Message from the Head - CSR RAMKY FOUNDATION

Ramky Foundation expresses that 2019-20 has been a momentous year—a year of learning, consolidation and advancing our mission through our flagship programs of Natural Resource Management, Women Empowerment, Health, Education and Skill Development. During 2019-20 the Foundation utilised its resources towards sustainable models like implementation of long term livelihood opportunities to Tribal population in Vizag Dist. of AP and in the state of West Bengal through Maathota Programme and implementation of PWRMP Project for enhanced incomes to the Safai Sathis. Ramky Foundation, since its inception, has been serving rural communities; reaching them with services and products they need the most. We strengthened our commitment towards the planet and ecosystem conservation through Natural Farming and Plastic Waste recycling. During the year Ramky Foundation is generating opportunities and new knowledge to help poor and marginalised communities in finding new livelihood opportunities to lead their life with dignity and pride.

The holistic growth & sustainable development of communities had been the focus area of the Ramky Foundation under the Five Thrust areas since its inception. During the current financial year (2019 & 20), RF has reached out to 1,13,712 beneficiaries through new initiatives, such as creating Green zones at Mumbai, exposure visits of farmers, distribution of notebooks, and scholarships through the ISHA program & conducting Capacity building sessions to Safai Karamcharis.

Ramky Foundation during 2019-20 extended its support to the communities of flood-affected areas in Odisha. The foundation distributed essential commodities to 20 families. RF has also encouraged youth who were interested in playing sports by distributing T-Shirts for various Cricket teams in Maharashtra where 520 youth got benefitted out of this particular event.

This year the Foundation accepted the Rice Bucket Challenge “DAAN USTAV” from Telangana Social Impact Group, and collected about 3700 kg of rice—that being the highest among the acceptors of “DAAN USTAV”. The collected rice was distributed to the organisations working for poor, orphans and differently abled people. About 1500 beneficiaries were benefitted by ‘Daan Utsav’.

Under AP State Skill Development Corporation (APSSDC), RF has mobilized 180 youth members among which 173 members were identified for undergoing skill training during the financial year 2019 & 2020.

Ramky Foundation had come up with Integrated Schooling & Holistic Approach (ISHA) program that intends to provide quality education through improvised infrastructural facilities in government schools. As part of this program, RF also got involved in conducting minor events, such as Notebook distribution & Scholarship distribution to 5,537 & 107 beneficiaries respectively. Under this program, a total of 1,00,000 books were distributed to the children in Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, West Bengal, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Bihar

Our work in 2019-20, therefore focused on assessing the progress made and defining priorities for the future. The legacy of Managing Trustee shaped not only the achievements so far, but also the future of sustainability of communities that were being handheld by the Ramky Foundation.

In the coming years, Ramky Foundation plans on initiating new Swacchta Kendras at different places for improving the segregation of dry & wet waste materials, which will in turn conserve the environment by reducing pollution.

The Foundation is growing by leaps and bounds with definite strategies including successful collaborations with different government and non-government agencies and mobilizing additional resources to widen the interventions.

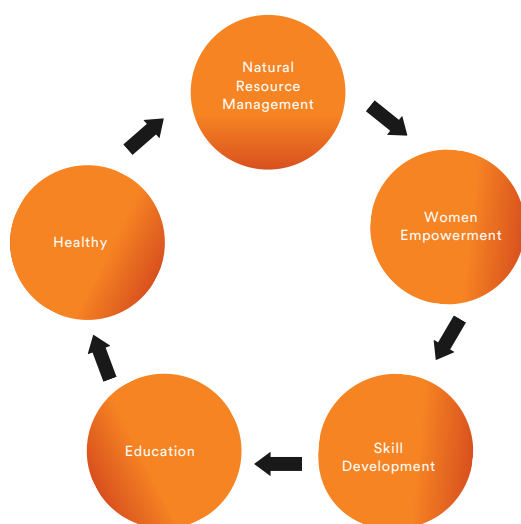
Ramky Foundation has **12A & 80G certification** and **registered under FCRA**.

