We understand our role as custodians of water resources and infrastructure for our service area, and proactively contribute to enhancing the environment within this area.


We also understand that local action can translate into far-reaching, global outcomes.





HOW WE WILL DELIVER ON THIS COMMITMENT

Since signing up to the Global Compact in 2018, we are proud to have made significant progress across our six focus areas:





GOAL 6 CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION



WHAT WE DID:

Completion of the \$25M Spencer Street Sewer Upgrade project in the CBD

OUTCOME:

Finished ahead of schedule, safely and within budget, the upgraded sewer is now connected and working for the thousands of residents and commuters who live and work along Spencer Street. The upgraded sewer now has 25 times the capacity of the existing sewer. The completion of the project took place at a time of unprecedented and rapid population growth along Spencer Street.

GOAL 3 GOOD HEALTH AND WELLBEING



WHAT WE DID:

Greening the West 1 Million Trees Project (GTW 1MT)

OUTCOME:

An ambitious plan to green the western suburbs of Melbourne by planting 1 million trees has now come full circle.

The planting of the 1 millionth tree took place in mid-October – nearby where the first tree was planted in 2015.

The GTW 1MT project brought together a working group with members through LeadWest, Port Phillip and Westernport Catchment Management Authority, City West Water, community groups, local councils and government authorities who delivered multiple tree planting projects across multiple sites including parks, reserves and key waterways.





GOAL 5 GENDER EQUALITY



WHAT WE DID:

Championing women in leadership

OUTCOME:

All jobs at City West Water have gender balanced candidate fields and we welcome flexible working options. As at June 30 2019 we achieved 57% female representation across our senior leaders and 47% female representation across our staff base.

In August 2018, three female leaders were also honoured as being part of the Top 50 Davidson Public Sector Women in Victoria.

GOAL 11 SUSTAINABLE CITIES AND COMMUNITIES



WHAT WE DID:

Stormwater harvesting

OUTCOME:

To date, we have six stormwater harvesting projects in operation supplying up to 285 million litres of stormwater per year for irrigation of sportsgrounds. During 2018, in partnership with Brimbank City Council and Hobsons Bay City Council, we have undertaken improvement works on the Keilor Public Golf Course and Laverton Creek Recreation Reserve to improve the stormwater harvesting performance of these areas

We have also committed to seven new stormwater harvesting projects by June 2019 through our \$12.5M Stormwater Harvesting Fund.





GOAL 13 CLIMATE ACTION



WHAT WE DID:

Installation of energy recovery devices on pumps at our Altona Treatment Plant, as well as installation of solar panels.

OUTCOME:

Energy consumption from pumps has been reduced. Solar panels are estimated to reduce greenhouse gas emissions by 227 tonnes per year.

GOAL 17 PARTNERSHIPS FOR THE GOALS



WHAT WE DID:

Close collaboration to advance the purposeful leadership of the SDGs with the Water Services Association of Australia (WSAA).

OUTCOME:

Supporting the development and delivery of 'Global Goals for Local Communities' and the 'Sustainable Development Goals Progress Report' paper through WSAA Committee representation. Development of SDG communications and marketing materials shared across the WSAA platform and beyond.

GOAL 6 CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION



GLOBAL ISSUE

Ensure access to water and sanitation for all

Every year, many people perish from diseases associated with inadequate water supply, sanitation and hygiene.

Water scarcity, poor water quality and inadequate sanitation negatively impact food security, livelihood choices and educational opportunities for poor families across the world. Drought afflicts some of the world's poorest countries, worsening hunger and malnutrition.

By 2050, at least one in four people are likely to live in a country affected by chronic or recurring shortages of fresh water.



City West Water's core business aligns with the delivery of access to clean water and sanitation for all. We continue to strive to be an exceptional service provider where our infrastructure is both maintained and enhanced to support future growth.

OUR CURRENT ACTIONS

- Maintaining and enhancing infrastructure via our Capital Works Program.
- As Platinum Members of WaterAid, we will continue to participate in fund raising efforts through events and linkages with our customers.



