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Part II: Description of Actions:

Because of lack of funds, we could not implement most of our planned activities. However, one major and important project we implemented in 2020 entitled "Increasing Access to clean Water for Students in Begoro" is in operation. Here, Satchet water was produced. We collaborated with other organizations called M SEED Enterprise and Presbyterian Senior High School in Begoro – a community in the Eastern Regional part of Ghana, to implement this project.

Under this project, we drilled borehole to serve as source of water. We purchased two Rambo 1000 poly tanks to serve as water storage facility. We purchased water treatment machines including Reverse Osmosis, UV Light, pumps and filters from M SEED Enterprise. These machines helped to treat the water from the borehole to remove harmful bacteria in the water to make it safe for drinking. After treatment, the clean water is pumped into a cutting machine called Koyo which cut and seal the water into satchet to be consumed by the students and the entire Begoro community.

Additional project which begun January 2021 which was to plant economic trees like Mango to cover at least Fifty (50) acres of land suffered dry weather condition and bush fire. We are now strategizing to replant because it would help to fight climate change.

Part III: Measurement of Outcomes:

The School mentioned earlier with annual population of **Two Thousand Seven Hundred (2700)** students now drinks clean water which prevents all water borne diseases. The drinking of this clean water extends beyond the School community to the surrounding communities with about five thousand (5000) population.
