WHAT IS A-PAD



The establishment of the Alliance was announced at the 5th Asian Ministerial Conference on Disaster Risk Reduction in October 2012 in Yogyakarta, Indonesia.

Countries of the Asia-Pacific region experience many severe natural disasters. In order to prevent, address and minimize damage from such disasters, the establishment of a comprehensive system cooperation and support drawing on the private sector, NGOs, local communities, central government and local authorities is urgently required.

Climate change raised disaster risk, A-PAD Indonesia work will be based on Humanitarian Sphere Standards as ethical foundation. How basic need of communities affected are met by upholding the right to life with dignity. Reduced risk with contribute to SDGs Goal 11 and 17 to support positive economic, social, and environmental links between urban, semi urban and rural areas by strengthening national and regional development planning.

Against this backdrop, five disaster aid national platforms from countries in the Asia-Pacific region have determined to launch a trans-national disaster aid alliance for the purpose of facilitating collaboration among countries in the Asia-Pacific region with the aim of delivering effective and efficient disaster assistance through disaster preparedness, risk reduction, relief and recovery. Hosted by the Japanese NGO for disaster management, Civic Force. Currently A - PAD Network exists in Japan, Korea, Philippines, Indonesia, Sri Lanka, Bangladesh and Nepal

"A-PAD Indonesia as Influential Multi-sectoral HUB of Innovation and Collaborative Disaster Management in Indonesia"

In Indonesia it was initially led by National Disaster Risk Reduction Platform (Planas PRB) as a forum for various stakeholders focusing Disaster Risk Reduction. A-PAD Indonesia became a legal entity in the country in 2017 to strengthened wider multi stakeholder engagement especially collaboration with the private sector to perform humanitarian activities in disaster management (relief, response, and recovery).

Up to 2024 A-PAD Indonesia will gear our efforts on three key aspects:

- Multi-sectoral Hub of Innovation and Collaborative Disaster Management, especially on Damage Loss and Need Assessment (DALA) model analysis, Disaster Knowledge Management, Business Continuity Plan (BCP) on private sector with Small, Medium, Enterprise (SME) inclusivity
- Public-private partnership for Disaster Management purpose for Hotel and Tourism Industry
- Community Based Disaster Resilience in project areas

A-PAD Indonesia project for 2020-2021 entitled, “Function of national-level disaster management platform strengthened and the system to help provincial level disaster management cooperation promoted in Indonesia”, brought stakeholders working on disaster and tourism through Disaster Resilience Outlook Forum at the national level to discuss how the industry can survive during the COVID 19 pandemic.

The global partnership on private sector disaster resilience stated at the International Symposium in Jakarta. A-PAD Indonesia became a prominent organization working closely with the Coordinating Ministry of Economic Affairs developing policies on BCP/BCM , Ministry of Tourism & Creative Industry, and Coordinating Ministry of Human Development and Culture on humanitarian issues.

KEY EVENTS AND DELIVERABLES #1

DAMAGE AND LOSS ASSESSMENT (DALA)

Damage and Loss Assessment (DALA) is a Methodology to assess post-disaster damage and losses, including economic recovery planning, and reconstruction program design, developed by the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) in 1972. The tool can monitor the progress of both economic recovery and reconstruction, and able to be implemented independently or as part of a Post-Disaster Needs Assessment.

Report on CSO DALA initial findings shows that similar to DALA, Post Disaster Needs Assessment (PDNA) is a combination of UN and WB DALA assessments, enriched by social and humanitarian perspectives, covering the early recovery also community micro economy aspects. The process should be carried out by various stakeholders in an integrated manner. CSO has the capability to perform assessments for Water and Sanitation (WATSAN), SPHERE standard, Human Recovery and Needs Assessment (HRNA) and Identification of social impacts and community recovery needs. This document is claimed as the ACT – Emergency and Post – Disaster Management as ACT Version for DALA tool.