OUR TARGETS

Deliver on the 10 major capital works projects identified for water and sewerage services out to 2023.







GOAL 3 GOOD HEALTH AND WELLBEING



Ensure healthy lives and promote wellbeing for all at all ages

Ensuring healthy lives and promoting the wellbeing for all at all ages is essential to sustainable development. Major progress has been made on increasing access to clean water and sanitation, reducing malaria, tuberculosis, polio and the spread of HIV/AIDS. However, many more efforts are needed to fully eradicate a wide range of diseases and address many different persistent and emerging health issues.



Improving health and wellbeing through urban greening is a key opportunity for City West Water's service area.

Water contributes to health and wellbeing. Tackling challenges such as the Urban Heat Island effect and activating green, open spaces to get people moving can be significant contributors to better health outcomes for the community.



Greening the West:

 Continuing to play a leadership role in the Greening the West program which brings together over 14 likeminded stakeholders with a commitment to a vision of urban greening for greater health and liveability outcomes for our community.

GLOBAL ISSUE

Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls

50% of our workforce will be female by 2020.







GOAL 11 SUSTAINABLE CITIES AND COMMUNITIES





GLOBAL ISSUE

Make cities inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable

Many challenges exist to maintaining cities in a way that continues to create jobs and prosperity while not straining land and resources. Common urban challenges include congestion, lack of funds to provide basic services, a shortage of adequate housing and declining infrastructure.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

City West Water has the important responsibility to deliver a secure and sustainable water network across the CBD and western suburbs.

We understand the intrinsic link that exists between water and communities that are resilient, sustainable and flourishing.

OUR CURRENT ACTIONS


- Implement our Urban Water Strategy which commits City West Water to taking the lead in implementing alternative water supply options such as stormwater harvesting and recycled water in a manner that secures our precious water supply.
- Established a \$12.5 million Stormwater
 Harvesting Fund to keep parks, gardens and sport
 fields green for the community to enjoy. Seven
 projects are being co-funded as at June 2019.

OUR TARGETS Increased the supply of stormwater irrigation of green spaces from 90ML/annum to 110ML/annum by 2020.

Deliver 9.7 GL per year of alternative water by 2065 – in line with current plans for growth areas (including existing 2.5 GL per year supply as of 2015/16). By FY20/21 reduce our total per capita water consumption from 300l/p/c to 292l/p/d.



GOAL 13 CLIMATE ACTION





GLOBAL ISSUE

Take urgent action to combat climate change and its impacts

Climate change is now affecting every country on every continent. It is disrupting national economies and affecting lives, costing people, communities and countries dearly today and even more tomorrow.

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT?

At City West Water, we partner in climate change mitigation and lead in climate change adaptation. We are dedicated to proactively responding to the impacts of climate change on our services, customers and the broader community.

OUR TARGETS


Reduce our total carbon emissions by 80% (compared to our baseline) by 1 July 2025 and adopt a leading pathway to achieve net-zero emissions.


GOAL 7 AFFORDABLE AND CLEAN ENERGY

- Pricing submission: We exist because people and places need water and sewerage services, and we are committed to delivering the services our customers value efficiently and at an affordable price.
- Digital metering trials: Digital water meters help identify leaks, within the
 customer's property and in our water network, so they can be fixed quickly,
 saving water and money. Digital water meters have the potential to provide
 customers with timely information on their water usage and bill so they can
 make informed choices about their water consumption and avoid surprises.
- KPIs and strict water quality assurance measures in place: Our Annual Report houses our operational KPIs and water quality requirements to ensure that we continue to supply safe, clean drinking water to our customers.