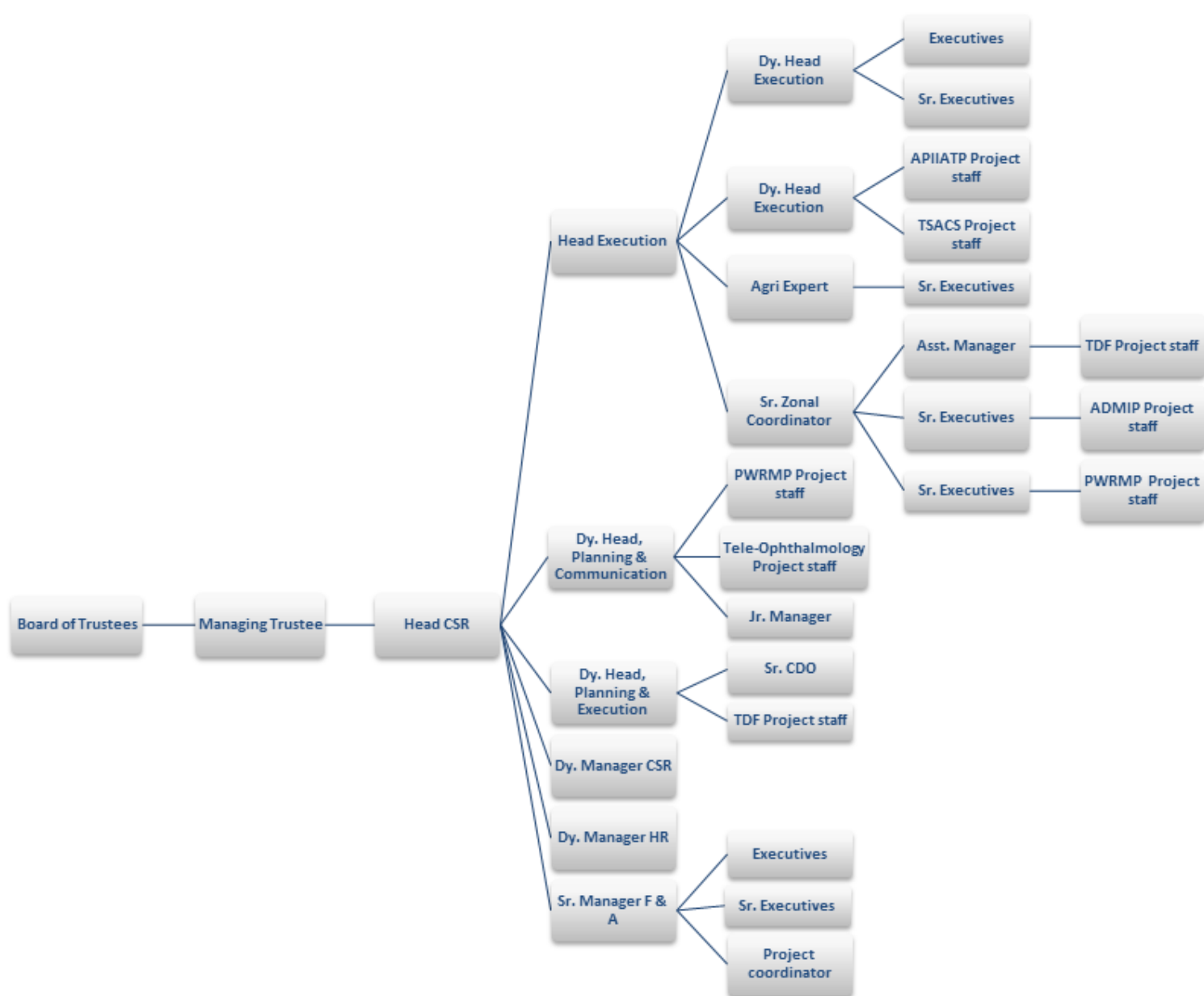

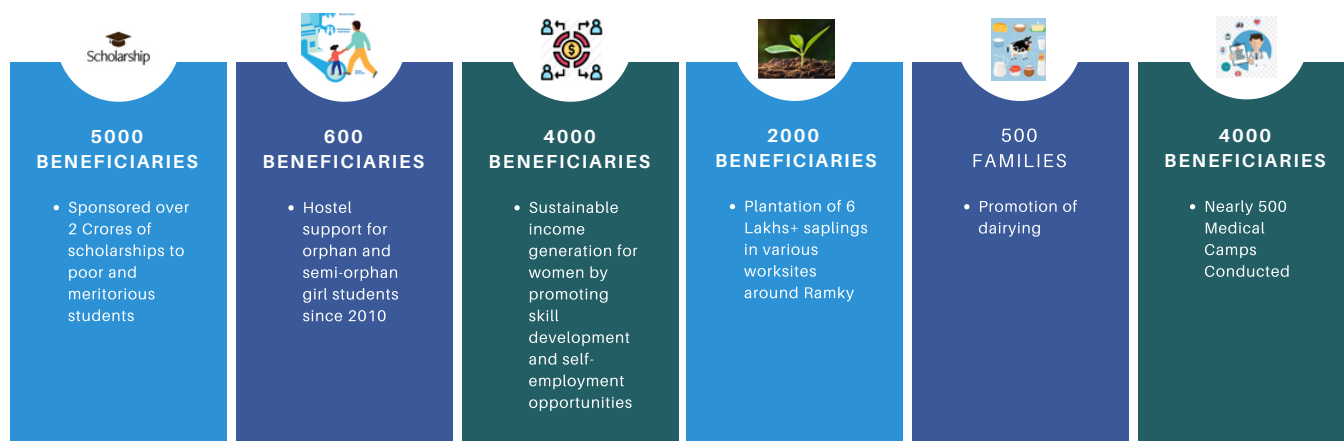

05 Key Outcomes Since Inception



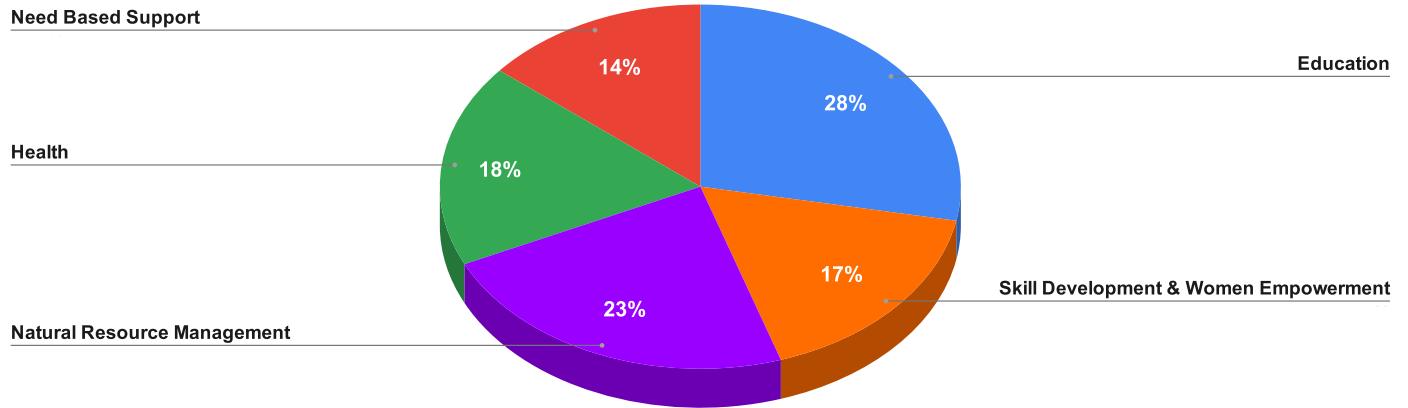

A Glimpse On The Progress Of Our Projects

6.1 Natural Resource Management

6.1.1 Integrated Tribal Development Project (ITDP), NABARD

Core objective of these projects is comprehensive Tribal Development Programme encompassing Natural Resource Management in rain fed tribal areas, micro-finance initiatives, health development and women empowerment through people's participation.

