Practically, Gugah Nurani Indonesia hereafter as GN Indonesia has been working in Indonesia for 18 years as of 2023 since the Tsunami hit Aceh in 2005. We have 15 Community Development Projects with child sponsorship basis and been working for Corporate Social Responsibility Project in 4 locations.

The Main Program Intervention

GN Indonesia has prioritized three sectors, they are <u>education</u>, <u>health</u>, <u>and economy</u>, in our Community Development Projects. In the education sector, we have implemented a range of initiatives, including creative and innovative teaching training for teachers, the construction of community libraries and child learning centers, e-learning tools, and more. In the health sector, we have worked with health offices, Community Health Services, and health cadres to promote community-based sanitation, provide clean water, and install toilets for underprivileged families. In the economic sector, we have supported cooperatives through technical and financial support for revolving funds, empowered business groups in collaboration with Cooperative and Small Business Offices and collaborated with local governments to promote the products of business groups.





Working together with local volunteers, we ensure to meet our sponsored children and received the basic services such as **family visit**, **school supports**, **health check up**, **distribution of hygiene kits**.

Total of sponsored children in **15 CDPs** are **10,954 children** as of July 2023, bringing impact to the family and community to self-reliance communities.

School Supports

In 2022, we supported to 10,893 sponsored children to receive the school supports in kind of books, stationaries, school bag.

In certain areas, the children reuse their brother/sister school bag for their need to school. Through our intervention, the children have their own bag as part of motivation to go to school and graduate in timely manner.

Health Check-Up

We work together with local health officers working in Health Centers to fulfilled. periodically check the children healthy. The basic checking is for the ear, nose, throat (ENT), teeth, weigh and height.

This service is to early detect and prevent children from potential severe disease both in urban or rural areas.



Clean Water Access

Water is a compulsory need to be fulfilled.

Through the child sponsorship, we ensure in our project areas are available for the clean water.

Library project in Bau Bau Island (completed)

In order to improve public literacy, since 2016 government through the Ministry of Education and Culture has launched the National Literacy Movement program which consists of from the School Literacy Movement, the Family Literacy Movement, and the Community Literacy Movement. The condition of facilities and infrastructure to support the program, namely the library and school library management staff still far from adequate. The number of primary school libraries recorded is approx. 61.45 percent of the total number of schools, but only 19 percent of which are in good condition.

What we intervened to address the problem is to synchronize the community needs and the government policy. We capacitated the teachers involving parents for the need of literacy improvement and providing the facilities for children and community.

Model to Solve Stunting Issue


A Model to Solve Stunting Issue

By end of 2022, the prevalence of stunting in Indonesia was 21.6% at national level with 14% as the target of 2024. Due to this case, GN Indonesia takes contribution to decrease stunting using community-based approach so that it can be replicable to other locations. And in the 1st half, our

model showed 58% increment of weight from the intervene infants.

Flow of Stimulant Process **Foodstuffs to Mothers of Toddlers and Pregnant Women**









Economic Ecosystem through Cooperatives

• GN Indonesia's strategy to foster local communities' resilience is to build an economic ecosystem through cooperatives and Income Generation Group (IGG). To Ensure the continuity of cooperative businesses, it is essential to focus on cooperative member growth and involvement and create sustainable cooperatives with good governance.

Cooperative Member Growth



- **By June 2023**, our Cooperative members are in total **3,389 people** included our sponsored children family.
- The total equity from Cooperative members is \$ 69,429 and GN Indonesia support for Revolving Fund is \$ 518,267 (2022 until June 2023).


- ETIKA Coop. implements a delivery mechanism for goods ordered by small shop partners. This helps community who have small shop businesses to get goods easily. They also work with our assisted business group that consist of women, not only the member but also the neighborhood also benefited.
- ETIKA Coop. applies a payment mechanism at the end, where partners can pay for goods purchased at the ETIKA warehouse after the goods are picked up. This is an advantage of ETIKA compared to other businesses that have the same business model as ETIKA and help the community to develop their business more easily.
- ETIKA's total revenue in the 1st half 2023 has reached IDR 200,163,220 (\$13,433).


