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MESSAGE FROM COUNTRY DIRECTOR

With the success of the COVID-19 vaccination program in 2022, Indonesia's economy began to recover. Social distancing measures have been relaxed, and people have started to assemble. School and activities have resumed to normal. The safe condition encouraged Gugah Nurani Indonesia to vigorously implement our community programs and commit to following health protocols. By collaborating with partners from NGOs, the private sector, universities, and the government, we intensified our efforts to conduct activities, particularly at the local level.

Gugah Nurani Indonesia has prioritized three sectors - education, health, and economy - in our community development and humanitarian programs. In the education sector, we have implemented a range of initiatives, including creative and innovative teaching training for teachers, the construction of community libraries and child learning centers, e-learning tools, and more. In the health sector, we have worked with Health Offices, Community Health Services, and health cadres to promote community-based sanitation, provide clean water, and install toilets for underprivileged families. In the economic sector, we have supported cooperatives through technical and financial support for revolving funds, empowered business groups in collaboration with the Cooperative and Small Business Offices, and collaborated with local governments to promote the products of business groups.

In response to the devastating earthquake that hit Cianjur Regency in West Java late last year, Gugah Nurani Indonesia organized an Emergency Response program. The program included various activities, such as psychosocial support services, creating child-friendly spaces, installing handwashing stations, and distributing hygiene and learning kits for children. These activities aimed to minimize the disaster's impact on children and provide them and their families with basic needs.



Gugah Nurani Indonesia is aware of the challenges that lie ahead in 2023. However, Gugah Nurani Indonesia believes that transformational development activities within society must be continued to create changes toward a better life, especially for children and vulnerable communities. Gugah Nurani Indonesia is actively collaborating with like-minded organizations to move them to walk together in program implementation to expand the coverage and impactful programs.

Gugah Nurani Indonesia is grateful for the support of all parties involved in implementing transformative community development programs. We hope these efforts will significantly contribute to improving children's lives and their communities.

WHO WE ARE

Gugah Nurani Indonesia is a development Non-Government Organization (NGO) that works based on Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly in child rights fulfillment and community development. Gugah Nurani Indonesia is an organization with a legal entity under the Ministry of Justice & Human Rights, with the registration number AHU-594.AH.01.04, dated 24th February 2009.

Gugah Nurani Indonesia was established by Good Neighbors International, an International development and humanitarian NGO from South Korea founded in 1991, with General Consultative Status from the United Nations of Economic and Social Council (UN ECOSOC).

Good Neighbors International came to Indonesia for the first time during tsunami emergency relief in Meulaboh, Aceh, in 2005. Gugah Nurani Indonesia today has a presence in 15 Community Development Projects (CDP) and 2 Projects in 13 provinces throughout Indonesia.

Gugah Nurani Indonesia is committed to ensuring children have access to their rights. We empower children to advocate for themselves and work with parents and communities to safeguard their well-being. To further our mission, we have developed a comprehensive strategy that includes the following action plans: (1) Raising awareness about child rights and protection through our Safeguarding Policy, (2) Establishing a Child Protection Working Group committee, (3) Developing a referral and networking system for child protection issues, and (4) Monitoring and tracking data related to children's cases within the community. Through these efforts, we hope to make a positive difference in the lives of children and promote their best interests.

Besides, Gugah Nurani Indonesia has also launched several initiatives to increase stakeholder involvement to ensure the full implementation of children's rights. These include: (1) Identifying key stakeholders who can contribute to the fulfillment of children's rights, (2) Conducting workshops to educate stakeholders on their obligations in fulfilling children's rights, and (3) Developing IEC materials to promote children's rights and run awareness campaigns. By taking these steps, Gugah Nurani Indonesia is paving the way for a brighter future for children everywhere.

Celebrating National Children's Day

Indonesia celebrates National Children's Day every year on the 23rd of July. The official theme for 2022 was "Protected Children, Advanced Indonesia." Gugah Nurani Indonesia joined in celebrating this important day and continues working towards protecting and advancing children in our communities.

