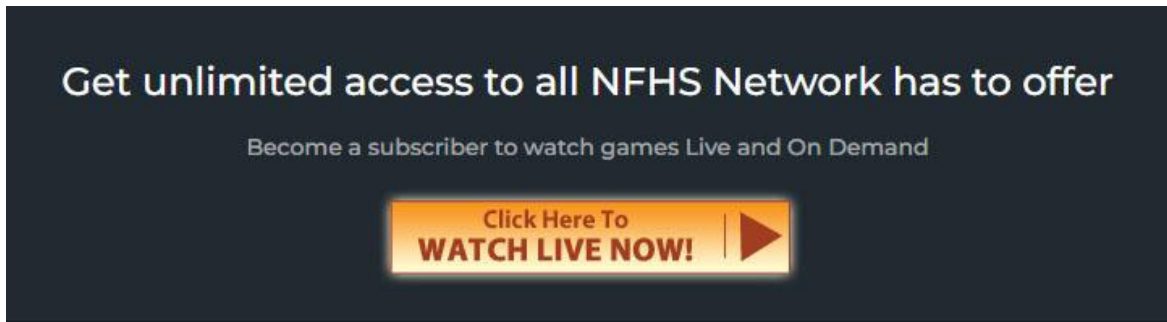

A North Carolina Showdown: Independence vs. Hough High School Football

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A Clash of Titans: The Stage is Set

In the world of North Carolina high school football, few matchups command as much attention as a clash between the Independence Patriots and the Hough Huskies.