Ramky Foundation is currently implementing FOUR Integrated Tribal Development Projects (ITDPs) in two states, which are, Andhra Pradesh and West Bengal. TWO are ongoing in the Koyyuru mandal of Vishakhapatnam dist., AP and TWO are in West Bengal.

RF has successfully implemented TWO ITDPs, in association with NABARD so far- one in Sankrail block, West Bengal and the other in Kurnool dist., AP.

Activities conducted at Tribal Development Project sites during 2019-20:

- Supporting 675 families from backward community of Sankrail Block, Paschim Medinipur district, West Bengal, by preparing orchards (Wadis) with all relevant supports to develop livelihood of the beneficiaries—plantation, basins formation and weeding, ploughing, medicine application, manure application, irrigation, cattle trench, fencing, construction of water resources, moisture conservation, border plantation, nutritional garden, smokeless chullah, intercropping, along with trainings, exposure visits, awareness programme and many more.
- Supporting 150 landless people with different livelihood support programme like sal leaf plate making, nursery formation, animal rearing, etc.
- Great development in intercropping by wadi farmers
- Conducting exposure visits with both existing and interested farmers
- Formation of Farmers Producers Organization (FPO) with around 125 members at present
- '**Mango Festival**' Celebrations
- Relevant supports provided for ploughing, plantation, basins formation, insecticide/fungicide/pesticide application, neem and manure application, irrigation, cattle trench preparation, border plantation, mulching, etc.

- Convergence with MGNREGA— some very useful activities have been planned and executed under this govt. scheme for TDF-Keshiary project. Keshiary BDO has given enormous support in this process. Activities taken up under MGNREGA during 2019-20 are:
- Preparation of Jalkund within wadi
- Preparation of 30-40 model within wadi
- Thorough intercropping support
- Construction of 1 pump-house with submersible pumps for ensuring safe and ensured irrigation
- 2 Village Development Committee (VDC) formation in 2 villages
- Discussion of the concept of Farmers' Producers' Organization, tentative group has been formed with presently 53 members
- Health camps for Public, and vet camps for Animals
- Mango and Cashew Cultivation in 200 Acres
- Distribution of 8 diesel engines to 8 Village Maathota committees
- Establishment of 7 bore wells in the project area
- Capacity Building Programmes

6.1.2 OUR DWELLING WITH THE DELTA REGION FARMERS

The project, West Bengal Accelerated Development of Minor Irrigation Project (WBADMIP), is aimed at enhancing the agricultural productivity by small and marginal farmers (i.e. the beneficiaries), by providing adequate and dependable irrigation facilities and thus introduce multi-cropping systems.

Also, the target is to hand over the schemes to respective Water User Associations (WUAs) with the purpose of maximizing the benefits of the water and thus ensuring sustainability of the project. The idea is to make community understand the utility and advantages of the project; how to handle the irrigation facility all by themselves for longer period of time.

Presently, we're working in 7 districts of West Bengal under this project— North 24 Pgs, South 24 Pgs, Hooghly, Paschim Medinipur & Jhargram, Purba Medinipur and Purulia

Objectives:

- Selecting suitable area (mono-cropped, rain-fed) where irrigation is a serious need; also ensuring the feasibility of the sub project among that community and motivating farmers/villagers
- Scheme selection by adhering to all given criteria
- WUA formation and registration
- Detail Project Report preparation with the support of DPMU
- Training (both field level and cluster level) and hand-holding support to WUA members
- Documentation and Reporting
- Communication/Liaison with all line departments like Agriculture, Horticulture, and Fisheries
- Other support services like Agriculture, Horticulture, and Fisheries to utilize maximum benefits from the irrigation activities.

