to Women of Africa and we are expanding our Health Missions to the Poor and Underserved people.

We are starting off a Mini Clinic next month, for the poor people of Sogunro Iwaya Lagos suburb.

In this annual Communication on Progress, we provide an indepth description of our actions to continual improve the integration of the Global Compact and its principles into our business strategy, culture and dai operations. We also commit to sharing this information with our Multisectoral Stakeholders and Communities using our primary channels of communication.
