We have lost much: peace, sleep, time with relatives. Some have lost their homes and some have lost that which is most valuable of all: those who have died defending us. The UCU community has said farewell to 19 heroes... thousands of Ukraine's best sons and daughters have paid the highest price for our freedom.

We have gone a long way this year. The whole world has seen that Ukrainians are a nation capable of victory over a great empire which, for hundreds of years, has wanted one thing - the end of our existence. Ukrainians have united in a fight against evil, and this unity is our greatest strength.

We extend a helping hand to those in need. We are working. Our university has not stopped the educational process for a single day. And, most importantly, we have endured as a community and as a nation. This is all thanks to our soldiers, who have firmly set for themselves the task of defending Ukraine's independence.

Even before the full-scale invasion, an operational base was formed, and we created a strategic planning process at UCU which developed a number of scenarios for the university's work. Our position was proactive. We thought about the safety of our students and staff and refined all of our operational processes. Every day our team worked like a single mechanism where everyone understood their tasks. Though our staff's workload has tripled, we have been able to cope with these difficult conditions, and every day we have been able to contribute to Ukraine's victory.

Despite the brutal realities of war, we have been able to carry out our obligations to our students, professors, staff, and partners with dignity. We have not allowed the university to stagnate. Our strategy remains in force. We continue to develop, and our university's international partnerships grow stronger and stronger.

At a price of great sacrifice, Ukraine today is forming a new global order and creating a powerful revolution in the whole world. The fight continues on various fronts and this produces results; perhaps not as quickly as we would like, but we have no right to grow weary. We should continue to grow stronger and stronger.

I also call you to action. If you feel that there is injustice somewhere, speak up, do something! Because our civic position now is decisive.







#### THE HUMANITARIAN FRONT

The UCU Volunteer Headquarters is involved with medical and material-technical support of military hospitals and mobile medical units and the distribution of medicine, food, clothing, and hygiene items to people who have suffered from Russian aggression.


Volunteers have developed mechanisms for receiving help from abroad and from local businesses and benefactors. The Volunteer Headquarters refined its process for sorting and inventorying items received and launched a process to fulfill requests for help.

#### THE MEDICAL FRONT

The charitable organization Volunteer and Defense Center and the Wings of Hope charitable foundation are key partners for UCU in providing medicines and medical and tactical items for the military and civilians throughout Ukraine.

International teams of medical specialists from Team Rubicon and SMART Medical Aid, the Ukrainian Resuscitation Council, Rapid Aid Liaison Group, and others have been working on UCU premises.



#### THE INFORMATIONAL FRONT

UCU is actively working on the informational front. A separate English-language webpage, warinua. ucu.edu.ua, has been created to collect and maintain information about the university's work in wartime.

UCU professors and graduates of the School of Journalism and Communications developed the instructional site **Post To Stop War**, whose mission is to make dialogue about the war abroad more effective. With no fleeting concepts or vague formulations, our professors and graduates speak in various languages about the Russian-Ukrainian War.

In the project Little Stories about a Big War, the team gathers and presents stories about ordinary Ukrainians who remain in the background but, like soldiers on the front, demonstrate exceptional tenacity, bravery, and self-sacrifice. The project team is convinced that this experience should not be lost.

They have managed to document more than 100 stories which involve not only individuals from the Lviv Region but also from eastern and southern Ukraine.

## THE PRAYERFUL AND PSYCHOLOGICAL FRONT

Under the care of the Dean's Office for Pastoral Matters at the University, daily liturgical services were held throughout the year, including memorials for those who perished in the war and spiritual care and conversations with refugees who sheltered in the Collegium and in the educational building on Prospect John Paul II Street.

A crisis counseling center also opened at the university. The counselors consisted of master's level psychology and social work students who were supervised by UCU's professors. The main clients were adults 18 to 50 years old who were undergoing trauma and crisis.

## SUPPORT FOR INTERNALLY DISPLACED PERSONS

With the support of many benefactors. UCU volunteers prepared temporary shelters for refugees fleeing from the war. Internally displaced families sheltered on the premises of the Faculty of Theology and Philosophy and at the two Collegium buildings. In the first three months of work, the shelter harbored 340 people, the majority of whom were individuals with special physical and psychological needs along with their family members. Students of the Social Work program helped individuals and families who lost their homes and provided information and consultation for resolving various administrative, logistical and social questions.



On March 1st, the Kharkiv Oblast Government Administration building was hit by Russian rockets. UCU journalists documented this through UCU's "Little Stories of a Big War" when they visited the city during the summer.