In these projects, being the support organization (SO), Ramky Foundation's role is to provide required professional skills, expertise and technical resources to those selected areas where irrigation system had been/is being/will be constructed by Water Resource Investigation and Development Dept. (WRIDD). The target is based on numbers of scheme/WUA, increased practice of modern technology among farmers, organic farming, poly-house, different agriculture/horticulture/fisheries practice and many more.

6.1.3 ENRICHING THE BANANA PRODUCING FARMERS VIA FPOs

NABARD (National Bank for Agriculture & Rural Development), being one among the various companies that strives for the development of farmers had also promoted Farmer Producer Organizations by funding the Non-Profit organizations. Similarly, the same organization has been supporting Ramky Foundation in terms of creating farmer producer organizations since 2016. This FPO is a legal entity formed by the group of farmers to sell their own products for better income generation without any involvement of middlemen.

Activities carried out by MAHANANDI BANANA FPO during 2019–2020:.

- Share capital mobilization
- Introducing new varieties like Yalakki by improving farmer's income
- Expanding market linkage's in tissue culture banana plants business
- Creating a market linkage to 'Desai fruit marketing company'
- Involved in 7 lakhs of business in the month of February
- Expanded the fertilizer business by opening 2nd outlet in Gopavaram village located in Mahanandi manda, Nellore District.
- Apart from these activities FPO has also organized awareness campaigns, exposure visit to Indian Council of Agricultural Research (ICAR) located in Bangalore.

Activities carried out by SANGAMESHWARA FPO during 2019–20:

- The number of shareholders has been increased by 134 members compared to the year 2018 & 19.
- The Department of Agriculture issued Seed and Fertilizer license to the Sangameswara FPO for running the seed & input business outlet by hiring a shop and godown in Karivena village.
- With this, Sangameswara FPO has become the first one in Kurnool district to obtain the license & initiate the seed business through FPO, promoted by NABARD.
- This particular FPO has got eligibility for receiving an amount of Rs. 5 lakhs 'Business Development Grant Assistance' from NABARD by crossing Rs. 5 lakhs share capital and Rs. 30 lakhs business assistance.
- FPO has served about 355 shareholders through its business operations during the financial year 2019 & 20.
- Apart from the above activities FPO has also organised few special events such as, Inaugurating Agri input business & fruits kit distribution program for distributing fruits kits for the people residing in COVID affected places.

6.1.4 TRANSFORMING FARMING THROUGH EFFECTIVE IRRIGATION

Andhra Pradesh Integrated Irrigation & Agriculture Transformation Project (APIIATP) had taken an initiative in transforming traditional tank systems into Cascade systems with an objective to minimize water loss, improve the conservation of surface water & promote efficient water management in the micro-hydrological unit with a defined geographical boundary. The project also plans to take up independent tanks having ayacut (area served by an irrigation project such as, dam/tank) above 40 Ha, which do not fall within any cascade, for rehabilitation and restoration. With an improvement of Cascade system there is a high increase in area for irrigation & availability of water resources.

- Institutional Strengthening & Capacity Building of Water User Associations (WUAs)
- Improving water productivity & efficiency of the farmers
- Climate smart crop production & Diversification programs
- Post-harvest Management, Market and Agri. Business Promotion
- Awareness programs & meetings

6.1.5 MANAGING PLASTIC WASTE IN COLLABORATION WITH UNDP

Hindustan Coca Cola Beverages Private Limited (HCCBPL), in partnership with the **United Nations Development Programme (UNDP)** is building on the existing systems and processes to reduce the impact of plastic waste on human life and environment in India. The partnership, Prithvi is an attempt to lead sustainable plastic waste management practices in India that will encourage segregation, collection and recycling of all plastics in line with the Government of India's Swachh Bharat (Clean India) Mission, Plastic Waste Management Rules, 2016 and United Nations Sustainable Development Goals.

The Project aims to manage more than 85,000 MT of plastic waste and to improve the socio-economic conditions of over 30,000 Safai Sathis (waste collectors). The Project establishes Swachhta Kendra's (Material Recovery Centre) by blending social and technical approaches with strong governance mechanisms, and it strives to institutionalize collaboration between citizens, communities, central and state pollution boards, urban and environment departments, related stakeholders to find sustainable solution.