In Enrekang CDP, the main event of the National Children's Day celebration was held in Abubakar Lambogo Square, Galonta Village, Enrekang Regency, South Sulawesi. The event offered various competitions to encourage children's creativity and confidence, including speech and coloring contests and traditional games to promote playing together. Moreover, a Child Service Center was available, offering services like creating Child Identity Cards and mobile library facilities for families and children to access.

This Children's Day activity was carried out entirely by the children's forum members and was dedicated to children in Enrekang.

Massenrempulu Children's Forum for achievements in three categories: the 2nd Innovative Children's Forum, the Best in Cluster 4, and the 2nd Best Regional Children's Forum in 2022. This year, too, Enrekang successfully won the title of Child-friendly District at the Primary level.

Birth Certificate Registration for Children in Jeneponto

In 2022, Gugah Nurani Indonesia facilitated the distribution of birth certificates to 530 children in Jeneponto CDP. We cooperated with the Department of Population and Civil Registry of Jeneponto Regency to ensure the initiative's success. The birth certificate is legal proof of one's identity and safeguards children from violence, exploitation, and abuse. Without a birth certificate, children cannot verify their age, leaving them at a higher risk of being forced into early marriage, labor, trafficking, or other harmful exploitation. At the same time, a birth certificate will extend a child's access to health, education, and government facilities.

Global Youth Network Program: Empowering Young Minds

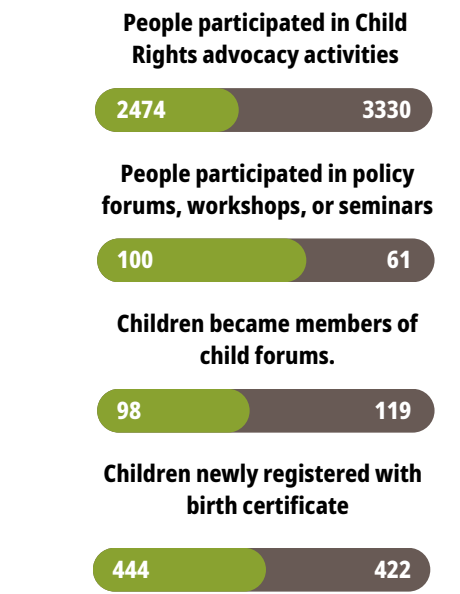
The Global Youth Network program is designed to unite young people from various countries where Good Neighbors is present. It was conducted via online video conference involving around 200 children from different countries, including South Korea, Rwanda, Kyrgyz Republic, Mongolia, Ethiopia, Bangladesh, Kenya, Vietnam, Cambodia, Tajikistan, Mozambique, Malawi, Uganda, Philippines, and Indonesia. It provides a platform for young individuals to become independent, build coexistence and global awareness, and express their opinions about pressing global issues like the climate crisis. Through exchange activities with their peers from diverse cultures and backgrounds, participants learn to practice Good Actions in their daily lives.

35 students from Indonesia participated in this activity, divided into three sessions held in 2022. They gained valuable knowledge about the climate crisis and created videos showcasing their actions to reduce its impact. Additionally, they could interact with students from two other countries during a matching session. Here, they shared their commitment to contribute to climate action and exchanged ideas to make a difference.



Collaborative Campaign to Protect Children and Women in Manggarai Timur

Gugah Nurani Indonesia, in conjunction with the East Manggarai district government and East Manggarai's ECE Mothers, has launched a collective campaign to safeguard children and women. The "Saya Berani Lapor" (I dare to Report) initiative encourages community members to speak up and report any instances of violence or harassment against children and women. From district to village levels, all stakeholders have joined forces to empower the community in ensuring the safety of its most vulnerable members. Eye-catching media campaign billboards have been strategically placed in high-traffic areas to maximize the campaign's reach.

PEOPLE ENJOY THE RIGHT TO EDUCATION

Gugah Nurani Indonesia's education sector aims to improve the quality of education for children and youth. We pay attention to increasing children's participation in compulsory education, improving the relevant skills, and improving literacy, all of which are crucial to the post-pandemic world.