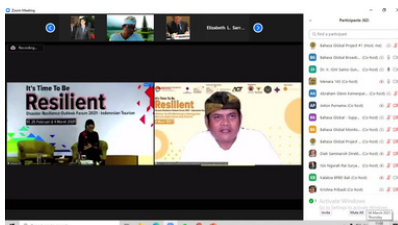
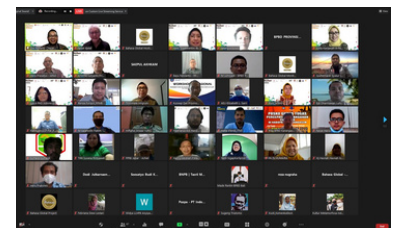

DISASTER RESILIENCE OUTLOOK FORUM 2021

The Disaster Resilience Outlook Forum 2021 was held hybrid in Menara 165 South Jakarta in three sessions in the month of February and March 2021 participated by more than 500 people both online and offline. The event was held in 3 Webinars with broadcasting sessions on February 17th, 25th, and, March 4th, 2021. More than 300 participants from different organizations participated in the Webinars.

The Webinar series aims to study, discuss ideas and concepts to adapt to the current situation. There is a need for preparedness in understanding risk, how to evacuate, and early warning systems in premium tourist destinations that are located in hazard-prone areas. Disaster impacts supply chain in tourism, there is a need to enhance elements in the value chain.



The second session builds analysis and scenario for the future of tourism in Indonesia. There are four principles for sustainable tourism: Economic Feasible, Socially Acceptable, Environmentally Feasible, and Technologically Appropriate. Social protection schemes and vaccination aim to increase people spending and get back to economic activities. To promote investment by regulation.

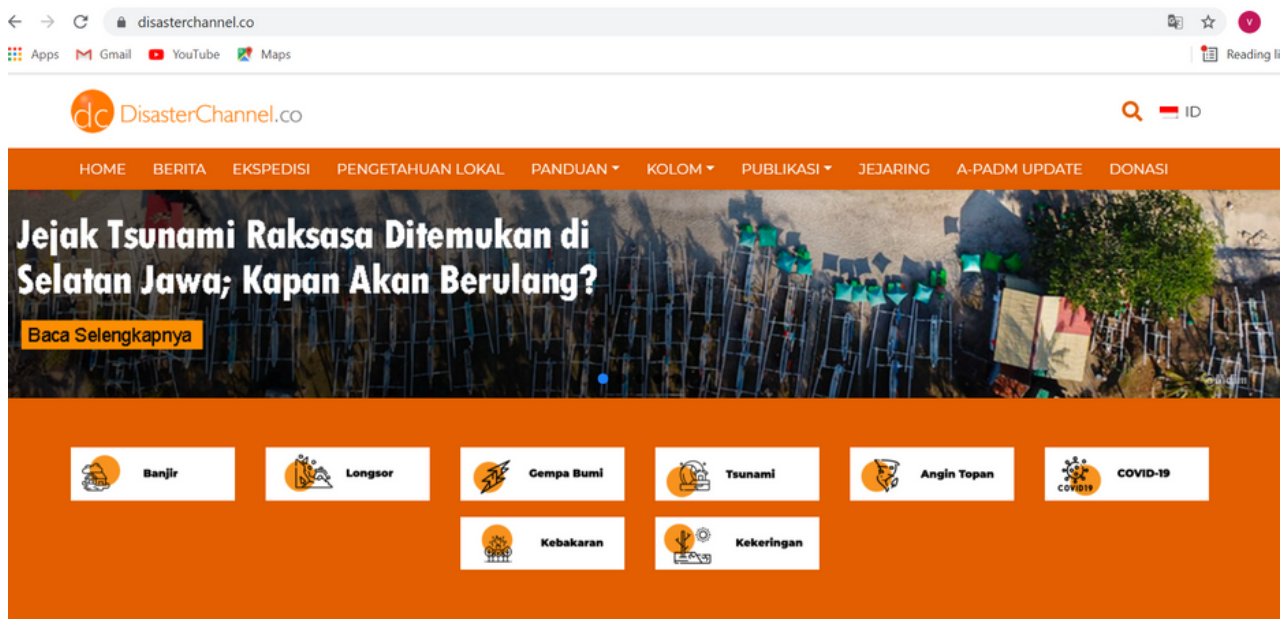

Webinar 1 : Learning from COVID 19 survivor: Uneasy feeling of COVID 19 survivors

