Part II: Description of Actions:

Because of COVID-19 and lack of funds, we could not implement most of our planned activities. However, one major and important project we implemented is entitled “Increasing Access to clean Water for Students in Begoro”. Here, Satchet water was produced. We collaborated with other organizations called M SEED Enterprise and Presbyterian Senior High School in Begoro – a community in the Easter Regional part of Ghana, to implement this project.

Under this project, we drilled borehole to serve as source of water. We purchased two Rambo 1000 poly tanks to serve as water storage facility. We purchased water treatment machines including Reverse Osmosis, UV Light, pumps and filters from M SEED Enterprise. These machines helped to treat the water from the borehole to remove harmful bacteria in the water to make it safe for drinking. After treatment, the clean water is pumped into a cutting machine called Koyo which cut and seal the water into satchet to be consumed by the students and the entire Begoro community.

Our new project which begun January this year is to plant economic trees like Mango to cover at least Fifty (50) acres of land. The idea behind this project is that the plant will reduce emission of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere. This fights climate change. Additionally, Selling of the fruits when matured will bring income to the women which contribute to women empowerment. Planting of the trees becomes a job for the farmers but women empowerment and the fight against climate change is our major focus. We therefore call donors to support us financially.

Part III: Measurement of Outcomes:

The School mentioned earlier with annual population of **Two Thousand Seven Hundred (2700)** students now drinks clean water which prevents all water borne diseases. The drinking of this clean water extends beyond the School community to the surrounding communities with about five thousand (5000) population.
