Parahyangan Catholic University History

January 17, 1955

The Academy of Commerce was established by Bishopric of Bandung

August 1955

The Academy of Commerce was changed into Parahyangan Institute of Socio-Economic Studies currently the Faculty of Economics of Parahyangan Catholic University.

September 15, 1958

The Faculty of Law was established and the name of Parahyangan Institute of Socio-Economic Studies was changed into Parahyangan Catholic Institute of Higher Education

1960

The Engineering Faculty was established with its two departments, namely Civil Engineering and Architecture Engineering

June 23, 1995

Magister Programs of the four study programs were established, that are Master's degree in the fields of Management, Law, Civil Engineering, and Architecture

May 12, 1995

The Company Management and Civil Engineering Diploma III Program were established. On June 23rd 1995, Magister Programs of the four study programs were established, that are Master's degree in the fields of Management, Law, Civil Engineering, and Architecture

1993

Two new faculties were established, namely Faculty of Industrial Technology (consisting of 2 departments: Industrial Engineering and Chemical Engineering), and Faculty of Mathematics and Natural Sciences (currently known as Faculty of Information Technology and Science) consisting of Informatical Engineering, Mathematics, and Physics Departments.

1961

The Faculty of Social and Political Sciences was established (currently known as Faculty of Social and Political Sciences). In this year, the name of Parahyangan Catholic Institute of Higher Education was changed into Parahyangan Catholic University.

August 1996

The Department/Study Program of Computer Science for Undergraduate Degree was established.

December 23, 1999

UNPAR succeeded in gaining permission in order to Conduct the Doctoral Program for Civil Engineering and Law faculties

April 17, 2000

UNPAR gained permission to conduct Master's Program in Social and Political Sciences and a Doctoral Program in Architecture, and the permission to conduct Master's Programs in the fields of Theology and Economics was granted on April 24th 2000.

December 31, 2008

The Faculty of Economics established Professional Accounting Program

February 18, 2020

The establishment of Program Profesi Insinyur that had been proceed based on judgement by Ministry of Education.

March 31, 2015

The establishment of Electro Program that had been proceed based on judgement by Ministry of Education.

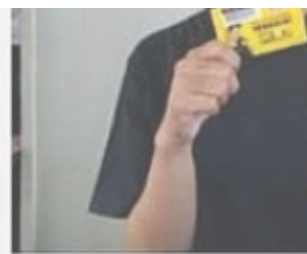
- A holistic human being (*Humane/Humanum*)

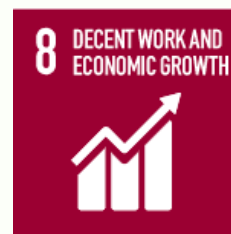

SDGs 2: NO HUNGER

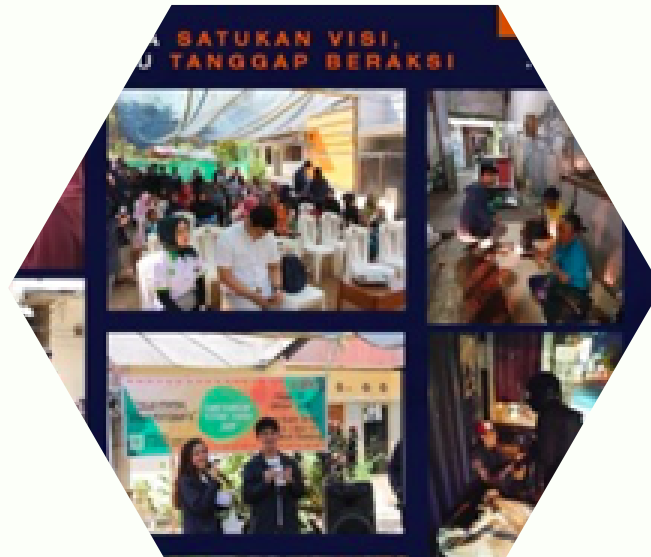

UNPAR FIGHT COVID-19

Parahyangan Catholic University (UNPAR), in collaboration with IKA UNPAR, is at the forefront of tackling the spread of the coronavirus disease (COVID-19), from health workers, state officials and workers to small traders. On April 30, UNPAR, through the UNPAR Fights COVID-19 Team, organized the spraying of disinfectant liquid at nine RTs around the UNPAR campus in Ciumbuleuit. These locations included RW01 and RW11 in Cidadap village, as well as RW06 in Ciumbuleuit village. On Thursday, April 2 the UNPAR Fights COVID-19 Team handed over ten hand washing facilities complete with hand washing soap to the communities around UNPAR, especially those in RW01 and RW11 in Cidadap village. These hand-washing facilities will later be managed communally by the communities to support their residents in maintaining a healthy lifestyle.