Gugah Nurani Indonesia's first intervention approach is to strengthen the quality of basic education, especially in Early Childhood Education (ECE), through supporting education facilities, training for teachers, support for teaching aids and educational games, and other activities. To increase school participation and quality of education from primary to secondary school, our approach is to raise parents' awareness of their children's education and to the stakeholders to provide social support in completing 12-year compulsory education. Lastly, Gugah Nurani Indonesia assists youths in developing their hard and soft skills through Vocational Training Center (VTC) in collaboration with the local government to open more job opportunities through industry and entrepreneurship.

Increased Enrolment Ratio of Children in Compulsory Education

Gugah Nurani Indonesia's education program targeting primary to secondary-age children in the 2018-2022 cycle was measured as successful in increasing the participation rate of children in our Community Development Project (CDP) in compulsory education. In Medan Deli Serdang CDP, there was a significant increase in the number of children attending school compared to the number of children of school age, from 78.2% to 90%. Meanwhile, the most significant increase in the school participation rate was in Medan CDP, from 75% to 92% of the children.

The above conditions also correlate with a decrease in the dropout rate or the proportion of children in the age group who did not continue or complete a certain level of education. For example, in Bogor Cileuksa CDP, it was previously recorded that 21.3% of children dropped out of school, and at the end of the cycle, the percentage decreased to 7.7%.

"Hello, E-Dream Project" Improved Teachers' Literacy in Technology

The COVID-19 pandemic has caused many challenges for our community in Balikpapan, East Kalimantan, particularly regarding the shifting to digital-based and distance learning. The imbalance in the quality of education between schools in the city and those in outlying areas has long been a pressing issue in primary education. The "Hello, E-Dream Project" is designed to strengthen accessibility to high-quality elementary education by establishing a community participating e-learning environment.

We gathered 153 teachers from 15 different elementary schools in districts across Balikpapan City, East Balikpapan, and North Balikpapan for creative learning and tech training series. These transformational teachers will be the backbone of learning effectiveness through Bekawan, the e-learning platform developed in the project. Not only that, but the capacity building in tech literacy also involved children as the main target and their families to support. The project will provide e-learning centers in three locations in the coming year.

Literacy Development Support for Children's Education Ecosystem

Gugah Nurani Indonesia has made significant contributions to the ecosystem of primary education in Baubau City, Southeast Sulawesi Province, by promoting literacy skills and interests among children. Our literacy program consists of several components, including increasing the capacity of teaching staff in terms of literacy and creative learning, expanding the breadth of parents' knowledge regarding literacy and parenting, motivating children to actively participate in learning activities through cultural events and storytelling, and building library facilities that serve as learning centers and community cultural hubs.

A total number of 1,505 children now have access to books and reading materials at the Kyobo Library in Lea-lea District, while 425 children have participated in storytelling activities. Additionally, the library building has been handed over to the local government's management for sustainability, and the librarian, who received our support, has prepared various activity plans.



Education Advocacy and Partnership with the Government to Eliminate Child Marriage

Gugah Nurani Indonesia has worked hard to reduce the barriers that prevent children and families from accessing education, particularly in Sukabumi, Deli Serdang, and Central Lombok coverage areas. One of the ways was by partnering with the government and carrying out several campaigns against child marriage. These campaigns aimed to raise awareness of the importance of education among parents and community leaders. We utilized various opportunities to spread knowledge, such as family visits, program meetings, special events, and regular community activities. As a result, community leaders have acknowledged that the number of child marriages in the targeted villages has decreased, and education awareness up to high school or higher has increased. With Gugah Nurani Indonesia's presence and programs, more children attend school, and child marriages have decreased. Additionally, we have made early detection to prevent child dropout rates, partnering with the village to advocate for educational support and ensuring that children at risk of dropping out finish school and work for the village office and at school.

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PEOPLE EXERCISE THE RIGHT TO HEALTH



Gugah Nurani Indonesia has been conducting outreach activities to tackle children's malnourishment and prevent infant and maternal mortality through the Positive Deviance Hearth (PDH) approach. Our national strategy to prevent infant stunting has five pillars: leadership commitment and vision, behavior change campaigns and communication, program convergence, food and nutrition security, and monitoring and evaluation. We have collaborated with local health centers and empowered health cadres to achieve our goals.