# A PROFESSOR – A SOLDIER OF THE LIGHT

Despite the war, the Ukrainian Catholic University community chose honorees for the Professor of the Year award, based on nominations from students, alumni, and colleagues.

The award was a good opportunity to thank professors for their masterly, inspired, and multifaceted work with students both inside and outside the classroom. Through this honor, UCU's academic community and student body continue to emphasize the importance of appropriate assessment of quality teaching at the university and the spread of successful teaching practices.

An admissions campaign during the conditions of war was a challenge for all including the university, entrants, and their parents. Nevertheless, UCU filled 92.5% of its slots for bachelor's programs. Last year this figure was 89%.

# HONORS FROM THE NATIONAL MODEL UN

The team of Ukrainian Catholic University and Kyiv-Mohyla Academy took part in the World Conference of the National Model United Nations held in New York City. This was the first time a Ukrainian university participated in the world Model UN in person since it was founded in 1927.

The students received significant support and a special distinction from the National Model UN which had previously not been given to any team. This was a gratifying award for the significant

and visible participation of the Ukrainian delegation.

"Understanding that our frontline" is the awareness of youth of the world, we used every minute there, every corner, and every forum to speak about the brutal Russian aggression. #### STUDENT LIFE:

- Svyatoslav Lushney, a firstyear student in the Computer Studies bachelor's program of the UCU Applied Sciences Faculty, won a gold medal in the 14th International Olympics in Astronomy and Astrophysics, competing among high school and college students from 48 countries.
- UCU students established a project to protect art during wartime. The co-founders of the charitable organization Save Art UA, Iryna Krechkovska and Mykola Kryvyi, decided to provide protection on the cultural front and started a project in which they collected information about ruined architectural monuments of Ukraine and published it on an interactive map. The team also collected money to preserve these monuments. The project's partners included the Ukrainian Cultural Fund, the Ministry of Culture and Information Policy of Ukraine, the Architectural Palace of the National Union of Ukrainian Architects, and the British Council.
- Six UCU students were chosen for internships at Google. "Working within a large corporation significantly changes your attitude. You understand that this is an open and tolerant community. As many people as possible should try their hand at an internship abroad and then return home, because our generation will create change," says Yuliya Maksymyuk, third-year student, specialty IT and Business Analytics.

Many students, staff, and graduates of UCU are defending Ukraine on the front lines. As of September 2022, 18 students, 12 professors and staff of UCU, and some 30 alumni are serving in the Ukrainian Army.

Maksym Osadchuk, a doctoral candidate in UCU's Humanities Faculty, was on the Maidan, and in 2014 he left his home in his native Crimea, occupied by Russian soldiers, and went to defend Ukraine as part of the volunteer battalion Aydar. After returning from the war, Osadchuk tried civil and scholarly work. Then in February he again went to defend

For personal bravery and sacrifice, demonstrated in defense of the state sovereignty and territorial integrity of Ukraine, for faithfulness to his military oath, Oleksandr Shyrshyn, a graduate of the Master's Program in Non-Profit Management of the UCU Institute of Leadership and Management, was awarded the order "For bravery," 3rd degree.



Ukraine. Osadchuk also received the Bohdan Solchanyk Scholarship, named after an UCU professor slain by a sniper on the Maidan.

"Today we are defending not only ourselves but all Europe, all the values on which European society today is based: human rights, respect for dignity. We overcame the pandemic. We will overcome Putin." – Maksym Osadchuk.

**Orysya Masna**, a student of the Social Work program and the communicator of UCU's Alumni Relations
Department, volunteered in a military hospital in Lviv from the beginning of the war. She eventually joined the volunteer medical battalion Hospitallers, which works on the front lines.

"What most motivates me in my work is preserving the lives of those who directly risk their lives on the field of war. If uninvited guests have come into my country, I can't sit and look as they 'visit' there," says Masna.

**Alina Mykhaylova** has been involved in the war since 2014. She's a paramedic, civil activist, deputy of the Kyiv City Council, and a student



**Serhiy Prytula,** civic activist, Ukrainian TV host, volunteer. He is a student enrolled in UCU's Master's Program in Public Administration. He is a volunteer and has helped the Ukrainian Army since 2014. His fund purchases necessary supplies and technical items for soldiers.

"The phenomenon of volunteering is something that the Soviet authorities were unable to erase from within Ukrainians' genetic code. Ukrainians have gathered together on an altruistic basis, because we understand that if we don't help our army, it won't be motivated. of UCU's master's program in public administration. She now coordinates medical services in her unit and is involved with evacuating those wounded on the frontlines.

"After victory, we'll have still more to do. So there's a desire to work on creating new policies and institutions which Ukraine needs today. We need to form a new generation, to develop effective projects," declared Mykhaylova..

