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

The Ten Principles of the United Nations Global Compact are derived from: the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, the International Labour Organization's Declaration on Fundamental Principles and Rights at Work, the Rio Declaration on Environment and Development, and the United Nations Convention Against Corruption.

Human Rights

Principle 1: Businesses should support and respect the protection of internationally proclaimed human rights; and

Principle 2: make sure that they are not complicit in human rights abuses.

Labour

Principle 3: Businesses should uphold the freedom of association and the effective recognition of the right to collective bargaining;



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Principle 4: the elimination of all forms of forced and compulsory labour;

Principle 5: the effective abolition of child labour; and

Principle 6: the elimination of discrimination in respect of employment and occupation.

Environment

Principle 7: Businesses should support a precautionary approach to environmental challenges;

Principle 8: undertake initiatives to promote greater environmental responsibility; and

Principle 9: encourage the development and diffusion of environmentally friendly technologies.

Anti-Corruption and Transparency

Principle 10: Businesses should work against corruption in all its forms, including extortion and bribery.

2. Principle 2 | Values

3. Principle 3 | Method

We will create educational frameworks, materials, processes and environments that enable effective learning experiences for responsible leadership.



4. Principle 4 | Research

We will engage in conceptual and empirical research that advances our understanding about the role, dynamics, and impact of corporations in the creation of sustainable social, environmental and economic value.



5. Principle 5 | Partnership

We will interact with managers of business corporations to extend our knowledge of their challenges in meeting social and environmental responsibilities and to explore jointly effective approaches to meeting these challenges.



6. Principle 6 | Dialogue

We will facilitate and support dialog and debate among educators, students, business, government, consumers, media, civil society organisations and other interested groups and stakeholders on critical issues related to global social responsibility and sustainability.

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THE AFRICAN SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT MAP

This brochure illustrates "at a glance" the support that the Economic Commission for Africa (ECA) is providing to its member States towards the implementation of the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

ECA's support currently falls under four broad areas to support evidence based policymaking for the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) as well as Africa's own development vision, Agenda 2063 -The Africa We Want. These efforts are namely in the areas of:

- i) Data collection and analysis;
- ii) Technical support, advisory services and capacity development;
- Development of knowledge products, facilitating knowledge-sharing as well as South-South & triangular cooperation; and
- Reporting and follow-up support on the implementation of the SDGs and Agenda 2063

These areas will continue to progress as ECA responds to the evolving needs and demands of its member States in Africa.

To situate the SDGs in the African context, in January 2015, the African Union Heads of State and Governments adopted Agenda 2063, a strategic vision, for inclusive growth and sustainable development in Africa which was developed before Agenda 2030 for Sustainable Development was endorsed. In September of the same year, Africa also signed Agenda 2030, the global framework for achieving sustainable development which largely accommodated Africa's voice, presented through the Common African Position. Africa's agenda does not contradict the SDGs, it is more specific and more focused on the transformative policies that can make a difference for the continent.

Given the levels of congruence, synergies of both agendas have been harnessed in an integrated Regional Indicator Framework which is being finalised. This will allow for a coherent approach to implementation, monitoring and evaluation as well as facilitate efficiency and effectiveness of reporting on both agendas. Going forward, ECA will promote the combatting of illicit financial flows to help finance the implementation of both agenda.

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








Sendai Framework and the Sustainable Development Goals



The Sustainable Development Goals Report is submitted every year to the High-level Political Forum (HLFP), drawing on data collected and reported by country on an annual basis. The first Sendai Framework Progress Report is expected in 2019 and will exceptionally cover trends in implementation for the two biennial cycles 2015-2016 and 2017-2018. In 2019, reporting on progress in achieving the SDG targets related to disaster risk reduction and in implementing the Sendai Framework, will be shared at the High-level Political Forum and Sixth Global Platform for Disaster Risk Reduction respectively.