In addition to stunting, access to proper water and sanitation is critical in addressing children's malnutrition. Despite the challenges, we are committed to promoting clean and healthy living behaviors by raising awareness, establishing clean water facilities, and forming a dedicated water and sanitation committee to ensure long-term sustainability.

Improving Child Nutrition with Community-Led Total Sanitation Campaign

Meulaboh CDP conducted a successful campaign on Community-Led Total Sanitation (CLTS) in 2022 to enhance the nutritional status of children under five. The activity took place in Alue Sundak, Alue Batee, Mon Pasong, and Lueng Baro villages, and 172 community members participated, with the cooperation of local health centers.

Sanitarians from Puskesmas (health center) and Gugah Nurani Indonesia carried out the campaign, which urged mothers of children under five and communities to apply the five pillars of CLTS in their daily lives. Participants were required to implement the five pillars, and this information can be shared with other communities to encourage everyone to adopt a clean and healthy lifestyle.

Over five years, the community's hygiene behavior, particularly among parents with children under five, has improved significantly. Notably, the habit of washing hands after defecation has increased from 67% at baseline to 81% in the end-line study. Parents are also more conscientious regarding food preparation, such as ensuring cooking utensils are clean and adequately processing food. Additionally, there has been a rise in the consumption and storage of clean water and the treatment of liquid and solid waste. In 2018, around 80% of residents disposed of garbage by burning it, but by 2022, this number is projected to decrease to 67%. Gugah Nurani Indonesia has provided residents with eco-friendly waste-burning facilities to assist with this effort.

Significant Changes through Health Sector Intervention

The health programs in the Gugah Nurani Indonesia community can be categorized into two types: those focused on aiding cadres and toddlers. During the 2018-2022 work cycle, these programs significantly impacted the community in Wonokusumo, Surabaya, and Pendoworejo, Yogyakarta. Health cadres have become more confident and capable of supporting the community, with a thorough understanding of nutritious food in Infant and Young Child Feeding (IYCF), healthy food processing, and good food ingredients for toddlers. They have also become more knowledgeable about exclusive breastfeeding and have advocated for the village government and Puskesmas (health center).

Parents of toddlers have also benefited from these programs. They have developed habits related to supplementary feeding for toddlers, have become more aware of the importance of exclusive breastfeeding, and have adopted clean and healthy living practices. Interestingly, some mothers of toddlers have even felt comfortable speaking up against family members smoking inside their homes.

Improving Access to Clean Water and Sanitation in West Manggarai Regency

Compang Village in West Manggarai Regency lacked access to clean water and sanitation facilities, impacting 257 residents, including 134 men and 123 women, among them 129 children. Previously, residents had to rely on the Sepo River during the rainy season and the Nggoang River during the dry season, which required a 30-minute round trip for the Sepo River and a 90-minute round trip for the Nggoang River. This significantly disrupted daily life for children, who lacked access to water for household needs.

To address this issue, the construction of clean water facilities and public toilets was carried out, along with education on healthy defecation and hand-washing behaviors in collaboration with the village government. The project also included a commitment from the community to manage clean water and sanitation, which was recorded in the activity minutes. A Clean Water Management Committee was trained and strengthened to support this initiative through the Village Head's Decree on Clean Water Management and Environmental Sanitation.