Several COVID-19 patients shared their experiences at the event organized by Disasterchannel.co, supported by Yayasan SKALA Indonesia and A-PAD Indonesia on (25/01/2020). The Webinar event had 52 participants from various work backgrounds, whether they are COVID -19 survivors or the public who have not been exposed to COVID-19, sharing their experiences with COVID-19.



Webinar 2 : Secrets Behind Sulawesi Earthquake Vulnerabilities

This Webinar gives an understanding of seismicity in Sulawesi Island, provides a new perspective on the perspective of environmental and disaster observers in Sulawesi Island, and provides an understanding of preparedness in Sulawesi Island. The results of this Webinar activity are the correct understanding of the community about the earthquake that occurred in Sulawesi Island and a perspective of disaster risk reduction in the development aspect and the community can find out earthquake preparedness in Sulawesi Island. Held on 30 January with 52 participants.



KEY EVENTS AND DELIVERABLES #3

Webinar Series 3 : Hydrometeorology and Potential of Soil Movement during the Rainy Season 13 February 2021

Expert review on landslide disaster investigation in Cihanjuang Village, Cimanggung District, Sumedang Regency on January 9, 2021, killing 40 people, 22 people with minor injuries, and three people had serious injuries, and 1119 people displaced. Based on hydrological data: has 2 years return period. Heavy rainfall causes landslide with a tuff deposit of bedrock from volcanic rock.

Webinar Series 4 : Jakarta Flood will be repeated, 26 February 2021

The Webinar discuss the highest rainfall in the DKI Jakarta area in the last 2 days was at the Pasar Minggu Rain Post, South Jakarta, amounting to 226 mm under the category of extreme weather (BMKG). Jakarta surrounding area shows moderate to very heavy rain, with concentrations of these two rain intensities in West Jakarta, South Jakarta, and East Jakarta. Based on weather radar, the growth of rain clouds began to be significant on 19 February 2021 at 20.00 WIB, and reached its peak on 20 February 2021 at 00.06 WIB, with a maximum rainfall reaching 53 dB or around 16 mm / hour which is included in the category of Heavy rain. A significant convective cloud growth pattern begins to grow at night, reaching a peak near midnight and early morning.



Webinar Series 5 : Jakarta Earthquake Alert - Learning from the History of the Batavia Earthquake (30 participants)

This discussion was carried out with the aim of disseminating information about geological conditions and the history of earthquakes from a geological perspective that had hit Batavia, disseminating information about the history of earthquakes from the perspective of social history, and opening discussion forums to the public to find out more about the threat of earthquakes. which is in Batavia.

KEY EVENTS AND DELIVERABLES #3

Webinar Series 6 : Staying Safe Traveling in the Middle of a Geological Disaster (52 participants)

Through a virtual discussion held by Disasterchannel.co on Saturday (27/03), Dr. Daryono, Head of the BMKG Earthquake and Tsunami Mitigation Division, said several tourist attractions were prone to earthquakes and tsunamis, including several super-priority destinations developed by the government such as Lake Toba, Likupang, Mandalika, and Labuan Bajo. We need to be aware of this and need to be prepared so that the threat of disaster cannot kill the tourism sector.



