REPORT ON INTERNATIONAL LITERACY DAY 2021

Excerpt of the celebration by Youths Enterprise Development & Innovation Society (YEDIS)

The 8th of September was proclaimed International Literacy Day by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization <u>UNESCO</u> in 1966 to remind the international community of the importance of literacy for individuals, communities, and societies and the need for intensified efforts towards more literate societies. Literacy is a vital component of the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals (<u>SDG</u>) and the UNs 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

Since 1967, International Literacy Day (ILD) celebrations have taken place annually around the world to remind the public of the importance of literacy as a matter of dignity and human rights and advance the literacy agenda towards a more literate and sustainable society. Despite progress, literacy challenges persist, with at least 773 million young people and adults lacking basic literacy skills today.