ACCOUNTING INTERNATIONAL SEMINAR

Accounting Undergraduate Program of Parahyangan Catholic University (UNPAR) held a Sustainability Accounting International Seminar on January 27, 2020 for two days in Notohamiprodo Building, Ministry of Finance of the Republic of Indonesia, Wahidin Raya Street number 1 Jakarta with topic of “Current and Future Issues of Sustainability Accounting” and on January 28, 2020 located in UNPAR Postgraduate Building, Merdeka Street number 30, Bandung, with topic of “Sustainability Accounting: Principles and Reporting”. The purpose of the seminar were: 1) A place of discussion for practitioners and academics from within and outside the country regarding ideas and practices related to sustainability issues, 2) Gaining insight and knowledge related to solving organizational problems faced by organizations related to sustainability, 3) Room of discussion related to the role of business in achieving SDG's, 4) Obtaining knowledge of SASB standards, 5) Obtaining an understanding of the application of SASB standards in organizations related to the preparation of sustainability reports. In its implementation, the Accounting Study Program collaborates with the Fiscal Policy Agency-Ministry of Finance of the Republic of Indonesia, the Sustainability Accounting Standards Board (SASB), the Indonesian Institute of Management Accountants (IAMI), Price Waterhouse Coopers (PwC), and Ernst & Young (EY).

SDGs 5: GENDER EQUALITY

Indonesia has always had its own gender-equality heroes in its historical narrative, and many people are celebrated in these parades including Cut Nyak Dien and Kartini. Nowadays, the women's movement in Indonesia has been growing, with thousands of women marching in cities across the country last month to support women's rights and gender equality. However, according to the Global Gender Gap Report 2020, it will take another 100 years to achieve gender equality based on the current progress rate. UNPAR is one of the educational institutions that supports and encourages gender equality through its various activities and initiatives such as several Webinars on Women Empowerment which were held in 2020.

EMPOWERING WOMEN THROUGH BUSINESS INDEPENDENCE

The *Pengabdian Masyarakat Kampung Berseri Astra (Pengmas KBA) Menuju Desa Sejahtera* team, a collaboration between Astra and Parahyangan Catholic University (UNPAR), held a webinar with the theme, "Tips for Success for Womenpreneurs in West Java" on Tuesday, July 14, 2020. The webinar was attended by the UNPAR community, representatives of Village-Owned Enterprises (BUMDes), fostered partners of UNPAR and Astra, as well as the general public, and it presented Mrs. Atalia Praratya Ridwan Kamil, Chairperson of the West Java Dekranasda, as the keynote speaker, Prof. Dr. Hamfri Djajadikerta (Faculty of Economics, UNPAR), and from the practitioner's side, Patchouli (owner of Kebab Turki Baba Rafi), and Githa Nafeeza (owner of Shabu Hachi). The webinar discussed the use of opportunities available, especially during a pandemic. The current pandemic has brought changes to consumer behavior which include a stay-at-home lifestyle; the shifting of consumer needs to basic needs in the form of food, health and safety of body and soul; and an increase in digitization; and a shift in society towards a more empathetic direction. Businesses can apply the ATM principle—observe, imitate, and modify—in response to these changes. One example is the production of masks, which were originally produced in a normal form, but that today are produced in various models. The use of digitization can also have a large impact on maintaining business stability; for example, by implementing an online buying and selling scheme that can actually reach consumers on various islands in Indonesia.