Webinar 7: Measuring the Extent of Our Preparedness in the Face of Disasters (35 participants)

This open discussion is a forum for exchanging information, experiences, and stories about the role of each community that is actively involved in disaster management. Community role in building preparedness in each area with various threats of disaster. The online event was held on April 10th 2021.

Webinar 8: Post-Vaccine Indonesia - Polemics and Impacts on the COVID 19 Pandemic

This discussion shares experiences and stories about the spread of the coronavirus and the vaccination program currently being carried out. Speakers are experts who are members of the COVID-19 Report. Information about the characteristics of the coronavirus, complete information about vaccines and their types as well as cases of domestic vaccines that invite various controversies conveyed by virologists or molecular biologists, while to find out changes in community behavior after the vaccination program delivered by the Head of the Behavior Change (Task Force) Handling COVID-19. The online event on April 24 was attended by 55 participants.

RESTAURANT DISASTER SAFETY CERTIFICATION (DSC) GUIDELINE/MANUAL

A-PAD Indonesia initiated a preliminary discussion on resilient hotels and tourism during COVID 19 pandemic with stakeholders in West Nusa Tenggara and Bali. Guideline from the Ministry of Tourism and Creative Works on Clean, Healthy, and Safety (CHS), and checklist for COVID 19 protocols were adjusted to a local condition in two of A-PAD Indonesia working sites. A-PAD Indonesia with its local counterpart organized Disaster Safety Certification (DSC) training for hotels and resorts. Siap Siaga program in Bali funded by DFAT Australia become A-PAD Indonesia close counterpart together with DRR Forum and related local government. During meetings with local counterparts a roadmap for Disaster Safety Certification.

Review existing COVID 19 protocols activities in order to prepare the development of guidelines and training modules for tourism Industries in West Nusa Tenggara Province and reviewing the hotel safety guideline in Bali province.

West Nusa Tenggara Province initiated a discussion on Minimum Standard on Disaster Safety for Hotel and restaurants. Based on the first workshop, the local stakeholder agreed to have this minimum standard and suggest putting the non-natural disaster aspect, such as COVID 19 as part of the minimum standard of disaster safety.



KEY EVENTS AND DELIVERABLES #5

MAINSTREAMING BUSINESS CONTINUITY PLAN (BCP) IN DISASTER RESPONSE

A-PAD Indonesia International Symposium was held on June 10, 2021 in Shangri-La Hotel, Jakarta both off-line and online. The event was attended by 30 people offline and 196 people online.



KEY EVENTS AND DELIVERABLES #5

Recommendation from the event focus on building resilience understood as a strategic capability for our organizations to get out of the crisis. We need to have foresight and situation awareness to enable us to turn crises into resources for a strategic opportunity by:

- Building regional public private partnership as part of the disaster management strategy. Strengthen civic work with the military to train and have drills simulation for better response capacity. Local resources are mobilized by strong community engagement. Strong collaboration ensures the success of relief distribution in the rehabilitation and recovery process.
- Invest in disaster management for Indonesian economic recovery, focus on investment in digital transformations, labor-intensive programs and protection of special economic zones. Promoting the BCM approach as well as a BCP initiative, to bounce back micro, small medium enterprises, and in particular, tourism and creative industry. This tool will guide them to take good care of our employees in matter of health and safety. Providing information on preparedness, and also to think holistically on business ecosystem, about our supply chains, about how to work remotely from our offices.
- Connection supported by digital role to improve the flow of logistics will be the game- changer. Collaborating with the private sector to re-establishing the supply chain of relief and COVID 19 needs a supply chain from the manufacturer to the community. Innovation to deliver the goods needs strong coordination and local response.

At the provincial level, A-PAD Indonesia builds a strong partnership with local stakeholders to draft regulations on disaster-resilient tourism in West Nusa Tenggara. In cooperation between stakeholders in hotel and tourism both in West Nusa Tenggara and Bali, developing Disaster Safety Certification modules and training

Review of DALA for CSO by analyzing differences of methods, and approaches of various DALA tools. Including FGD with local actors in disaster response came to the conclusion that most of the participants are not very much aware and limited understanding the importance of implementing thoroughly the sequence steps of each of the six steps of their assessment task during their emergency response of Lombok island earthquake disaster response field experience.