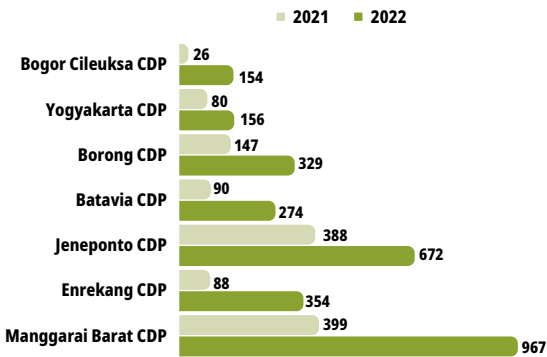




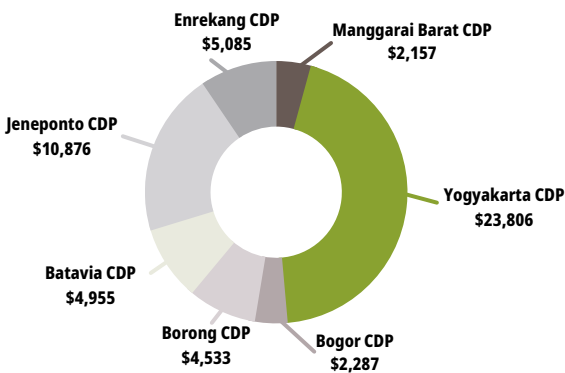
**PEOPLE ACHIEVE ECONOMIC

Gugah Nurani Indonesia's strategy to foster local communities' resilience is building an economic ecosystem through cooperatives and Income Generation Groups (IGG). To ensure the continuity of cooperative businesses, it is essential to focus on cooperative member growth and involvement and create sustainable cooperatives with good governance. This includes expanding market and partnership networks, attracting members from different sectors, and adding products demanded by customers. Additionally, emphasis should be placed on capacity strengthening through training in administration and marketing. A strong and sustainable cooperative is built on mutual need, strengthening, and benefit.

Cooperative Membership and Capital Growth

In 2021, the total number of cooperative members in seven CDPs across Indonesia was 1,218. By the end of 2022, the number of members had increased by 139%, with a total of 2,906 members. Cooperatives utilize various sources of capital, including principal savings, mandatory savings, and other deposits, to fund their operations. Among the seven cooperatives in our project areas, Sinar Nurani Mabar from Manggarai Barat CDP has the highest capital, which increased by approximately 186.37% from January to December 2022 to reach \$23,806.08.

Etika Cooperative: Supporting Small Shops in Enrekang District through Innovative Business

Etika Cooperative operates a grocery business that supports 27 small shops in Enrekang District, South Sulawesi Province. The idea emerged when the pandemic restricted people's mobility and made it difficult to obtain daily supplies due to the distance between the hilly area and the city center. Etika Cooperative offers a unique payment mechanism that allows partners to pay for their purchases at the Etika warehouse after picking up their goods. This sets Etika apart from other businesses with similar models and enables the community to improve their businesses more efficiently. As of 2022, Etika Cooperative has generated a total revenue of IDR 646,243,454 (\$45,176).

Advocacy Efforts to Achieve Program Targets in the Economic Sector

Yogyakarta CDP collaborated with the Office of Cooperatives and SMEs, the Office of Trade and Industry, and the Village Government to support the economic sector assistance program. These advocacy efforts yielded several positive results. One impact was opening networks for cooperatives and business groups, providing access to various district-provided training to provincial governments. Additionally, business groups have successfully sold their products in souvenir shops, mini markets, and grocery stores. As a result of the village government's involvement in business groups, they are now included in village and district government activities such as competitions and bazaars.

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Hydroponic Farming Project for Sustainable Agriculture and Youth Income Generation

In Lombok Mertak CDP, the Hydroponic Farming as Regenerative and Sustainable Agriculture for Youth Income Generation project is being implemented by Gugah Nurani Indonesia. The project aims to create sustainable business groups in agriculture, aiming to improve family income generation through sustainable agriculture. By introducing hydroponic farming to Mertak village, it is hoped that the community will have access to more reliable food sources and better nutrition during the COVID-19 pandemic. Additionally, the project aims to provide increased income opportunities for local residents, particularly the younger generation, who can benefit from regenerative agriculture. This will also help to diversify the community's livelihoods and reduce dependence on tourism. The project involves capacity building, mentoring, mapping potential markets, and establishing a hydroponic farming center.



