Events by SDG

The IE Foundation has set up a direct line to the Spanish Red Cross, which passed on all contributions directly to the Red Crescent active in both Turkey and Syria.





3rd Annual Free Rice Challenge

We hosted the 3rd Annual Free Rice Challenge, encouraging students to interact with the online World Food Programme platform to donate grains of rice to hungry families for every trivia question answered correctly.

Meal distribution for those in need (Madrid)

Participants distributed meals and first necessity goods to vulnerable groups in risk of poverty and social exclusion in Madrid. This activity was part of the Kindness, Empathy & Compassion Month agenda at IE, and was organized by the Center for Health, Well-Being & Happiness and the IE Well-Being Club in partnership with United Way España.







Holistic Health: How to deal with Hormonal Health

The Women in Business Club hosted this workshop about the importance of understanding hormonal health and how it affects our lives. Some specific topics discussed included the menstrual cycle, how the cycle affects women at work and in their personal life, as well as identifying the right tips to work with the cycle to feel empowered.

IE Happiness Week 2022

The IE Center for Health, Well-being, and Happiness and its Student Advisory Board hosted the 3rd edition of Happiness Week at IE. This year, our theme was community & belonging and there were numerous events to support the intentional building of community.

Measurement of Outcomes

To measure IE University's commitment to sustainability and its support of the Global Compact, a variety of qualitative and quantitative indicators were employed.

Quantitative and Qualitative Indicators:

IE University's unwavering commitment to sustainability and its wholehearted endorsement of the Global Compact are underscored by a comprehensive array of both qualitative and quantitative indicators. These multifaceted metrics not only highlight the institution's steadfast dedication but also serve as invaluable tools for gaining a deep understanding of the continuous endeavors and substantial influence it has in the realm of sustainability.

Greenhouse Gas Emissions Reduction: One key quantitative indicator is the reduction in greenhouse gas emissions achieved by IE University over time. The institution is dedicated to achieving net-zero emissions, and it closely monitors its progress in reducing emissions, especially in Scope 1 and Scope 2 categories. This demonstrates IE University's commitment to mitigating its environmental impact.

Curriculum Integration: Furthermore, the integration of sustainability into the curriculum is a crucial element of IE University's sustainability efforts. The university offers an impressive array of sustainability-focused courses, programs, and degrees. In total, students can access 12,712.5 hours of sustainability content through their academic journey, with 1,475 subjects (comprising 23% of the total) directly related to sustainability. This commitment to incorporating sustainability into the education provided is a significant step toward creating responsible global citizens.

Operational Improvements: Operational improvements are another area where quantitative indicators demonstrate IE University's dedication to sustainability. The institution has made notable reductions in paper usage, water consumption, and energy consumption on campus when compared to baseline data. This includes a remarkable 98% reduction in paper usage and a substantial reduction of 10,026 m3 in water consumption during the 2021–2022 academic year compared to the previous year. These achievements highlight IE University's efforts to reduce its environmental footprint and improve operational sustainability.

Research Output: IE University's research output in sustainability is also quantified, demonstrating its commitment to advancing knowledge and solutions in this field. Faculty and students have contributed to this effort through 13 academic articles related to sustainability, participation in five research projects centered around sustainability, and the presence of 13 research centers dedicated to this cause. These metrics reflect IE University's role as a hub for sustainability-related research and knowledge dissemination.



Community Engagement: Lastly, community engagement is a vital aspect of IE University's sustainability initiatives. Tracking the participation of students, faculty, and staff in sustainability-related community projects, events, and initiatives reveals a deep and ongoing commitment. With nearly 500 events focusing on sustainability, 383 press releases related to sustainability efforts, and more than 350 student-led activities, IE University demonstrates its active involvement in making a positive impact beyond its campus boundaries.

Recognition and Awards: Documenting awards, recognition, and certifications received by IE University for its sustainability efforts serves as a qualitative indicator of our achievements. Such recognition includes sustainability awards, certifications, and acknowledgments from relevant organizations and bodies. This recognition is a testament to the institution's commitment to sustainability. For example, IE University received certification for its carbon footprint, indicating its compliance with the requirements of the GHG Protocol standard. Additionally, IE University was recognized as the number one business school to offer comprehensive training on ESG and Net Zero in the Financial Times 2023 MBA ranking, further exemplifying our dedication to sustainability.

Social Innovation: IE University promotes social innovation through initiatives like the Social Lab and Policy Lab. Stories of social impact and the qualitative evaluation of the effectiveness of these labs are essential for understanding their contributions to the greater good. For example, Financieros sin Fronteras (FsF), also known as Financiers without Borders, is an NGO led by IE students and faculty. Its mission is to promote financial inclusion in Africa as a development tool, enabling low-income entrepreneurs with the potential to generate microproductive activities to access the necessary tools for bringing about positive change for their businesses and communities. During the last ten years, faculty, students, and staff from the different Master in Finance Programs from IE Business School have provided ad-honorem technical assistance, capacity building, and facilitated access to new sources of financing to Ghanaian FNGOs, a type of MFI with the capacity to help the lowest-income entrepreneurs to build their path out of poverty. This exchange of expertise and know-how between the Academic and Financial world assists FNGOs to be better equipped to service low-income populations, sustain growth, and improve their opportunities for sound investments.

Partnerships and Collaborations: IE University actively engages in collaborative initiatives with external organizations, NGOs, and governmental agencies to drive forward sustainability objectives. A noteworthy illustration of such a collaboration took place at COP26 in Glasgow in November 2021 when we partnered with other esteemed business schools to establish Business Schools for Climate Leadership. This pioneering partnership comprises prominent academic, and business thought leaders from renowned institutions, including Cambridge Judge Business School, HEC Paris, IE Business School, IESE Business School, International Institute for Management Development, INSEAD, London Business School, and Saïd Business School at the University of Oxford. Collectively, these eight institutions annually educate over 55,000 students and executives while also overseeing alumni networks comprising more than 400,000 individuals.