WEST NUSA TENGGARA

•One of A-PAD Indonesia activities in West Nusa Tenggara was FGD on DALA, held on December 3rd, 2020. The FGD discussed the implementation of DALA in the Island, “to establish emergency assessment mechanism”. Twenty participants attended the event representing ACT and A-PAD Indonesia, North Lombok BPBD, West Lombok BPBD, Central Lombok BPBD, Mataram City BPBD, NTB Provincial BPBD, NTB Provincial Red Cross, NTB MDMC Muhammadiyah, UNRAM University, and BUMDes (Village Owned Enterprise). Twenty participants invited to this FGD were those were directly or indirectly involved in emergency response during the Tsunami Earthquake Disaster on the Island of Lombok in 2018 recently.

•On Dec 2020- Jan 2021 A-Pad also signed an MoU with Provincial Government of West Nusa Tenggara and the Indonesian Hotel and Restaurant Association of West Nusa Tenggara Province.

This agreement serves to detail the technical roles and responsibilities of each party.



•On April – June 2021, A-PAD organized Disaster Safety Certification Training in West Nusa Tenggara. A-PAD Indonesia initiated a preliminary discussion on resilient hotels and tourism during COVID 19 pandemic with stakeholders in West Nusa Tenggara and Bali. A-PAD Indonesia with its local counterpart organized Disaster Safety Certification (DSC) training for hotels and resorts. During meetings with local counterparts a roadmap for Disaster Safety Certification. The DSC training in NTB was conducted on 5-9 April 2021, attended by 25 participants from multi-stakeholders including Disaster management agency, tourism department, Hotel and Restaurant Association, Indonesia Red Cross, ACT, and representative of Hotel and Restaurant from Senggigi Area and Gili Trawangan Island.

1. FGD ON DALA IN WEST NUSA TENGGARA

FGD on DALA in West Nusa Tenggara was held on December 3rd, 2020 in Aruna hotel discussing the implementation of DALA in the Island, “to establish emergency assessment mechanism”.

Twenty participants attended the event representing ACT and A-PAD Indonesia, North Lombok BPBD, West Lombok BPBD, Central Lombok BPBD, Mataram City BPBD, NTB Provincial BPBD, NTB Provincial Red Cross, NTB MDMC Muhammadiyah, UNRAM University, and BUMDes (Village Owned Enterprise).

Those participants were directly or indirectly involved in emergency response during the Tsunami Earthquake Disaster on the Island of Lombok in 2018 recently.

2. DISASTER SAFETY MINIMUM STANDARDS WORKSHOP

A-PAD Indonesia again held a workshop on Disaster Safety Minimum Standards for Hotels and Resorts preparation in West Nusa Tenggara on 19 January 2021, 20 participants

The DSC training in NTB was conducted on 5-9 April 2021, attended by 25 participants from multi-stakeholders including Disaster management agency, tourism department, Hotel and Restaurant Association, Indonesia Red Cross, ACT, and representative of Hotel and Restaurant from Senggigi Area and Gili Trawangan Island.

The DSC assessor training was held on 27-29 May 2021, at the Four Star by Trans Hotel, in the city of Denpasar. Attended by 26 participants consisting of 1 woman and 25 men. This training was guided by three facilitators, and supported by the Disaster Management Agency.