REVIEWING THE CHALLENGES OF CYBERBULLYING IN WOMEN DURING THE PANDEMIC

Parahyangan Catholic University (UNPAR), in collaboration with Bully.id, held a Webinar entitled "Cyberbullying of Women: Challenges to Pandemic and Work from Home". The webinar took place on Monday, June 13, 2020 by inviting Dr. Niken Savitri, S.H., MCL. (lecturer in Criminal Law at UNPAR) and Agita Pasaribu, S.H., M.H. (CEO and Founder of Bully.id) as resource persons, Dr.iur. Liona Nanang Supriatna, S.H., M.Hum (dean of the Faculty of Law UNPAR) and Nefa Claudia Meliala, S.H., M.H (head of UNPAR's "Protection" LBH) as moderator. Dr. Niken Savitri discussed KBGO, which had to do with direct violence against someone based on sex or gender (UN High Commissioner for Refugees, UNHCR) including actions that cause physical, mental or sexual harm or suffering, threats to such acts, coercion and the abolition of liberty. The types of KBGO include privacy violations, stalking, damaging reputation/credibility, harassment, threats, violence, intimidation, hacking sites, revenge porn, and changing images. In the WFH work environment, cyberbullying is experienced by a lot of women. A survey of 351 respondents showed that 86 people were victims of sexual harassment during WFH, 68 people witnessed sexual harassment, and 30 people had been victims and witnesses of sexual harassment (Never Okay Project and SAFENet, 2020). Looking at the results, it can be seen that 85% of companies did not have a sexual harassment policy during WFH. The advice to companies was to design various initiatives or strategies related to sexual harassment, especially education for employees so that HRDs could find out what happened to the victim anonymously.

16 DAYS OF ANTIVIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN HOPEHELPS 2020: STRONGER TOGETHER!

HopeLine series 16HAKTP Episode 2 broadcasted on Tuesday, 17th November 2020. This series featured a conversation between Mega Ayu Putri from HopeHelps Trisakti and Angelica Wahono from the HopeHelps Network about everything there is to know about the 16 Days Anti Violence Against Women campaign. Every year, this activity takes place from November 25, the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women, and runs until December 10, which is International Human Rights Day. This time span was chosen to make a symbolic connection between violence against women and human rights, and to emphasize that violence against women is a form of human rights violation. Eliminating violence against women requires joint work and synergy from women human rights activists, government, and society in general.

SDGs 6: CLEAN WATER AND SANITATION

Water is a natural resource that is important for human life. However, access to clean water is still a serious problem that has not been properly resolved in Indonesia, with around 72 million people experiencing difficulties accessing clean water. Therefore, water conservation has become one of the main topics of attention to contribute to Indonesia's SDG achievement. We have adopted various initiatives to encourage our students, lecturers, employees to reduce water consumption and increase efficiency in water management through such things as the implementation of rainwater storage system and the installation of water purifiers.