The project involved 150 youths divided into 15 groups, with 14 teams cultivating hydroponic agriculture in their respective living areas. Meanwhile, one business group was established, the "Bajang Tilah" business group, that manages hydroponic farming operations in two greenhouses, which include all necessary equipment such as hydroponic media, pumps, water reservoirs, electrical installations, water filter installations, member meeting places, warehouse, and nameplates. During the initial stages, the crops cultivated were lettuce, mustard greens, caisim, and kale.

The Bajang Tilah group operates the Center for Hydroponic Agriculture and Production. Members have the skills to handle all aspects of hydroponic farming, including cultivation techniques, post-harvest management, marketing, business administration, and finance.

Indonesia continues to struggle with the impact of frequent natural disasters, including earthquakes, tsunamis, and volcanic eruptions. Due to its location on the Ring of Fire, an arc of volcanoes and fault lines stretching 40,000 kilometers across the Pacific Ocean basin, we are vulnerable to a majority of the world's earthquakes. Earthquakes, in particular, pose the most significant natural disaster threat to Indonesia, as they can strike suddenly and affect populated areas, including major cities.

Since 2018, Gugah Nurani Indonesia has focused on psychosocial support and community preparedness to improve the community's disaster risk reduction system and the well-being of children, youth, and adult refugees through educational support. This initiative aims to reinforce psychological factors and social relations in society by strengthening resilience and social connections.



Enhancing Disaster Preparedness through Family Food Gardens

Gugah Nurani Indonesia has taken steps to improve the disaster preparedness of fishermen's families in Pasie Nan Tigo and Padang Sarai Village, Padang, West Sumatra, by facilitating the creation of family food gardens. This ensures that the family's food needs are met even when they are not earning an income from fishing during extreme weather due to climate change. With the availability of land and the need for disaster preparedness in mind, implementing urban farming is considered a viable solution.

The community intervention involved urban farming training, which covered seeding and planting techniques. Additionally, disaster preparedness training was provided, including simulations of disaster and community mitigation strategies. A total of 471 individuals have joined the program to implement urban farming food gardens in their yards for sustainability and were able to practice the necessary actions in disaster preparedness.

"My husband is a fisherman, and our family's livelihood depends on his catch. However, when extreme weather conditions such as cyclones, storms, abrasions, or high waves occur, he cannot go to sea, and our income is affected. This significantly impacts our family's economy, and we sometimes struggle to provide enough food for our household. In response, I joined the family resilience and disaster risk reduction program with Gugah Nurani Indonesia. Through this initiative, I learned how to grow various crops, including chili, green beans, cucumber, tomato, and eggplant, in my garden. My husband also supports this endeavor, helping to water and tend to the plants, and my children enjoy helping to harvest and eat the fresh produce. I even invited 20 of my neighbors to join the program. I have gained knowledge about urban farming and taken steps to prepare my family for potential disasters by copying all necessary documents onto my phone. As Padang is prone to natural disasters, this has given me knowledge in case of an emergency."

Cianjur Earthquake Emergency Relief

On 21st November 2022, an earthquake measuring 5.6 magnitudes and with a depth of 10 kilometers hit Cianjur Regency in West Java. As of 1st January 2023, over 455 aftershocks have been recorded. According to the National Disaster Management Agency (BNPB) report on 27th November 2022, the disaster claimed the lives of 321 people and displaced 73,874 others. The displaced individuals include 33,713 men, 40,161 women, 92 people with disabilities, 1,207 pregnant women, and 4,240 elderly citizens.

Gugah Nurani Indonesia conducted a disaster emergency operation to aid those affected from 28th November 2022 to 14th February 2023. During this time, we provided logistic assistance, basic psychosocial support, and constructed child-friendly spaces that functioned as emergency schools in Cugenang, Warung Kondang, Pacet, and Cianjur Districts.