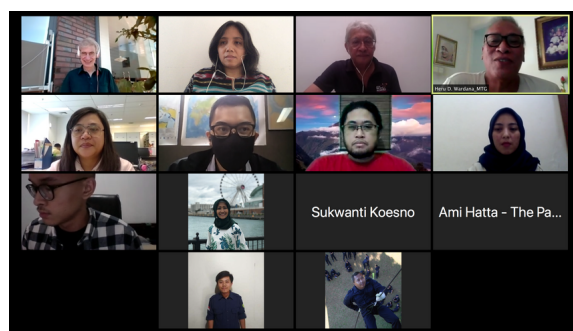

3. BUSINESS CONTINUITY PLAN TRAININGS

During June 2020, three online BCP MSME training was conducted to test the module for assessor training manual with knowledge on assistance and consultancy promoting business continuity for MSME as they are the front liner as the supplier for micro industries. The online training was attended by 20 participants. This was the focus of BCP II training held on Thursday, 25 June 2020.

BCP training and accreditation will build their resilience, especially in the tourism industry. A WA Group for BCP participants was set as a networking tool among participants, to share training materials, information, and lesson learnt.

The BCP MSME III training was held on Thursday, July 2, 2020. In the experience sharing session. The event was attended by 18 participants.

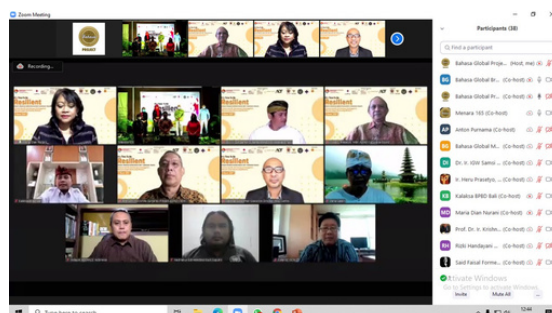
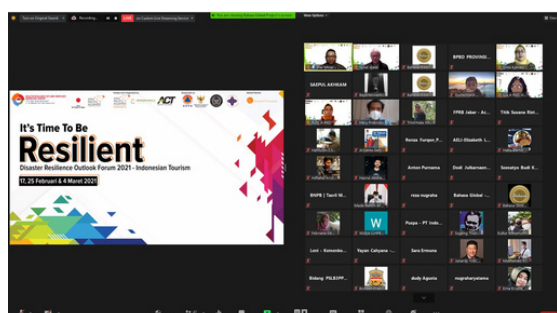

6. EMERGENCY PROPOSAL FOR SERANG, BANTEN

The emergency response in Puloampel, Serang – Banten implemented as planned with main activities as follow

November 3, 2020 : Identification (mapping) of the handwashing area and the community receiving masks. Puskesmas participants, Head of Argawana Village, Head of Banyuwangi Village. Argawana Village Secretary, Argawana Village Cadre, Banyuwangi Village Cadre and YKB.

SRIKREASI GARMENT LESTARI convection company completed 5,000 masks within eight days. Order three layers micro fiber masks with A-PAD and YKB logos. Total masks of 5,000 with 5 different colors, each color there are 1,000 with 500 earloop straps and 500 hijab straps.

7. EMERGENCY RESPONSE WEST SULAWESI

On January 23, 2021 Paradise Property Group donate 1000 Mask to IDPs in West Sulawesi to A-PAD Indonesia.

The mask was distributed by joint emergency post to those needed.

Also 5 Millions IDR donation to affected communities including people with disabilities.

On Sunday, January 24th, 2021 Yayasan Pelayanan Masyarakat Indonesia (ARC) deployed two volunteers to join ACT-SKALA-A-PAD post in West Sulawesi. ARC is a volunteer organization from Jakarta with 70 members as doctors, nurses and youth that have concerns with issues of health.

The activities in Mamuju and Majene distributed one food truck that contains 1,000 packs of ready-to-eat foods and providing 3 tanks of clean water with 8000 liters for each tank. It will reach at least 4,500 affected people/beneficiaries. Special effort to sustain daily activities, especially in distributing the water tank and maintaining the handwashing facilities in the evacuation center including anticipating safety and security issues, the team will involve the local people including affected people and people with disabilities (ensuring accessibility).