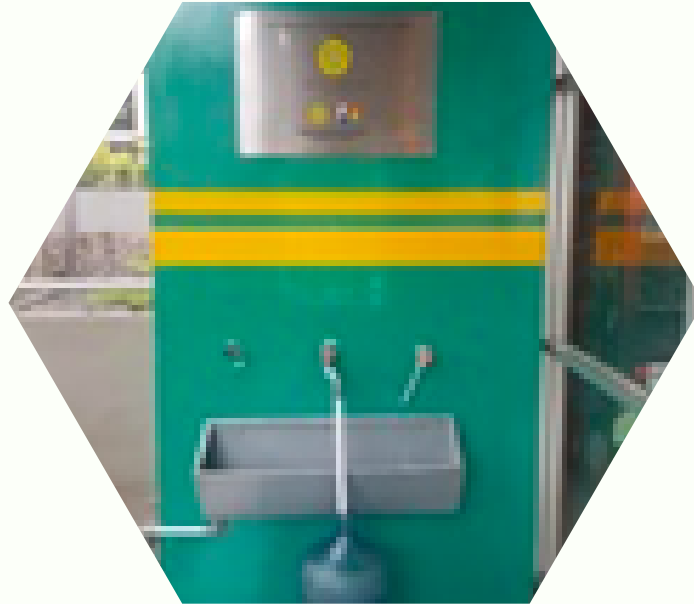


RAINWATER STORAGE SYSTEM

Parahyangan Catholic University (UNPAR) has a rainwater storage system that conserves groundwater and reduces the risk of rainwater stagnation. This system begins with the rainwater storage located on the roof of the PPAG Building. Then, rainwater is channeled through a pipe leading to a rainwater distortion located in front of Building 10. The system provided is still simple, but UNPAR has the ambition to improve the system so that it is not only useful for internal parties, but also for the community. The preservation of groundwater aims to create savings in the use of groundwater by the Indonesian people. Exploitation of groundwater is still a problem for people in Indonesia because they are still dependent on groundwater, especially when running a business. UNPAR has always participated in the conservation of groundwater. The storage of rainwater, in addition to conserving groundwater, can reduce UNPAR's dependence on groundwater. Rainwater inundation is not a big risk faced by UNPAR; however, if UNPAR has stagnant water, the community and UNPAR will certainly suffer losses. UNPAR is willing to develop the existing system so that other parties can follow in UNPAR's footsteps.

WATER PURIFIER

Parahyangan Catholic University (UNPAR) provides water purifiers in the majority of UNPAR faculty buildings. Water purification is a collaborative program between UNPAR and IKA UNPAR, IKA Jabodetabek Region, IKA Faculty of Social and Political Sciences, and IKA Faculty of Law class of 1977, among others. This provision began at the 5th Congress of the UNPAR IKA Management Accountability Report for the period 2012-2016, which was realized in 2017. The water purifiers are basically built on a system that eliminates 90-95% of harmful substances contained in drinking water. There are at least three water purification technologies that are used in every water purifier product: distillation, deionization, and reverse-osmosis, even though all three are never used for one product. Because of their excellent ability to get rid of bacteria and germs in water, water purifiers create conditions in which people today can consume drinking water that is completely pure. The use of water purifiers also aims to reduce dependence on plastic bottles as the people at UNPAR are encouraged to bring personal bottles and refill them at the water purifiers.

The energy aspect in sustainability is quite complex, and energy availability is directly related to the national or regional government; it also can directly cause several environmental problems such as decrease air quality and contribute to climate change. In addition, the capital investment required to provide renewable and sustainable energy sources, such as bioenergy or solar-powered electricity, is not small; therefore, we start from a simpler and more affordable way such as the electricity saving program and the utilization of biodigester and waste cutting machines that produce biogas as an alternative energy source.

ELECTRICITY SAVING PROGRAM

The electricity saving program is carried out by Parahyangan Catholic University (UNPAR) in line with the slogan UNPARHijau (GreenUNPAR) in several activities. Buildings 9 and 10 UNPAR have large windows in front of the main lift on each floor which run parallel to the rising sun. This placement aims to provide a path for sunlight to illuminate each floor of Buildings 9 and 10 from morning to evening, so the use of lights and electrical energy to illuminate the buildings is not necessary. Each classroom in the UNPAR buildings has large windows that allow sunlight to enter, so that the use of lights and electrical energy can be reduced. The bulbs used in UNPAR's classrooms and buildings are all LED bulbs, which are more energy efficient than ordinary bulbs because the intensity of light per watt is greater compared to incandescent or fluorescent bulbs. At night, only a few lights are turned on for the purpose of lighting. In addition, lecturers, students, and employees are accustomed to turning off air conditioners and only turning on necessary lights in classrooms in the morning.

BIODIGESTER

In following UNPAR Earth Day, Parahyangan Catholic University (UNPAR) held an activity which took place at the Lobby of the UNPAR Rectorate, on Monday, April 22, 2019. This activity was held in collaboration with the General and Technical Bureau (BUT), Student Union (PM), and start-ups Kahiji (UNPAR alumni), which is engaged in the environmental sector, and the Greenate of the UNPAR student community in the environmental field. This event was attended by the rectorate, lecturers, staff, and UNPAR students. One of events was the inauguration of the UNPAR biodigester, as well as a trial of the first biodigester installation at UNPAR, which is located in the area of the Faculty of Industrial Technology (FTI) and the Faculty of Economics (FE). A biodigester is a system that accelerates the decomposition of organic matter. The decomposition creates biogas and other compounds produced through anaerobic decomposition. The biogas can then be used as cooking fuel, for heating and electricity generation, and for running engines. This installation is not only beneficial for UNPAR, but also for the surrounding community, in particular the residents of RW01 and RW11 in Ciumbuleuit.