Ramky Foundation is the Implementing Partner (IP) for its Project in Khaitalapur, Hyderabad in Telangana and Howrah in West Bengal.

Impacts of the Project this year:

- Increase in Income of the Safai Sathis
- Increase in collection of the plastic waste
- Safe work environment via distribution of PPE kits and entitlement to the social provisions
- Women Empowerment
- Soft loans to the waste pickers

The PWRMP has achieved about 2903 MT of Plastic waste against a target of 1800 MT fixed by UNDP. The total collection of Plastic Waste till 31st March 2020 is about 3639.6 MT.

6.2 Women Empowerment

6.2.1 Provoking Livelihood for Women

The **Vennela Rural Mart-Mutually Aided Cooperative Thrift & Credit Society Limited (VRM-MACT & CSL)** is an apparel manufacturing unit located at Narasaraopet where women are engaged in manufacturing garments such as shirts, T-shirts, pants, shorts, 3/4th pants, school uniforms and Aprons. They have bagged various business opportunities through schools, college and event managements. The main objective of this particular society is to create sustainable employment for women.

Activities conducted under VRM-MACT & CSL

- The Political parties have accessed the services of Vennela Rural Mart by availing T-shirts with their political party symbol.
- VRM has created an employment opportunity for 174 Women during the financial year 2019 & 20.
- Total payments done to the women in the form of salaries is Rs. 6.9 lakhs. The wage cost per women per day is Rs. 270.
- The profit earned during the years 2019 & 20 is Rs. 6 lakhs.

6.3 Health

6.3.1 Tele-Ophthalmology Services

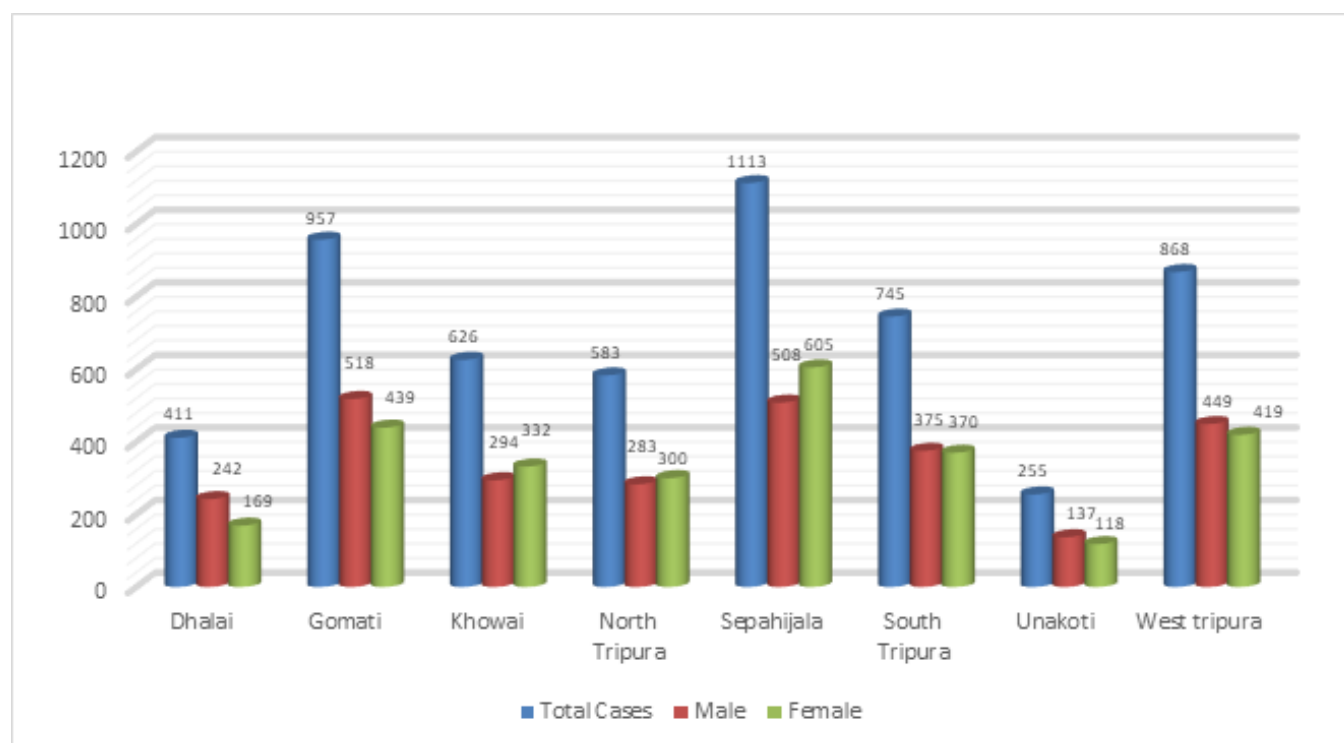
This project was started in the month of March-2020, in the state of Tripura, with an intent to provide access for the patients in remote areas—who have limited access to the ocular health care—to the specialists. Teleophthalmology enables a health professional to deliver the eye care through digital medical equipment and telecommunications technology to those in the remote locations. These services, run by the Ramky Foundation under National Health Mission and Govt. of Tripura, operate in 46 different centers all across the state, while the specialists operate from the headquarters at IGM hospital, Agartala.

