Human Rights

- Professor Atapattu has an upcoming publication, as well as an updated gender equality piece on SDG 2. She will be attending the UN Forum on Business and Human Rights and has been working with a keynote speaker on human rights David Boyd.
- Continue work on SDGs and connection to human rights, including development of a 5-hour Continuing Legal Education course and a toolkit on SDG 4 identifying linkages to human rights.

Labour

- All of our legal experts participate providing pro bono time to advance the mission and objectives of CISDL, which includes respect for labour rights.
- Conducted research on the connection of labor to other issues, and methods to incorporate high labor standards into regional and bilateral trade agreements, and the synergies between SDG governance and labour issues.

Environment

- Over the year, CISDL has contributed to the work of the UN's programme on environment and development, and to the efforts of UN and other international treaties on climate change, biodiversity, desertification, trade and investment, sustainable resources management, health, human rights including rights of the child, and other sustainable development concerns. Together with UNEP, UNDP, UN FAO and other UN agencies, also CIFOR, IUCN, IDLO, Ramsar Convention, CITES, CBD, UNFCCC and other partners, CISDL has launched many research and educational products. The CISDL has also participated in HLPF panel presentations and events highlighting issues such as the development and use of effective Environmental Impact Assessments.