Bogor Landslide and Flood Emergency Relief

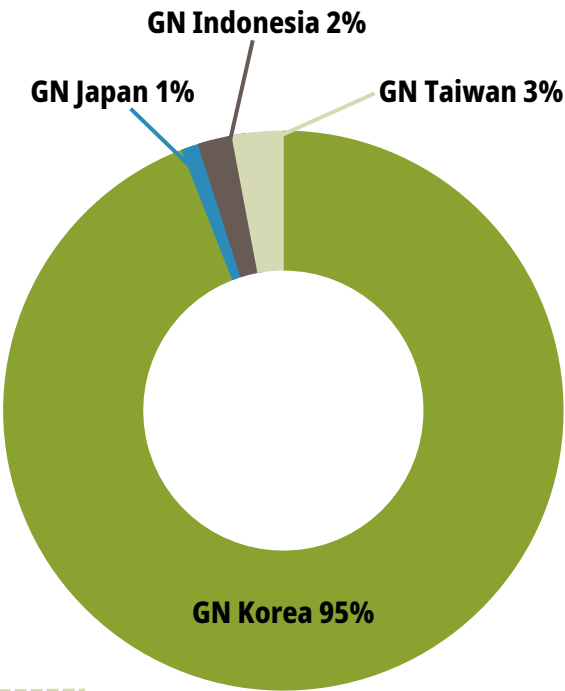
Due to high-intensity rainfall and overflowing rivers, landslides and floods have struck Bogor Regency, West Java. According to the National Regional Disaster Management Agency (BPPD), 14 villages have been impacted by floods and landslides between June 22nd and July 15th, 2022.

Gugah Nurani Indonesia's emergency response team, with support from KOICA, provided aid to disaster survivors. The team focused on logistics distribution of food and hygiene supplies, toilet renovation, and basic psychosocial support. The response area covered five villages in two sub-districts: Pamijahan District, including Gunung Picung Village, Purwabakti Village, and Cibunian Village, and Leuwiliang District, including Purasari and Puraseda Villages.

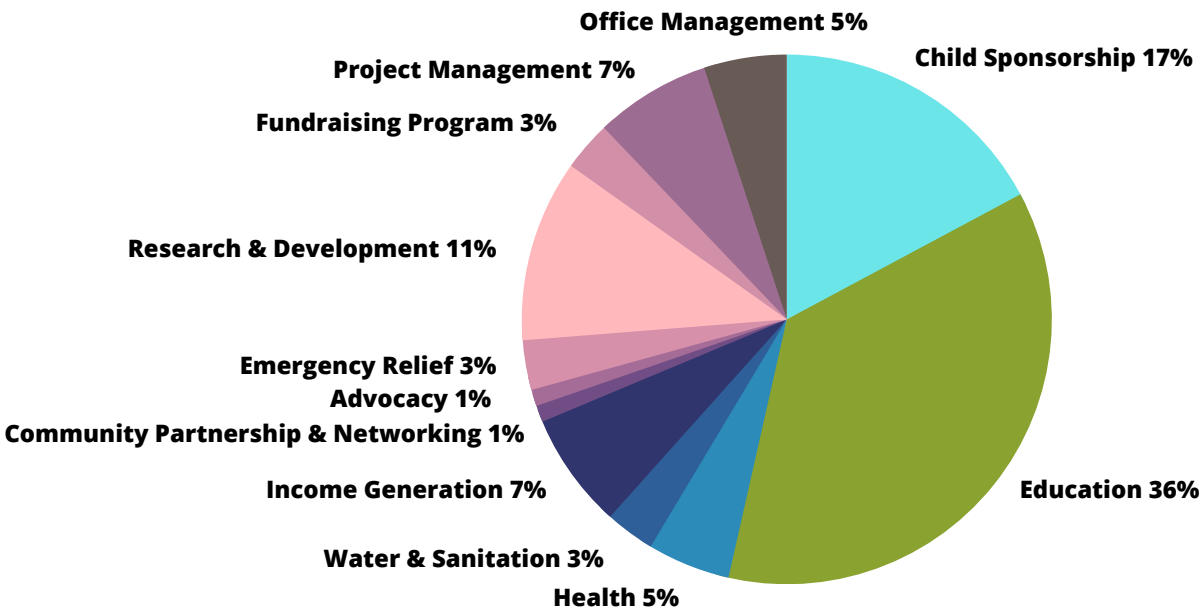
