

## **Combined Annual Reports from 2017-20**

Charushila (UK registered charity no 1163253) is an organisation working with youth and children in realizing environmental projects within the community. It works internationally and in the UK. Charushila is a signatory to the UN Global compact and produces a report every two years.

Charushila has no employees or shareholders.

Charushila held trustee meetings and also met with other stakeholders, users, and advisors during the years of this COE report for the UN Global Compact.

Phase I of the 'Energy garden' project at Acton Central station, West London, that Charushila worked on with the train company Arriva, and environmental charities-Groundwork Trust and Energy Gardens- was formally inaugurated on 18<sup>th</sup> May 2018 by the MP for Ealing Central and Acton, Dr Rupa Huq. Further work in Phase II will involve water harvesting, solar power and gardening sessions in conjunction with Energy Gardens and station staff. Work on the maintenance, new planting and other works carries on, now with new volunteers. As the station is used by 1.8 million passengers, we estimate that the small garden would have had a substantial impact on users and staff.

However, we managed to meet online and via telephone with trustees and others. Gardening work at the Acton Central station was resumed after lockdown ended in 2021 and continues slowly.