6.3.2 Mitigating the Adversities of the Female Sex Workers (FSWs) through Targeted Interventions (TI)

Ramky Foundation initiated the TI project on January, 2011 founded by Telangana State Aids control Society (TSACS) under NACP-IV.

The main objective of the project is to decrease HIV/AIDS and STI prevalence rate through generating the awareness to Female Sex Workers (FSW's) in 26 Sites of Hyderabad with 3154 High Risk Group (FSW) women.

The following are the 26 different Sites which we have taken up in this project- Moosapet, Erragadda, Vengalraonagar, Ameerpet, Somajiguda, Punjagutta, Chintalbasti, Yousufguda, Serilingampally, etc.

Activities conducted during 2019-20:

- Preparation of B.C.C material to give awareness on TI components, Community mobilization, Social entitlements.
- Availability and accessibility of condoms & strengthening the Social Marketing.
- Regular Re-orientation and capacity building of staff.
- Empowering DIC & STI clinical services.
- Micro planning of BCC activities to improve the knowledge level on STI/HIV/AIDS.
- Increase the usage of condom through availability and accessibility at hotspots.
- Micro plan of outreach activities for tracking the referrals of RMC, ICTC and STI care services.
- Peer led outreach planning and PEs wise line listing.
- Positive prevention and linkages with ART/CCC/DSRC.
- Field Monitoring.
- Saturated coverage at all the hotspots.
- Capacity building for PEs and ORWs.

6.4 Education

6.4.1 Integrated Schooling and Holistic Approach (ISHA) Program

Ramky Foundation had come up with Integrated Schooling & Holistic Approach (ISHA) program that intends to provide quality education through improvised infrastructural facilities in government schools. As part of this program, RF also got involved in conducting minor events, such as, Notebook distribution & Scholarship distribution to 5,537 & 107 beneficiaries respectively. Under this program, a total of 1,00,000 books were distributed to the children in Andhra Pradesh, Telangana, West Bengal, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Bihar, Karnataka & Rajasthan. On the account of Foundation day celebrations, 500 school students also got notebooks in Andhra Pradesh.



6.5 Skill Development

Ramky Foundation facilitates or catalyzes skill development initiatives that can potentially have a multiplier effect. In doing so, it strives to involve various other stakeholders in all aspects of skill development. Our approach is to develop skills among women and youth whilst partnering with multiple stakeholders and build long-term associations with them. To scale up efforts necessary to achieve the objective of skilling/up-skilling people, the RF strives to:

- Develop low cost, high-quality training with innovative business models
- Attract significant linkages which enable the long-term development

Ramky Foundation is organizing training programs in collaboration with various government bodies. For 2 years RF has been providing skill development trainings under Pradhan Mantri Kaushal Vikas Yojana (PMKVY) scheme funded by National Skill development Corporation (NSDC) under ministry of Skill Development and Entrepreneurship.