8. EMERGENCY RESPONSE LEMBATA WEST NUSA TENGGARA



On December 16, 2020 A-PAD Indonesia connected Volunteer Coordinator for Smart NTT with Nestle for volcanic eruption in Lembata. The aid was picked up from Maumere, Ende or Larantuka for IDPs in camps (70%) or extended families (30%) around Lewoleba.

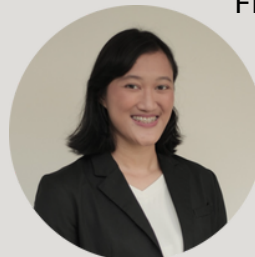

ORGANIZATION MANAGEMENT

Regular communication and alignment is crucial to deliver expected results by APAD Indonesia team. Meeting of A-PAD Indonesia staff, board members with A-PAD Management Office was very productive for alignment on expectation, program monitoring, and deliverables reporting.

ORGANIZATION OPERATION

- Clarity of briefing is the key to ensure follow up actions by A-PAD Indonesia Network throughout the country
- A-PAD presence in Bali and West Nusa Tenggara answer their needs to have guiding documents for disaster preparedness and Covid-19 prevention
- Important to encourage activities with participation of local governance and stakeholders to ensure the ownership of project
- For hybrid broadcasting events, good and careful planning (with Covid Protocol) are keys for successful achievement
- Learning from West Sulawesi emergency response, community participation helps us to understand the needs of the community well while also helping psychosocial and maintaining mental health during emergency situations.
- More branding for Disasterchannel.co on social media

LOCAL ELECTION 2020

- Strengthened cooperation and communication between local government and communities
- Education and outreach of health protocols should be carried out massively and using the momentum of the candidates' campaign on the local election
- Understanding of the application of health protocols must continue to be given to the public massively so that behavior change in adapting to Covid-19 can be achieved and the role of the community as the frontline can be strengthened to reduce build up of patients in the hospital.
- Low community discipline, refusal of residents to be tested, limited availability of testing laboratories, and difficulties to control independent isolations for suspect patients or mild-symptoms infected patients
- Importance to mitigate for other hazards (megathrust), ecosystem-based disaster mitigation

LESSONS LEARNED



WEST NUSA TENGGARA

- The West Lombok Regency Government has stated its commitment to jointly with A-PAD Indonesia in building the resilience of the tourism industry, especially in Senggigi Area. The West Lombok Tourism Office has allocated a budget for mitigation and preparedness in the tourism area
- The West Nusa Tenggara government welcomes the program implemented by A-PAD Indonesia. This was marked by the signing of a memorandum of cooperation that previously would be signed by the head of the BPBD or regional secretary, but in the end it was signed by the Governor, gained commitment and ownership in Lombok. It is a good starting point to ensure the program sustainability in the future
- A-PAD Indonesia, Yayasan Skala, and ACT joint effort in West Sulawesi for emergency response runs well under pressure and constraints.

CILEGON SERANG

- Emergency response in Puloampel - Banten is an innovative approach for Covid-19 in Industrial areas. The pandemic caused deaths to factory workers, stalled supply chain, and aborted production. The aid was on target as these areas were underfunded for Covid-19 prevention activities. Innovation includes integrated outreach for Covid-19 and HIV prevention by the largest factory in the area, PT. Cilegon Fabrikators by internal Case Management team. This initiative leverage with ongoing ILO project targeting factory workers. It opens the door for communication between the local government and factories that were closed before.

SUMMARY

In 2021, A-PAD Indonesia met the target of project implementation focusing on DALA, Disaster Resilience Outlook Forum 2021, Disasterchannel.co, Disaster Safety Certification, International Symposium 2021, and Emergency Fund disbursements.

RECOMMENDATION

Enhance and strengthening network with private sector on disaster response and disaster risk reduction. Supporting the government on re-opening tourism sector for post pandemic. IT enhancement for database and knowledge management.
