Part II. Description of Actions

Over the last four years Indian Mountain School has taken a number of actions that reflect the spirit of the principles of the Global Compact:

Curricular

- Have added an Introduction to the Sustainable Development Goals class
- The annual Poquonook Solutions Symposium (a SDG student generated solution showcase) has become the capstone project for the school.
- Have redesigned the 9th grade Sustainability Science to become a 7th grade science course
- Diversifying curriculum
 - Expanding works and geographic areas studied (i.e. broader array of authors of, characters represented in, settings, and themes in literature read, etc.)
 - Principles of Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion are a required component of curricular planning for all courses.

Infrastructure

- Completed the construction of an environmental studies classroom, called the Outdoor Working Lab (OWL)
- Completed the installation of a campus solar array
- New fieldhouse (currently under construction) will be heated and cooled using geothermal pumps.
- 4+ EV charging stations are planned
- Have committed to environmentally responsible building for all future construction projects
- Have established a "cut down a tree/replace a tree" policy

Other

- IMS has established two new senior administrative roles: the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Director, and the Director of Sustainability Programming & Initiatives.
- In its hiring practices Indian Mountain seeks to increase the diversity of its faculty and staff.
- Program to eliminate single use plastic scheduled to begin fall of 2022.
- IMS continues to engage with SDSN Youth's Global Schools Program.

Part III. Measurement of Outcomes

Curricular

- The annual Poquonook Solutions Symposium (a SDG student generated solution showcase) will be entering its seventh year.
- In the time since the last COE, 170+ students have completed the *Global Citizenship* course and have participated in the Solutions Symposium
- 140 students have completed the Introduction to the Sustainable Development Goals class
- In the time since the last COE, 39 additional separate solutions have been presented during the annual Symposium

<u>Infrastructure</u>

- New fieldhouse (currently under construction) will be heated and cooled using geothermal pumps.
- Campus solar array now supplies electric power for one dorm, the arts building, and meets part of the needs of the main academic building.
- 4+ EV charging stations will be installed during the fall of 2022

Other

- Administrators have been hired to fill both the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion and the Sustainability Programming & Initiatives Directorship positions.
- Two IMS faculty have been recognized as Global School Advocates, a program of SDSN Youth. One of these faculty also served in the capacity of Advocate Mentor in the year following their term.