08 Success Stories

01 - Rajamma

Rajamma hails from a village called Adoni in Kurnool district, Andhra Pradesh. In Adoni, she used to work as a daily wage laborer and earned around Rs 100-150 per day, and was the sole breadwinner of the family. Her husband was an alcoholic and used to spend all that he earned on alcohol. She had a hard time earning a livelihood for her family.

Rajamma then moved to Hyderabad and started off as a waste picker. However, the waste collected by her used to be unfairly weighed by the traders, thus forcing Rajamma to frequently borrow money. This led her into inevitable debts.



Luckily, Rajamma got to know about the “Swachhta Kendra”, set up under the Plastic Waste Management Programme by HCCB and UNDP with Ramky foundation as the local implementation partner.

Working in the Prithvi project has helped mitigate her adversities and she has only benefitted from this project. The project has brought in the awareness of the benefits of forming Self-Help Groups (SHGs), of which Rajamma and other Safai Saathis were a part. They went on to finally open a savings account and are provided with health insurances as well. The Medical Camps—organized frequently in the Swachhta Kendra—provided her with proper medication and was beneficial to her.

Besides medical benefits, Rajamma was also aided with social benefits like scholarships for her kids, provided by the Ramky foundation. Being a part of the Prithvi project, she now earns Rs 12,000/- in a month, as opposed to Rs 7,500/- that she made before, being a daily wage worker. Rajamma now leads a debt-free life and can fund her children's education all by herself! This has naturally boosted her self-confidence, for now she lives an independent life in the society.

02 - Ananda Nayak

This is about Ananda Nayak from Gobindapur village. He is one of our most active and successful beneficiaries from the Sankrail block. Ananda Nayak is one among the 675 farmers under the Tribal Development Project in Sankrail Gram Panchayat, Paschim Medinipur district, West Bengal. He came to know about wadi project from his neighboring village in the year 2015. He then approached Ramky Foundation and expressed his willingness towards participating in this project. He planted 83 plants (mango and cashew) in his wadi.

We've mentioned about him and introduced him in a number of programmes as a successful farmer who not only took very good care of his wadis, but also generated better income via intercropping.



For the last couple of years, his annual income has been increased so much that it has now become his family's primary source of living. Ananda Nayak along with other farmers participate in all the meetings, trainings and exposure visits organized by Ramky Foundation and has very well understood the role of a farmer in successful promotion of wadis.

It is very interesting to share that each and every project activity starting from pit digging to irrigation was carried out by him. Prior to the fruit cultivation, the land was a wasteland without any crop. When intercropping was introduced to him, he showed an avid interest towards it and worked very hard to take up intercropping in his land. Crops such as pumpkin, ridge gourd, okra and tomato have been raised via intercropping during rabi and pre-kharif season with the material supports received from the project.

During this Rabi season he expended Rs 3,630 to cultivate gourd, onion, chili, coriander and some spinach and they were sold for Rs 13,110, which has given him a profit of nearly Rs 9,480! Besides financial profit, all these vegetables also help in supporting his family's nutrition intake, without any additional expenditure. Presently, he's one of our active FPO members.

The holistic growth & sustainable development of communities had been the focus area of the Ramky Foundation under the 5 Thrust areas since its inception. During the current financial year (2019 & 20), RF has reached out to 1,13,712 beneficiaries through new initiatives such as creating green zones at Mumbai, exposure visits of farmers, distribution of notebooks, and scholarships through the ISHA program & conducting Capacity building sessions to Safai Karamcharis.

In the coming years, Ramky Foundation is planning on initiating new Swacchta Kendras at different places for improving the segregation of dry & wet waste materials which will in turn conserve the environment by reducing pollution.
