# Research Activities Brief Overview

#### Key Priorities for the Krityanand UNESCO Club Summer Research Internship Program

#### **Overview:**

Despite the stunning pace of technological progress and economic growth in some countries, we continue to live with growing inequalities and unacceptable levels of poverty. In many countries, inadequate social protection systems, persistent violence, institutional instability and environmental degradation create complex poverty traps. The Internship on Economic and Political Development (EPD) Concentration attracts diverse students who are committed to fighting inequality between and within countries, eradicating poverty and its causes, and promoting inclusive growth and human development by expanding people's civil and political as well as economic and social rights and freedoms. To take on these global challenges, our intern curriculum with a variety of skills in policy analysis, program planning, monitoring and evaluation, and advocacy.

#### Purpose of the Research Program

We undertake multidisciplinary research and policy analysis on the social dimensions of contemporary development issues. Through our work we aim to ensure that social equity, inclusion and justice are central to development thinking, policy and practice. Krityanand UNESCO Club Jamshedpur conducts micro level research on issues with strategic implications for development thinking and policy making. Research activities include hosting presentations by distinguished student experts, to contribute to the development policy debate, that help to identify effective development strategies and improve the capacity for sound development.

#### **Research Internship**

The Krityanand UNESCO Club runs a small, highly selective internship program for students graduates interested in gaining firsthand experience in public policy research in domestic and international affairs. Over 100 undergraduate, and graduate students have participated in the research intern program. Candidates must be highly motivated to work independently in a demanding think tank environment that requires excellent research and analysis as well as project management skills. Internships are unpaid, work from home status or virtual or in Jamshedpur. Interns work independently and in teams. This is an excellent opportunity for those students who are planning to attend graduate school in international relations, Economic and Political Development, public policy, law school and/or work in a think tank or international organization.

Volunteer interns are recruited on a summer and winter for 30 to 90 days maximum to volunteer in both the Jamshedpur and Virtual (work from Home). An intern's volunteer duties generally consist of concerned research, editing, and writing. The volunteer internships are unpaid. Our faculty works on a diverse set of research areas including Foreign Policy, International Relations, Economic and Political Development, Macroeconomics, Microeconomics, Trade, Organizations, Political Economy and the role of governments on business, Sustainable Development and e-Governance.

Introduction:	A modern nation's economy must both ensure growth and productivity and maintain equity and participation for its citizens. PR's faculty approach India's economic policy with this balance in mind, working on topics ranging from macroeconomic dynamics and trade policy to the intellectual foundations of service delivery and the design of welfare schemes.
	Economic growth in India accelerated in Fiscal Year 2015 despite a double-digit decline in

	exports. It is projected to dip marginally in FY2016 due to a slowdown in public investment, stressed corporate balance sheets, and declining exports, then pick up in FY2017 as newly strengthened bank and corporate finances allow a revival in investment. Notwithstanding unexpected delays in enacting some economic reform, the prospects for continued rapid growth are undiminished. Advance government estimates point to the economy growing at 7.6% in FY2015 (ending 31 March 2016), marginally above the forecast of 7.4% in Asian Development Outlook 2015 Update. The estimate could be a tad optimistic, however, as achieving it would require the gross domestic product (GDP) to increase by 7.7% in the last quarter of the fiscal year. Despite a weak monsoon for a second consecutive year, agriculture grew by 1.1% in FY2015, mainly on strong growth in livestock. Food grain production is estimated to have increased by 0.5% in FY2015, though there was lower production of rice, coarse cereals, oilseeds, and sugarcane. After growing by 5.9% in FY2014, industry accelerated further to 7.3% in FY2015. Expansion in services moderated to 9.2%. Private consumption growth is estimated to have picked up to 7.6% in FY2015 from 6.2% a year earlier. However, these estimates are likely to be optimistic, as achieving them would require
	private consumption to grow at 11.7% in the fourth quarter of FY2015, nearly double the 6.1% growth rate achieved in the first 3 quarters. Much of the improvement in private consumption stems from a pickup in urban consumption, while rural consumption has remained subdued as a result of two consecutive weak monsoons. Government consumption growth also stayed tepid as the central government boosted capital expenditure and curtailed
Prospects	While public investment and urban consumption were the major drivers of growth in FY2015, a revival of private investment and rural consumption is critical if growth is to remain strong in FY2016 and FY2017, given the likely sluggish recovery in the advanced economies and the anemic outlook for global trade. Growth is projected at 7.4% in FY2016, marginally lower than the 7.6% achieved in FY2015 as the expected decline in external demand offsets a pickup in domestic demand. Moreover, the weak balance sheets of public sector banks will hamper lending and growth prospects. Growth is expected to pick up a bit to 7.8% in FY2017, helped by the government's strengthening of public sector banks' capital and operations, private investment benefitting from corporate deleveraging, the financing of stalled projects, and an uptick in bank credit. Introduction:		Financial inclusion is increasingly recognized as among the most important potential contributors to sustainable and fair economic and financial development. Efforts that extend financial services to those without should help households to smooth consumption, increase savings, and ease cash shortages. SMEs with more access to finance would gain a potentially important source of investment that facilitates better competitiveness and integration into international trade networks. A particularly important aspect to consider is the role of financial inclusion in alleviating income inequality. There is increasing evidence that lack of access to financial services represents a significant barrier to income opportunities and economic welfare of individuals. Evidence also suggests that 83.3 per cent of global wealth is concentrated in only 8.4 per cent of the global population who have more access to financial services.

Overview:	A sound understanding of international relations in the 21st century requires an examination of the increasing role that international organization's play in the unfolding of world politics. More than ever before, international organizations and international law are affecting the way that states conduct their activities, domestically and at a regional and global level. This also affects, in a fundamental way, the nature of state sovereignty in international relations, a (sometimes resisted) development that has important ramifications for the way we live, and for the nature of citizen-state relations. The rise of international organization's play in a world that appears to operate on the logic of state sovereignty and power politics, but which is increasingly affected by international law and norms of behavior. How relevant are international organization's in such diverse and sensitive domains as security, the environment, human rights and justice? It includes two tracks while maintaining a common core curriculum. The Human Rights Policy track prepares students for careers that require knowledge of areas such as corporate social responsibility, genocide prevention, gender and globalization, or rights-based development policy. The Humanitarian Policy track leads to careers that might focus on the management of complex emergencies, early recovery, peacekeeping and peace building, aid coordination, or resource mobilization. Many students bring substantial experience to the program, enriching the classroom dynamics. Previous graduates have pursued a wide variety of careers and now work in various government agencies, the United Nations and other international organizations, NGOs, corporations, community organizations, think tanks, and service organizations.