Dmytro Dymyd is 21. In February 2022, he stopped his studies at UCU and joined the Armed Forces of Ukraine. At the start of June, his brother Artem perished in the war. The war forced Dmytro to rethink many things, but he didn't reject values instilled in him since childhood. He feels that he is needed here and now.

Dmytro is convinced that victory is ours, but each must take part. "I think that victory is the most believable scenario. We are successfully working towards it. But we must remain realistic, and that victory will not come on its own. Each of us must volunteer or donate money for the army. It's important to take part."

**Andriy Romanyuk**, with a candidate's degree in technical sciences, teaches basic coding at the Applied Sciences Faculty. He joined the army on February 25, 2022.

"Our unit received significant help from Ukrainian Catholic University. Volunteers donated to purchase automobiles, a minivan, and other technical equipment. The help of volunteers gives the feeling of love of which His Beatitude Lubomyr Husar spoke. So I want to thank everyone for their work and wish them strength and inspiration to continue."

Being aware of the centuries of aggression of our northern neighbor, **Roman Lozynskyi** has been motivated to prepare for war his whole life. He is now 28 and a national deputy of Ukraine.

"What happened in 2022, and in 2014, and what's been happening for centuries, proves that in our history there have not even been a few decades without Russian aggression in various forms: political, cultural, military. So I am convinced that we must continue to be ready to defend our country," says Lozynskyi.

We thank all our defenders who fight for our independence and allow us to study and work even in conditions of war.

## DON'T STOP WORKING, NOT FOR A MOMENT

Even with the start of the full-scale invasion, the educational process at Ukrainian Catholic University did not stop. UCU adopted a service learning format.

Thus, professors and students looked for projects where they could maximally serve Ukraine with their abilities and knowledge.

"We cannot foresee when the war will end. But we know that Ukraine will need young professionals who will take on responsibility for rebuilding the country. We believe that this should include people who base their actions on values. So we should remain flexible in developing various versions of activities, relying on a number of scenarios for our functioning, and continuing our community life thanks to the best execution of the mission of the university and our educational goals."



## Two service learning projects at UCU received honors from Uniservitate Global Award 2022.

These were the projects "I'm different!" introduced by Yuliya Vinton for the course "In search of God," and "Shelter for internally displaced persons," which the university launched within one of its instructional buildings.

"UCU is on the right track in introducing service learning, and the projects we're executing are of high quality, well-planned, systematized, influential in society, and can be broadened as better examples of our experience. In this way, the goal affirmed in the UCU Strategy will be achieved, above and beyond quantifiable indicators. Behind every digit stands a product of very high quality."

### DIGITAL TRANSFORMATION

"A modern management system, an entrepreneurial university" – this is one of 10 strategic goals in UCU Strategy 2025, under the title "A university that serves." To implement this goal, an accounting system and an interactive portal for UCU data were introduced.

The university introduced a system for electronic circulation of documents, renewed the university's internal portal "My UCU," and launched UCU Wiki.

Oleh Lahodnyuk launched a digital transformation at UCU at the start of 2022. He shares his vision: "The next project we're planning will be a renewed system for the Dean's Office and a CRM system for the

whole university. Other auxiliary instruments will also appear alongside them. UCU is continuing its development in conditions of war, so we have not stopped introducing digital transformation. When we build a new ecosystem of informational resources. this will open up new possibilities and give an opportunity to quickly and effectively make new decisions."

### A DECISIVE TIME FOR THE COUNTRY

Students of the Social Work Program actively help on the volunteer front.

Several social work students worked in UCU's relief center which was established for displaced children. This shelter was housed in the building of UCU's Faculty of Theology and Philosophy. Other students worked with teams of rehabilitators, including physical therapists and occupational therapists of the Department of Physical and Occupational Therapy of the Faculty of Health Sciences, to help wounded soldiers.

## LEGAL SUPPORT

Since 2014, the Legal Clinic of the UCU Law School, directed by Khrystyna Kovtsun, has been providing legal help at no cost to those suffering from the war.

With the new challenges of this full-scale war, the work of students of the UCU Law School has moved in two directions: legal help for internally displaced persons and those suffering due to the war, and legal assistance for soldiers, veterans, and members of their families.




## **UCU ONLINE**



UCU is launching the Angel One venture capital fund, which is starting with \$1.5 million of its own capital.



The goal of the fund, created by Ukrainian Catholic University Foundation, is to develop a startup culture in Ukraine and help young Ukrainian entrepreneurs implement their ideas. The fund will accompany projects through the whole period of their development: providing necessary

capital, contact with entrepreneurial and venture communities, and appropriate expertise.