Decent Work and Economic Growth aims to promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all. The standard of living may improve when youth and recent graduates receive specific education or training that can be applied in real world scenarios. INFORMATICS LEARNING PROGRAM DESIGN BASED ON COMPUTATIONAL THINKING AT SUKAPURA SPECIAL SCHOOL

Faculty of Social and Political Sciences, Parahyangan Catholic University (FISIP UNPAR) partnered with one of the Sukapura special schools in Kiaracondong. Sukapura special school has 3 types of disabilities (type B for the disabled, type C for the disabled, type E for multidisability). FISIP UNPAR found that the level of intelligence of students varies widely; therefore, collaboration was created with a social enterprise in the city of Bandung who is also a UNPAR alumnus, namely Code for Social. This project started with the identification of problems in inclusive education for people with disabilities. The most visible problem is the problem of independence, that is, at least people with disabilities are able to work and fulfill their daily needs because there are no learning programs needed in the world of work today. There is an opportunity for IR to be accessed by people with disabilities, so FISIP UNPAR used a design thinking approach and distributed the alpha version to Sukapura Special School to get input. FISIP UNPAR have been learning for about 6 months and have consulted the FGD.

CLUSTER VALUE CHAIN DEVELOPMENT AT CIREUNDEU VILLAGE

SDGs 13: CLIMATE ACTION

Global warming is causing long-term changes to our climate system. The threat of these changes is real and indisputable for all human civilization. Today, greenhouse gas emissions are 50% higher than in 1990, and climate-related disasters cause annual average economic losses of hundreds of billions of dollars. In addition, geo-physical disasters, 91% of which are climate related, impact humans heavily,. By 2017, it is estimated that humans had caused about 1.0°C of global warming above pre-industrial levels. Sea levels have risen by about 20 cm (8 inches) since 1880 and are projected to rise another 30–122 cm (1 to 4 feet) by 2100. All of these effects will cause more catastrophes unless we act now. Humans can make a difference and protect the planet through education, innovation, and adherence to climate commitments. These changes will provide a great opportunity to modernize infrastructure, create jobs and drive prosperity around the world. UNPAR has taken part in several initiatives by conducting Greenate UNPAR as a part of Plastic Free Parade in 2020 and participating in the online international conference on environmental education called ICETLAWBE in 2020.

SDGs 15: LIFE ON LAND

Thirty percent of the earth's surface is covered by forest, and this is an important habitat for millions of species and a source of clean air and water. It is also important for fighting climate change. Every year, 13 million hectares of forest are lost and 3.6 billion hectares of dry land are degraded. We must take action to reduce the loss of natural habitats and biodiversity that are part of our shared heritage. As of 2020, 31,000 species were threatened with extinction and this number represented 27% of the 116,000 species listed on the IUCN red list. During the period 2015-2020, ten million hectares of forest were destroyed every year. UNPAR participated in protecting endangered species and conserving forests through a podcast called "AWAREARTH" to raise student awareness regarding the impact of the pandemic on animals and the utilization of waste reduction machine to reduce the negative impact of waste on the environment and wildlife.

AWAREARTH PODCAST

In AWAREARTH Episode 1: "Bandung Zoo and the Pandemic", the main discussion was about zoos. The world situation that is being hit by the COVID-19 pandemic has not only taken away human freedom but also animal life. Unfortunately not all people know about and understand this issue in a comprehensive way. Therefore, it is necessary to raise awareness from the local community, and that means students as well. AWAREARTH in this episode invited two great, young speakers. They were the founders of a non-profit organization that works to help animals.



WASTE CUTTING MACHINES AND CUSTOMIZED MACHINE

Regarding waste sorting, UNPAR currently has a plastic chopping machine and another, more customized machine. Through the research of lecturers and students at the Faculty of Industrial Technology (FTI), a product mock-up of plastic waste was made. For organic waste, UNPAR is trying to maximize the existence of a biodigester to process organic waste into biogas, and it is hoped that it can reduce the total volume of waste. Of course, this can also reduce waste management costs in the UNPAR environment.