GLOBAL ISSUE:

Promote inclusive and sustainable economic growth, employment and decent work for all

OUR CURRENT ACTIONS:

- Flexible work arrangements and action items from our Diversity and Inclusion Strategy: Our people are at the heart of all we do. Fostering positive physical and mental health within the workplace for each employee is our top priority, and we provide programs such as flexible work arrangements in order to achieve this. We are also supporting diversity and inclusion across the board to ensure our workplace is reflective of the diverse community we serve.
- White Lion partnerships: Supporting work placements for young people via White Lion's Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander program.

- Shark Tank Innovation Fund: City West Water's innovation fund provides a
 formal opportunity for staff to actively take part in innovative problem solving
 and development to enhance the way we operate across the board.
- Capital Works Program: Our Capital Works Program ensures that our infrastructure is resilient and meets the demand for water and wastewater services both now and into the future. This program considers and supports our growing city and western suburbs amidst the challenges of climate change and a future with less water.
- Maintenance program of existing assets: Our maintenance program for
 existing assets ensures that our vital wastewater and water infrastructure
 networks continue to be maintained to support customer needs both now
 and into the future.





GOAL 10 REDUCED INEQUALITIES

Reduce inequality within and among countries

OUR CURRENT ACTIONS:

• WaterAid involvement: WaterAid membership strengthens our corporate social responsibility and sustainability programs and increases our understanding and ability to help support communities without access to clean water, decent toilets and good hygiene.



GOAL 12 RESPONSIBLE CONSUMPTION **PRODUCTION**

GLOBAL ISSUE:

Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns

- System efficiency processes: Energy recovery devices and Solar Panels installed at Altona Treatment Plant are two examples of how City West Water is actively playing a role in reducing energy consumption to ensure that we operate as sustainably as possible. These initiatives fall under our greater commitment to reducing our greenhouse gas emissions by 80% by 2025.
- Showerhead exchange: At City West Water, we provide our customers with the opportunity to swap their old showerheads with water efficient ones – free of charge. A new water efficient shower head can save our customers up to 13,500 litres of water per person per year. Installing water efficient showerheads is one of the easiest ways to improve water efficiency in our customers' homes and reduce their water and energy bills and environmental impact.
- Water recycling: City West Water is dedicated to finding new opportunities to serve our communities in as many ways as possible. The provision and use of recycled water instead of potable water where possible is an example of this. Recycled water can be used for many purposes, depending on the quality of wastewater, including toilet flushing, cleaning and for use in cooling towers.





GLOBAL ISSUE:

Conserve and sustainably use the oceans, seas and marine resources

OUR CURRENT ACTIONS:

- Urban Water Strategy: We commit to delivering reliable, efficient, safe and environmentally responsible water and wastewater services for our customers now and into the future and the UWS outlines our approach to make good on our commitment.
- Support of Melbourne Water: Melbourne Water manages Melbourne's major waterways, supply catchments and major drainage systems. Our support of their strategic direction in managing the conservation and sustainability of our waterways is an important priority.



GOAL 15 LIFE ON LAND

GLOBAL ISSUE:

Sustainably manage forests, combat desertification, halt and reverse land degradation, halt biodiversity loss

OUR CURRENT ACTIONS:

• Environmental offset and tree replacement: As part of our Greening the West initiative, we have led the 1 million trees project, which seeks to see 1 million additional trees planted in Melbourne's West to reduce the Urban Heat Island effect and increase the health and wellbeing of our communities. We have also created a native vegetation offset site on our land in Ballan Road, Wyndham Vale. This site is actively managed to offset native vegetation removed to construct water supply assets.





GOAL 16 PEACE, JUSTICE AND STRONG INSTITUTIONS

GLOBAL ISSUE:

Promote just, peaceful and inclusive societies

- Family Violence Forums and Policy: City West Water is committed to being an exceptional service provider that puts customers first and benefits the community. Our Family Violence Policy outlines how we seek to meet our responsibilities for employees and customers experiencing or affected by family violence.
- CALD community work: City West Water is home to over 130 cultural groups. We offer English as an Additional Language syllabus to improve communication and understanding of water use and safety. We also offer support for those experiencing financial hardship through our hardship program.
